#### **Superfast Dorset Update**

Superfast Dorset is rolling out faster, more reliable fibre broadband across Dorset. With fibre broadband:

- Everyone in your home can be online at the same time.
- Download and watch your favourite TV shows, films and sports when you want and without annoying buffering.
- Keep in touch with friends and family by video calling.
- Work from home with a faster and more reliable connection.

Superfast broadband is available in Fontmell Magna and Bedchester as a result of the fibre rollout. Residents in these communities should contact providers to check what is available to them. Superfast Dorset has plans, subject to detailed survey, to bring fibre broadband to Hartgrove during 2017 though, as always, individual speeds and availability will vary. #### **Garden Club**

On Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> March, the Garden Club enjoyed an excellent talk by Stephen Candy, who is Head Gardener at Kingston Lacy. Stephen, with a full-time team of five, and some 50 volunteers, looks after the gardens and woodland, and his particular interest has been the rejuvenation of the kitchen garden. Some of the trees are four hundred years old (one was planted by the Duke of Wellington) and the limes and clouded yew need particular care. Elsewhere, Stephen has access to papers left by Henrietta Bankes showing how the gardens were in former times, and great care is taken to keep colours and plant sizes as she designed them.

Kingston Lacy is famous for its snowdrops – it has 40 varieties in the snowdrop walk, which continues into carpets of daffodils, then bluebells. Their 26 varieties of anemone nemorosa form part of the national collection. Stephen illustrated his talk with many beautiful slides of both plants and wildlife, which emphasised the diversity of the different garden areas.

It was a very enjoyable and informative evening and we are very grateful to Stephen for his enthusiasm. Robert McCurrach

#### **Public Questions**

Chris Bellers reported that, following notification by the PC, the concrete blocks had been removed from the chalk pit carpark at the top of Fontmell Hill. However, there were now several containers of rapeseed oil and some old tyres dumped there. Cllr. East would report this but said that anyone could report fly-tipping on the dorsetforyou website. Chris also asked when the phone box at Bedchester would be repainted, as this had been promised by the end of February. Cllr. East had reminded the contractor (Malcolm Jenkins) but had not received any reply local residents are welcome to help. Bill Hall asked about the money now available to be spent on the A350/C13. This is covered under *Highways* below.

#### **Parish Council Meeting**

Six parish councillors were present, and 32 members of the public. Apologies for absence from DCC Cllr. D. Croney and apologies for lateness from NDDC Cllr. C. Langham (arrived 7.30pm). Cllr. Horstead said that the next meeting would also start at 7.00pm as it would be preceded by the Annual Parish Meeting for clubs and societies etc. to report on their activities (for which individual invitations would not be sent) as well as the AGM.

Cllr. Graham Carr-Jones, the current leader of NDDC, introduced himself and said he would be standing as a candidate for Stalbridge and the Beacons in the forthcoming local elections on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> May 2017 (Fontmell Magna is included in this area, following boundary changes).

There were no declarations of interest.

#### Planning

Springhead Distillery. Cllr. East reported that both the applicant and his representative, having provided written responses to the PC, had decided not to attend the PC meetings. The biggest concern with this application for an 'artisan distillery' of gin, vodka and whisky was risk: risk to the character of the village and risk to Springhead Trust. It has taken four months to get a response from NDDC to the PC's letter of 14th September 2016 to NDDC, which set out 17 issues or concerns. There had been a constructive meeting last week with Steve Savage, Highways and Robert Lennis, Planning Officer. While, according to the Planning Officer, there were no planning reasons for refusing the application, it appears that 21 conditions will be imposed which will satisfy many of the PC's concerns. The proposed distillery will be employing four or five staff between 7.00am and 11.00pm but, as it will store bonded spirits, 24-hour security is needed, entailing security lights. As the site is close to the AONB, all external lighting must be approved by the Planning Office, to ensure there is no unnecessary light pollution. Despite claims on their website that will be a visitors' (see there centre www.springheaddistillery.com), there will be a planning condition that no retail outlet or shop selling distillery products can be operated. Springhead Trust should regularly monitor water quality so that concerns can be reported to the Environment Agency. Highways would be monitoring traffic damage both during and after the works had been completed, and residents were asked to report any damage they notice. Robert McCurrach pointed out that a planning application in Kent had been refused on the grounds that there was not enough benefit for the local community compared with the companies involved. Cllr. East would mention this in his response. Cllr. Langham stated, in response to the PC's request, that she will ask the Planning Committee to make a site visit before making a decision.

The PC had no objection to the planning applications in respect of Barn Cottage (West Street) or Hartgrove Cottage (Parsons Lane, Hartgrove).

#### **Minutes**

The minutes of the last PC meeting on Monday 9th January were approved and signed.

