

CUT FLOWER GARDEN

NEW INITIATIVE IN OUR VILLAGE FOR 2021

Welcome to this additional supplement to the Gossip Tree this month to introduce the village to a new community project starting this year and to provide more information of its purpose and how villagers and the local community can get involved.

The village hall team have been working for some time to find ways to use our facilities for the benefit and welfare of our own and the wider community.

We have been in contact with the practice manager of the Blackmore Vale Partnership for some time and more recently have had talks about a community cut flower garden with the social prescribing manager, Karen Rhys. The village hall linked up very recently with the social prescribing team in the Blackmore Vale Partnership to discuss the viability of a community cut flower garden, for the benefit of all, behind the surgery in Fontmell Magna. I am delighted to say that in mid November, the plan was authorised and I have been working with lots of businesses and groups and schools to bring the plan to fruition.

WHY A CUT FLOWER GARDEN?

We all recognise the benefits of being outdoors for our well being and general health and the aim of the cut flower garden is to bring people together and bring a bit of joy and colour to our days.

THE LINK WITH THE BLACKMORE VALE PARTNERSHIP?

The social prescribing team within our wonderful partnership are always looking for opportunities to support the health and well being of their patients in creative ways. Gardens provide opportunities for socialising, exercise, enjoyment etc which will help loneliness and isolation. It is crucial in these times that we establish these important links to look after ourselves and each other.

WHAT WILL THE GARDEN LOOK LIKE?

The plan is to have a manageable area with six raised beds measuring 10 foot by four foot behind the surgery, which will provide flowers to cut from May until the first frosts. The flowers are there to be enjoyed by the community and we are encouraging villagers to plant seeds, plant seedlings out, and to cut flowers for their own enjoyment.

I have chosen varieties which are easy to grow and easy to tend- which will be productive. We will have sweet peas, cerinthe, zinnia, salvia, scabious, rudbekia, cosmos, gypsophila and some perennial alchemilla, and gaura as fillers plus dahlia to extend the season.

WHO WILL IT INVOLVE?

The simple answer is anyone! It would be lovely to have as many villagers and the local community involved to help build and maintain an area to benefit all. At this stage, I have links with the following groups who are all happy and keen to help -The Social Prescribing team at the Blackmore Vale Partnership, The Mens Shed Sturminster, In Jolly Good Company (a Group set up for people with dementia and also people feeling the effects of loneliness- www.injollygoodcompany.com), Dorset MIND (the mental health charity), Clayesmore School voluntary scheme for year 12s,

Springhead, St Andrew's School plus local businesses who are keen to get involved in workshops, work experience and demonstrations- Pamplemousse Shaftesbury, Kingston Maurward College, Pod and Pip, Salisbury. There are additional garden centres linking up- Cranborne Garden Centre, Oasis Garden Centre, Keyneston Mill and Orchard Park have provided the majority of the seeds and are donating flowers.

THE FOLLOWING WONDERFUL GROUPS ARE GOING TO WORK WITH US

THE MENS SHED STURMINSTER NEWTON

Men's sheds are similar to garden sheds- a place to pursue practical interests at leisure, to practice skills and enjoy making and mending. The difference is that garden sheds and their activities are often solitary in nature, while Men's Sheds are the opposite. They're about social connections and friendship building, sharing skills and knowledge, and of course a lot of laughter. Activities in sheds vary greatly, with the Stur shed having a well equipped woodworking workshop. In normal times, the group meet every Tuesday and Thursday 10.00-15.00, though this has been somewhat disrupted by the current pandemic. HOW ARE WE FUNDING THE PROJECT?

I have contacted lots of local businesses to request any help or support. The response has been incredible! We have pledges for raised beds for us, planters, water buts, an irrigation system, garden benches, extra perennial cut flowers, seeds, planters, a compost bin, a wheelbarrow and three benches.

We will have our own instagram page and face book page for the project to share pictures and link into associated projects across the UK.

WHAT NEXT AND HOW TO GET INVOLVED

1. The garden club and some extra volunteers are already growing some seeds and will be continuing to grow seeds from the garden from March. If anyone will be able to spare Dahlia – that would be marvellous.

We will need volunteers to dead head the garden from time to time- this might be half an hour every two weeks on a rota during the peak growing season from June- September- or as often as you want. We are planning to open the village hall on specific and regular dates from April for a couple of hours until the end of the flowering season to sell teas, coffees, cake and also surplus plants this will help fund the project for the next year and more importantly bring us together. We would be grateful for any volunteers who could help with teas or cake making etc
