Fontmell Magna Neighbourhood Plan

The current pre-submission consultation runs until Monday 20th November, giving parish residents and other interested parties the opportunity to review the draft Plan and modify it, if necessary, to reflect residents' wishes. This acts as a final check before the Plan is submitted to the District Council for approval. The draft Plan and supporting documents can be found on the Parish Council website (www.fontmellmagnapc.co.uk). Paper copies of the Plan are also available at the Village Shop, the Surgery, the School Office and the Fontmell pub, for those unable to access the Plan online.

Two open meetings will be held in the Village Hall to present the draft Plan. These will be on Wednesday 1st November from 6.00pm and on Saturday 4th November between 10.00am and 4.00pm. Please come along and examine the proposals. You will be invited to complete a Questionnaire/ feedback form to give your views on the Plan content; a copy of the form is enclosed with this edition of the Gossip Tree. (Your name and address is requested on the questionnaire in order to validate that the response is from a parish resident and will not be disclosed in any way). All completed forms should be handed in to the Village Shop or sent by email to np@fontmellmagnapc.co.uk.

At the end of the consultation period (Monday 20th November), we will analyse all the feedback and, if necessary, re-draft the Plan. We will then submit it to the Parish Council for approval before submitting it to the District Council, who will organise its independent examination before organising a referendum.

North Dorset Wildlife Trust

Chasers, darters, skimmers, Emerald and Golden – just the names of these prehistoric aerial acrobats delight and intrigue. Dragonflies are spectacular airborne predators that can be found worldwide, and Dorset is home to many of the UK's 25 different species.

Our rare heathland habitat is particularly important to rarer species, including the Black Darter. The Emperor is the UK's largest and heaviest species (the B52 of the insect world) and this early summer arrival is easily identified around garden ponds by its vibrant turquoise and apple green colouring.

Unlike damselflies, the dragonfly has a robust body shape and is a fast flyer with eyes that are very large. Some, like the Hawkers, are very territorial and aggressive.

Climate change is already leading to species extending their range northwards, and Dorset is now becoming home to species that have not previously been recorded here. Hampshire dragonfly recorder, Pete Allen, will cover this interesting aspect in his talk on 'Dorset Dragonflies' on Wednesday 15th November at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. Refreshments are included in the £2 entry and there is no charge for children under 16. Everyone is welcome to attend our talks – membership of DWT is not essential.

'Open House' at St. Andrew's Church

For ten years now, from April to September each year, Coffee Mornings have been held in the Social Area at the back of St. Andrew's Church to which all villagers are invited and welcomed. Attendance is usually between 15 and 25 people and includes both those who are 'churchgoers' and those who are not.

During these past six months, we have welcomed an average of 20 people every Friday morning who have enjoyed each other's company over a cup (or two) of coffee (or tea or hot chocolate) and biscuits, and have had the opportunity to purchase a variety of home-grown produce. We do not make a specific charge for anything but donations towards the coffee, produce, etc. are always gratefully received. On the first Friday of the season, we also had a Stall of home-made cakes, preserves and 'Bring & Buy' on sale. Next year we hope to do this on two more Fridays during the summer.



During the winter months, because it is difficult and costly to heat the church to a comfortable level, we meet once a month in people's homes. The dates and venues for these Coffee Mornings are advertised on the church noticeboards, in The Gossip Tree, and in our Parish Magazine 'Valley Views'. We also meet in our Village Shop Tearoom on the third Tuesday of the month from October to March.

SO ... if you have not been to 'Open House' before, please do come along and join us – we would love to see you!

Late Summer Evening Concert

The church of St Andrew's, Fontmell Magna was full on Monday 2nd October to enjoy an evening of classical music presented by the Coda Youth Chamber Orchestra, Berlin and the Clayesmore School Chamber Choir. It was a mixed programme featuring music from the 17th century to the present day and mixed styles from Orchestral to Bagpipes and Choral music to Barbershop Group. Particular mention needs to be made of the soloists from the German orchestra who included a cello solo, a trumpet concerto and a combined cello and double bass performance of a modern piece of music.

The Clayesmore Barbershop Group provided us with some very entertaining numbers while the Pipe Band gave a full throttle performance of Scottish tunes. The choir and orchestra provided a very moving rendering of Fauré's 'Cantique de Jean Racine' and ended the concert with a rousing performance of Sir Karl Jenkins' 'Adiemus'.

Members of the audience were very appreciative of the skilful performances of these young people, many of whom, they felt, were destined for great things in the music world in the future. We are indeed fortunate to have a local school in the Benefice with such talented pupils and good overseas contacts whose performances we are privileged to enjoy.

