<u>Fontmell Magna Village Fete – Saturday 16th September</u>

Brookland Wood

For the last 5 years the Woodland Trust has been managing part of Brookland Wood by the traditional method of coppicing: i.e. cutting down some of the hazel stools each year in rotation to achieve a patchwork of areas at different stages of regrowth, with their associated diversity of wildlife habitats. While the Trust is motivated by nature conservation, coppicing has been practised commercially for millennia owing to the value of the wood that is harvested. Helped by other enthusiasts I have been cutting a patch each winter, making some of the rods into hurdles while selling beanpoles, pea-sticks and kindling wood in aid of the Trust. By a happy coincidence the annual yield of timber too heavy for such purposes neatly equates to a full truck-load of feedstock for the Dorset Charcoal Company! The Trust is paid in charcoal, which it is now selling wholesale to the Village Shop. Please buy it for your BBQ. While we can't guarantee that every sack will actually have come from Brookland, you can be assured that it will have been produced locally and from a 3rd World rain forest.

There are winners all round from this arrangement. The Trust gets its habitat managed and a return from the sales; wildlife gets the habitats; and three local businesses - my own, the Shop and the Charcoal Company - are supported. All we need now is some sunny weather!

Village Shop, Post Office & Tea Room

We would like to thank all customers for their continued support of the village shop. We regularly research suppliers in order to try and get the best deals on products but as you may or may not know Tesco has bought out our main wholesaler and we have had to diversify even more! In order to do this we continually try and source local products and you'll see notices in the shop stating 'local'.

We use local businesses wherever possible in order to help keep our local economy flourishing. An example of this is a deal we have in place with Prime Cuts butchers in Shaftesbury. You can order and collect from us here at the shop and you won't pay a penny difference as we receive a discount at source enabling us to save you money and time travelling!

Just to remind you, we also continue to provide a dry cleaning and laundry agency service for Barkers Group. Again, this service enables you to drop and collect here rather than having to go to Shaftesbury. We received a notification on 1st August that Blackmore Vale Dairy would no longer be supplying milk. We now have to get our milk where we can in order to meet the demand and at a cost that remains the same to you and us. To this end we now stock Cotteswold milk. Since the Brexit vote we have found that a lot of products have increased in price on the suppliers' shelves and in some cases have risen by 15%. We try very hard not to pass this cost on to our customers and hope that by sourcing other brands we can even reduce the cost of your shopping.

We have now installed a chest freezer and hope to increase our stock of frozen and chilled products. This is in line with retail trends but more particularly in our case because our upright shop freezer blew up! The tea room and Post Office businesses continue to grow, albeit slowly and again we thank you for using these facilities. We have a free book exchange here so please come in and see if you'd like a book to take home or even sit with a cup of tea and peruse the shelves. We haven't forgotten flowers and plants that you regularly ask for. We are trying to negotiate a deal with a new supplier and hope this will be sooner rather than later.

We would like to thank our staff and volunteers once again for their very hard work and especially agreeing to cover for us when we're away. Our next break is between the 9th - 16th of September and the shop, post office and tea room's opening hours will be as follows:

Sat 9th - 9.00am to 12 noon Sun 10th - closed Mon 11th, Tue 12th & Wed 13th - 9.00am to 4.30pm Thur 14th & Fri 15th - 9.00am to 5.30pm

Sat 16th & Sun 17th - 9.00am to 12 noon

Normal hours resume from Monday 18th onward. Last but not least we would like to thank you all for your support.

'Number 11'...A fine effort

[']Effort' being the operative word for our 11th Village Archive Exhibition - effort from the exhibition team in providing over 21 displays of Fontmell's land use since earliest times. Dave Hardiman showed how the village developed from AD 932 – 1539, ably backed by 'Enclosures' compiled by Gay Mole, and 'Major Agricultural Developments' on which the village depended, by Carl Johnston. Chris Bellers provided an interesting map of the parish boundary stones of which 23 have so far been identified, although two seem to have been lost and one was definitely stolen in 2000, near to the Gore Clump car park on Fontmell Down (probably by someone appropriating it for their garden).