## Matters arising

The proposal for two unitary authorities is going

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ahead, despite objections from Purbeck and East The following items were discussed at the meeting Dorset. Clir. Crompton has resigned, and a notice of vacancy has been posted. Unless 10 people request an election for a new councillor, the PC can co-opt one. Regarding the phone box by the shop/Post Office, the PC had notified BT that it would prefer for the box not to be removed until there was adequate mobile phone coverage. However, it appears that BT's application for blanket planning permission to remove all 'redundant' phone boxes has been refused, so there is no immediate threat.

## County/District Councillors' Report

The PC agreed to post the monthly reports on the PC's website: www.fontmellmagnapc.co.uk

#### Finance

The acting RFO reported that the PC's accounts currently held £8,901.34. Cllr. Horstead said that the PC meeting in July would review the Financial Regulations.

#### **Standing Orders**

The Standing Orders were reviewed and agreed, subject to a strong recommendation that all new councillors should have access to email. It was clarified that the Neighbourhood Plan Group is a working party and not a committee or sub-committee and so is not subject to PC Standing Orders.

**Highways** 

Cllr. East reported that £2½ million had been made available for improvements to the A350 and C13 routes. He understands that this will be used to: resurface or repair stretches of the A350 between Shaftesbury and Blandford; to review all road signs on the A350 and C13, ensuring that there are no unnecessary signs and that all necessary signs are in the correct place; to review speed limits; and to address pinch points. Certain junctions would be improved, such as at Gore Clump (where the two roads joining the C13 would be made one way). Freight routes would be reviewed and co-ordinated with neighbouring counties and, if possible, SatNav influenced. Cllr East had been led to believe that most of the proposals in the 2014 Fontmell Magna Traffic Management Scheme would be in place by the end of the year e.g. gates at the two entrances to the village on the A350 and a pinch point on South Street. He was happy to circulate a copy of the Scheme to anyone who wants it (email robinm47@gmail.com). Neighbourhood Plan

Cllr. Humphreys reported that the Plan's draft statement of Vision and Objectives had been circulated to the PC. An Options Consultation on development sites and green spaces will take place on Saturday 18th March in the Village Hall, open to the whole parish community. For those unable to attend, information will be available on the Parish Council website (under Neighbourhood Plan) and residents can comment by Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> April. The PC had been served with notice to undertake a Strategic Environmental Assessment. The PC acknowledged the substantial effort being made by volunteers in the

## working party to develop the Neighbourhood Plan. Dorset Best Kept Village Competition 2017

Fontmell Magna last won this competition in 2009 and it was about time we entered again. The PC therefore appealed for a volunteer from the parish to come forward to lead this project.

#### Community Defibrillator

The PC had written to object to the closure of beds.

#### The Gossip Tree

It was agreed to publish The Gossip Tree on the PC's website.

#### Other business

Gary Payne said that one of the cherry trees by the War Memorial needs attention.

Marianne Wheatley has indicated she is considering resuming the role of Clerk and RFO to the PC in August.

The meeting closed at 8.43pm.

#### **North Dorset Wildlife Trust**

Brownsea Island is home to a myriad of wildlife species and has a variety of important habitats including reedbeds, lagoons, pine woods and flooded woodland. The Dorset Wildlife Trust leases 101 hectares of the island from the National Trust. This nature reserve offers over-wintering for many species, including avocets and godwits (black and bar tailed), and in summer you'll hear the sounds of chiffchaff and willow warblers and see an abundance of butterflies. Autumn is the best time for spotting our native red squirrels.

DWT's Brownsea Island manager, Chris Thain, is giving an illustrated talk on the wildlife of Brownsea Island on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> April at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. Friday 3<sup>nd</sup> March – Valerie Dyson – 'The Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance'

If anyone had doubts as to why we need an air ambulance in this county, a photograph showing the A303 in complete gridlock soon put these to rest. From its base in Henstridge, the helicopter can reach the most westerly point in Somerset in nineteen minutes and the most southerly point in Dorset in twelve minutes.

Valerie is a volunteer with our Air Ambulance charity and she explained how the service works. You dial 999 in the normal way and, if the people taking the call decide a helicopter is needed, it can be airborne in three minutes. There are always three members of staff on board, a pilot with extra skills in low-level flying, a paramedic with extra skills in dealing with trauma and a doctor.

The service is funded entirely by donations from the public. Valerie gave us a real insight into their work. If we did not already know how important it is to support them, our eyes were soon opened. In the end, it is an insurance policy for all of us. On Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> May, local resident Eileen Hall will be doing a sponsored 'Wing Walk' in aid of the Air Ambulance.