Iwerne Valley Walking Group

September Walk – Hod Hill

On Saturday 23rd (a week late to allow for the Fontmell Fete), 11 people and 2 dogs attended our walk starting at the White Horse in Stourpaine. We had a gloriously sunny day and, as the walk was under three miles long, we went at a steady pace, enjoying the scenery and wildlife, including lots of Red Admiral butterflies as well as Speckled Wood and Large White and, amongst the flowers, mostly devils bit scabious, late knapweed and the yellow hawkbits. We wandered through this lovely village with its many thatched roof cottages, past the Duchess of Cornwall's sister's home, then along the River Iwerne before walking up to Hod Hill, an Iron Age fort which covers around 54 acres. It once protected a large population occupying at least 250 Round Houses, the foundations of many of which can still be seen. The Romans captured the fort in around 44 A.D., removing the settlement and building their own defences.



After reaching the top, one walker chose to go straight across the settlement while the rest of us walked around the right-hand inner rampart in an anticlockwise direction. We met at the other side and walked down the meadow to the right into the hazel coppice and wood leading

down to the river Stour. We followed a muddy path along the river coming round to the bottom of Hod Hill and back towards Stourpaine, where we had a look at its very well kept and documented church, the Holy Trinity. Then eight of us took advantage of the dog-friendly White Horse pub and its special deals for senior citizens - main course, dessert & coffee for only £11.95! This was a short walk but all the walkers were very appreciative, not least because of the wonderful weather.

Compost Corner



With autumn leaves falling, and lots of herbaceous material needing to be cleared, there is plenty of material to put on your compost heap. And what a useful source of organic material it is; every soil type be it clay, sand or loam

benefits from the addition of homemade compost.

Getting the right balance of composting material is important; it shouldn't be too dry or too wet - the recipe for good compost includes:

Vegetable peelings, fruit waste, teabags, plant prunings, chopped up tree leaves (do this with your lawn mower), grass cuttings, cardboard egg boxes, egg shells, scrunched up paper even shredded natural fibre clothes/ towels etc.

Do not add:

Any meat or dairy products, no diseased plants, no dog/cat poo, perennial weeds, weeds with seed heads.

Then, in maybe as little as six months, you could have some sweet smelling, friable compost to refresh your spring borders - and all for free. Alison Main

Woodbridge House



Woodbridge House appears to date from around 1800 and may have been built to house clergy. In the 1850's, the Rev. John Acton lived there before becoming the vicar of Iwerne Minster in 1860. He was followed by Henry Davis, Curate of East Orchard, with his wife, eight children and four servants. In 1867, the house was occupied by Alexander Codrington, gentleman, before he left to get married in 1869. It was then occupied by Mary Ann Pope, a widow of 65. From at least 1875, the house was occupied by the Glyns' land agent, George Carleton Day, and he continued to live there with his wife Clara until at least 1923. One of his final jobs was to arrange the erection of the War Memorial opposite the shop in 1920.

On his retirement, the house was sold to Alfred James Downes Simey (1875-1931). Alfred was born in Sunderland. In January 1900, he joined the Royal Irish Constabulary (RIC) as a cadet officer and was on duty at the time of Queen Victoria's visit to Ireland in April that year.

In 1901, he married Hilda Katherine Stillingfleet (1875-1970) while stationed at Tipperary. Like many of his colleagues, he signed up during the First World War and was given a temporary commission as Captain in the Army Service Corps from 18th December 1915 to 13th February 1919. Probably as a result of his police background, he was attached to the Military Police and was Assistant Provost Marshal for 6 Division on the Somme. In this capacity, he commanded firing squads on at least four occasions, for those sentenced to death

by Court Martial where there was no reprieve by the Commander-in-Chief (France), Sir Douglas Haig. There were over 300 executions in total, and Alfred carried out those of Private Harry Farr (18th October 1916), Sapper F. Malyon (4th April 1917), Private Wilfred Clarke (9th February 1918) and Private Joseph Nisbet (8th August 1918). He may also have commanded the firing squad for Private William Nelson (11th August 1916), and there may have been others.

After the war, Alfred rejoined the RIC, serving in Kerry (Kenmare) as District Inspector until disbandment in 1922. He died on 8th December 1931 from the effects of gas while on service in France during the war.

Alfred and Hilda's son, Cyril Stillingfleet Aylmer Simey, was born in 1905 and represented Great Britain at the 1928 Olympics in Amsterdam in the team foil event, though he did not come away with a medal. After serving in the army during the Second World War, he worked as a civil servant in Nigeria. During a visit back home, he went missing from a yacht in the English Channel on 18-19th September 1952 and was lost at sea.

Alfred and Hilda's daughter, Dorothy Victoria, married Gerald Fulton Richardson (1905-1980) of Child Okeford in 1936. They had three children: Michael, Caroline and Anthony. The family lived at the house with Hilda.

In 1972, the house was bought by Donald Ogilvy-Watson but he was forced to sell when he was unable to return to

the country from Singapore after allegations of insider trading at a company called Haw Paw. In 1977, Woodbridge House came onto the market, and was bought by the current owners.