Chris also researched and explained the custom of 'beating the bounds' for us. Essential in past times to confirm visually in the minds of parish residents, landowners and apparently the parish priest, who exactly owned what land on the edges of the parish.

The display of dozens of items found in Alison Main's garden at Cross House was a stroke of genius, as was the loan of a genuine chest-mounted hand 'fiddle' for broadcasting grain, lent by the Westgates. Overheard was "They've been in the village long enough to have used it, I'm sure"!

Leafing through the comments in the Visitors' Book, one notices how many appreciated the huge amount of information on show. Thinking ahead 50 to 100 years from now, how future local historians and residents will bless the Society's present and past ten years of exhibition teams who every two years have spent much time on compiling this valuable research, which is always carefully retained in the archive collection. They won't be around to receive the plaudits of course, but they can rest assured there will be many of them. John Gadd

Iwerne Valley Walking Group

Our midsummer walk was a repeat of one done a couple of years ago. Fifteen of us gathered in the car park at Bere Regis on a fine clear warm sunny evening, a perfect start to our walk. From there the walk took us along beside the River Bere to the delightfully named Shitterton. And from there the path took us across the meadows and up to the top of the ridge which separates the Bere valley from the Piddle valley. The path then ran west above the main road which could be heard below then down into the Piddle valley with lovely views across it. We stopped half way down for our picnic supper, taken sitting on the grass in the sunshine. We had a visit from a local horse and rider whilst eating. From here we carried on down to the bottom of the valley and then along to the hamlet of Throop where there is a redundant church. From Throop, it was up the hill again towards Bere. Along the way, we passed a standing stone called the Devil's Stone or the Five Fingered Stone. It is megalithic in origin and was used by the Romans as a road marker as they had a road running past it. From there it was downhill back to Bere, passing the school and across the river.

<u>Full Corn Moon – Wednesday 6th September</u>

Keen readers of The Gossip Tree will notice that, this time last year, the Full Moon in September was the Full Harvest Moon. This year, however, the Full Harvest Moon is in October. This is because the Harvest Moon is the Moon that falls nearest the autumn equinox which is on Friday 22nd September (the Full Harvest Moon will therefore be on Thursday 5th October).



The September Full Moon is the Full Corn Moon because it traditionally corresponds with the time of harvesting corn. It is also called the Barley Moon, for a similar reason.

September is a good time to view both Neptune and Mercury. On Tuesday 5th September, Neptune will be at its closest approach to Earth and its face will be fully illuminated by the Sun. It will be brighter than any other time of the year and will be visible all night long. On Tuesday 12th September, Mercury will be at its highest point above the horizon in the morning sky. Weather permitting, it should be visible low in the eastern sky just before sunrise.

Compost Corner

Narcissus have got to be one of the best garden plants: varieties can flower from Christmas to late spring, they are cheap to buy, easy to care for and are relatively pest and disease free. Garden centres will

now have a wide

range of Narcissus bulbs in stock and unlike some bulbs they should be planted as soon as possible.

As a rough guide, they should be planted at least $1\frac{1}{2}$ times their own depth; if they are planted too near the surface of the soil, they are more unlikely to flower.

There will be dozens of varieties from which to choose - here are a few suggestions:

For fragrance - Narcissus 'Cheerfulness'

Early flowering - Narcissus 'Rijnveld's Early Sensation'

Multiple flowers - Narcissus 'Grand Soleil d'Or'

Late flowering - Narcissus poeticus var. recurvus

White flowers - Narcissus 'Ice Follies' Short stemmed - Narcissus 'Minnow'

And very importantly, once they have flowered, leave the foliage to die down for 6 weeks and then enjoy year after year. Alison Main

Well and Bede Cottages (68 and 69 Hampton Gate)