Our next talk will be on Friday  $7^{\rm th}$  April, when we will hear Bill Owen talking about 'Shaftesbury's Abbey -600 years of history'. Michael Golberg

## Brookland Wood

Barry Roberts and I have now finished cutting a fresh patch of hazel at the Western side of the wood. Similar work in previous years has resulted in areas at different stages of regeneration, with more - or less - light reaching the ground vegetation and so creating a series of distinct wildlife habitats, a key aspect of coppice management. Some of the better rods will be used for hurdles; the heavier cuttings go as feedstock to the Dorset Charcoal Company with the proceeds helping to cover other costs of maintaining the wood. # Full Pink Moon - Tuesday 11th April

The Full Moon in April is traditionally called the Full Pink Moon as it was said to herald the appearance of one of the first Spring flowers — the grass pink orchid or wild ground phlox. It is also called the Sprouting Grass Moon, the Growing Moon and the Egg Moon. Many coastal tribes called it the Full Fish Moon because this was the time that fish swam upstream to spawn.



In 2017, this April Full Moon is also the Paschal Full Moon. Paschal ecclesiastical, rather than astronomical, term and derives from the Aramaic word meaning Passover. It is solely used to determine the date of Easter. Essentially, the Paschal Full Moon is the first Full Moon after the spring equinox (as long as the Full Moon is on or after 21 st March) and the first Sunday following the Paschal Moon is Easter Sunday. As April's Full Moon on 11th April is the first since the equinox, Easter Sunday in 2017 is indeed on 16<sup>th</sup> April. In 2016, the spring equinox was on 20<sup>th</sup> March. The following Full Moon was on Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> March, and so Easter Sunday was on 27<sup>th</sup> March. The earliest date that Easter can be is 



I was watching a professional gardener the other day, methodically and thoroughly removing moss and debris, accumulated over the winter, from a flower border. It was at the Hauser and Wirth meadow in garden Bruton, Somerset, which was designed by

The gardener was very happy to talk about the planting, explaining why there were no bulbs in flower (mice from an adjacent field had eaten the lot) and why the sedum in the bed he was tending hadn't grown since they were planted two years ago (the soil was too heavy and poorly drained - hence the moss). He was obviously a very talented gardener but I didn't envy his ongoing job the garden is  $1\frac{1}{2}$  acres and there are many, many hours of weeding and pruning ahead. Alison Main

Continuing our series of articles featuring Bedchester.

#### Bedchester - what's in a name?



There are three place name road signs for Bedchester. One is situated at the very top of Penn Hill and is actually in Sutton Waldron parish (the parish boundary with Fontmell Magna parish runs east to west between the last two properties towards the top of the hill so that the last one, Penn Hill House, is within Sutton Waldron). One sign is about half-way along the road from Woodbridge Mill to Bedchester Farm. However, both Woodbridge Mill and Woodbridge House would appear to be part of Bedchester, as are the houses in Woodbridge Lane. The third sign is on the road to Twyford, about 100m from Bedchester cross-roads. There is no sign on the road from Fontmell Magna village, though all the properties along Common Lane west of Piper's Mill would appear to be part of Bedchester. The picture shows the busy

fingerpost at Bedchester cross-roads (with incorrect spelling of Child Okeford). Bedchester is almost certainly of pre-conquest origin and may be referred to in the Saxon Charter of 932 (see below) as *beteswirpe*. The Saxon Charter traces the boundary of Fontmell Magna parish, granted by King Athelstan to the nunnery at Shaftesbury, and the reference to *beteswirpe* describes a point less than half a mile north of Bedchester crossroads. The first part *betes* could refer to a person's name, while the second *wirpe* could be the Saxon for 'enclosure'.


The Shaftesbury Register, compiled following the Domesday Book in 1086, refers to *Butesursta*, but experts think this is "probably erratic". Later references from 1354 are to *Bedeshurst* or *Bedeshurste*, and from 1395 are to *Bedyshurst*, and also *Bedehurst*. Here, the second part of the name appears to be derived from the Old English *hyrst* meaning copse or wooded hill.

Shaftesbury Abbey was dissolved in 1539 and its lands were eventually purchased by the Arundel family. From 1575, as evidenced in the earliest printed map of Dorset, by Christopher Saxton, the name becomes *Bedcister*, with occasional variations as late as the 19<sup>th</sup> century such as *Bedceister*, *Bicester*, or *Bedcester* and even *Bedhurst*. The change in the second part of the name is difficult to explain, but happened also to Hoggeshurst, near Bridport, which became Hogchester.

It was not until the second half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century that the name became *Bedchester*. From 1848 to 1939, a trade directory for Dorset was published every four or five years. It started life as the Post Office Directory and became Kelly's Directory. The early directories refer to *Bedcister*, and do not refer to *Bedchester* until the 1867 edition. The 1841 census refers to *Bedcester*, but the censuses from 1851 onwards refer to *Bedchester*.

The directories also consistently refer to *Bedchester* (or *Bedcister*) as "a Roman station", although no evidence can be found to substantiate this statement. Interestingly, Hogchester was thought to have been a Roman signal station, though a recent excavational dig there, which hoped to find evidence of a Roman road (the Ackling Dyke), was

unsuccessful.