The 1774 Ingham map shows there to be dwellings where these cottages are today, and it is likely that the cottages date back to at least the date of the map. However, neither are listed buildings. They both appear to have been named Hampton Gate, indicating that a toll gate may It is not originally have been here. known why they were named Hampton this name does not appear on the 1774 map or, indeed, any other map. The 1851 census names four different families living at Hampton: Thomas Barton, age 60, a widower and farmer of 60 acres; Joseph Wright, 46, an agricultural labourer and his wife Ann

and four children; James Spicer, a shoemaker, and his wife Susan (James died in 1856); and John and Ann Toomer (though the Toomers actually lived at 72 Penn Hill). Well Cottage (68 Hampton Gate)

From around 1877, the Chaldecott family was living there. Thomas Chaldecott was born in 1843 in Mappowder and became the miller there. He married Julia Ann Vardy (1845-1917) who was born in Yetminster. In the 1871 census, Thomas is recorded as a 'journeyman' miller living at Yetminster. At Bedchester, he may have helped at Piper's Mill or Woodbridge Mill.

Between 1869 and 1883, Thomas and Julia had 9 children, though two died young. The family were still at the cottage for the 1891 census (Thomas was described as a 'Grinder', rather than miller). The cottage appears to have been empty at the 1901 census, but this may have been because all their children had left home and Thomas and Julia were visiting their daughter Florence, now married to Albert Harvey, a gamekeeper, in Evershot. By the 1911 census, Thomas (still described as a miller) and Julia were living at 63 West Street.

In 1911, the cottage was occupied by Emily Cross Matthews, 35, single, 'monthly' nurse, born in Slowford, Devon. In the 1919 Glyn sale, the cottage was Lot 90 and was let to Mr I. Baker. He shared the well next door at Bede Cottage (as did George Bradley at 71 Penn Hill). Lot 90 was bought by Mr F. Sykes. More recent occupiers were Roy Scammell, the Westlakes and the Wallaces.

Bede Cottage (69 Hampton Gate)

By 1891, the cottage was occupied by the Coombes family. William Stephen Coombes (1836-1910) was an agricultural labourer. In the 1881 census, he was living in North Street with his wife Susannah nee Still (1854-1928). With them were his children: Ellen (born 1859), Annie (1862-1907), both glovers and James (born 1873). Susannah must have been William's second wife. By 1891, William was a carpenter's labourer, and there were two other children: Frederick T. (born 1886) and Mary Elizabeth (1888-1941). Two children had also been born, and died, in 1880.

By 1901, William was an estate labourer, Frederick was a thatcher's labourer and Mary a domestic servant, and there was another son, Henry George (born 1893). William died in 1910. In 1911, only Susannah, now a laundress, and Henry George, a labourer, were living there. In the 1919 Glyn sale, the cottage was Lot 89 and was let to Susannah. It was this property that had the well, and not next door. Lot 89 was purchased by Mr J. W. Baker, although Susannah continued to live here until her death in December 1928, aged 75.

Later, the cottage was occupied by the Spicers. When Margaret Galpin retired from running the shop in the 1960s, she lived in Bede Cottage for a few years before she died in 1971.

<u>Barbara Gadd</u>

Beloved and loyal wife of John Gadd for 62 years, and mother of Alison who lives in Iwerne, died peacefully aged 87 on Sunday 20th August from complications after a bad fall on 2nd August. More next month.

<u>Neighbourhood Plan</u>

The Working Group met on Thursday 17th August for the 20th time and agreed 'final' changes to the draft Neighbourhood Plan. This draft has now been given to the Parish Council.

At its meeting on Monday 11th September, the PC will decide whether to approve the draft plan so that the Group can start the 'Neighbourhood Plan Pre-submission Consultation.' This involves a six week public consultation period which offers a last opportunity at parish level to comment on and influence the Plan before it is submitted to NDDC. The Group will let you know when this consultation period starts, and what options you have to let the Group know your views. Dick Stainer
