Systems were costed - ground heat source was tricky (dodging the graves), heat pump hideously expensive, so the replacement oil boiler will cost around £7,000.

Mrs Gillian Rouse gave the appeal an amazing start by donating £1,000 (+Gift Aid). Her husband Martin, who died last year, was Churchwarden here for nearly 30 years while Gillian was a flower arranger. She says he would have been organising the appeal himself if he was still here! They bought Fontmell House in the 1960's - locals recall their wonderful summer parties in the grounds - moving to Blandford in 2010. Iwerne Valley Walking Club

Our walk on Saturday 21st April started at Garston Wood car park, Sixpenny Handley. Seventeen people and three dogs somehow managed to shoehorn their cars into the tiny carpark where we were to begin the walk. We chose lunch and sent a willing husband back to the Roebuck Inn with our order for a 12.45pm return. Just as we were ready to set off at 10.15am another walking club arrived – sadly they all had to park in the road!

We had a gentle walk up Pribdean Wood; the trees were beginning to show their leaves, giving us dappled shade at the top - and we could hear a cuckoo calling. Crossing the field, we skirted the farm buildings and dropped down to Deanland. Following a narrow path down the side of the hill, we came to the main road, following it briefly for 50 yards before passing a pond, then through a gate and into the tiny hamlet of New Town.

We had a long but gentle walk through Hill Coppice up to Draw Coppice before turning into Foxberry Lower Hedge, dropping down to Shermel Gate. From there we took the path up to Mistleberry Wood. Primroses lined the paths with the wonderful

perfume of wild garlic making us feel very hungry as we reached towards Sessions Gate where the bluebells took over and we could see rivers of blue. On the left-hand side of the wood we could see very young lambs in the fields.

We arrived back at the car park in 2½ hours having walked about 4 miles accompanied only by the wonderful sound of birdsong and all in beautiful sunshine. Our walk had been entirely devoid of stiles, cars and people. Pam Payne

8,000.....and counting

Since we gave you news that Fontmell Magna's John Gadd had written a major textbook 'Modern Pig Production Technology', especially for the Chinese pig industry (and published in Mandarin, of course), John has revealed that, in its first year, over 8,000 copies have been sold. So, to point the farmer in the right direction, John checked on Amazon and Abe books, only to find them listed at £909 to £2,200 for one and £818 to £3,632 for the other, with one offered at £5,086!

John hastens to say that he is not as famous as that! What happens is that when a book goes out of print/out of stock, dealers fix a "Nobody will pay that price" to discourage potential buyers from bothering them, at least until the publishers reissue the volume. So, if you come across a silly price or two online - that's the reason.

Village weather for April 2018





A wet start, then a week of summer before ending into cooler April showers.

4 ground frost. 0 air frost. 15 rain days. 2 days thunder. I hail. No gales.

Like March, April was a particularly wet month. In fact, it was the wettest April since 1988 (when Fontmell records began) other than April 2000, when 186.6 mm fell. The maximum temperature on 19th April was also unusually high, although 25.6 °C was recorded on 17th April 2003, and several consecutive days in April 2011 had high temperatures going up to 25.8 °C.

Looking ahead, 8th June is the feast day of St. Medardus and it is said that, as with St. Swithun's Day (15th July), whatever the weather on his feast day, it will continue for the forty days following **unless** the weather changes on the feast of St. Barnabus (11th June).

Full Moon - Thursday 28th June

The Full Moon in June is known as the Full Strawberry Moon as it coincides with the peak of the strawberry harvesting season. The moon is also known as the Full Rose Moon and the Full Honey Moon.

Also this month, Thursday 21st June is the June solstice, the first day of summer and the longest day of the year. On Wednesday 27th June, Saturn will be at its closest approach to Earth and its face will be fully illuminated by the Sun. It will be brighter than any other time of the year and will be visible all-night long. A medium-sized or larger telescope will allow you (clouds permitting) to see Saturn's rings and a few of its brightest moons.

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You may have come across 'Garden Escapees' on your travels. No, not mutinous gardeners escaping from weeding, but garden plants that become have established in the countryside. One such plant is the beautiful, dazzling

blue, evergreen Agapanthus which can be found in western Cornwall. They originated from Africa but have very happily established themselves in the mild south western climate and an amazing spectacle they are too.

In Norway, up in the mountains, lupins have colonised vast swathes of land, they look stunning but are so successful that they have now become a real problem. Hailing from America, they were originally introduced along roads and railway lines to combat soil erosion but rapidly spread and are now considered a major problem.

Japanese knotweed is a plant that was introduced in Victorian times to Britain for its striking size and racemes of white flowers but with disastrous results - its shoots are so strong that they can penetrate concrete - if it's on your land and you fail to control it, you could be faced with a hefty fine.

Well, Lupins certainly won't be taking over our garden - despite successfully propagating loads of them from seed when they reached a few inches high, over one warm spring night, the whole lot were eaten by snails; it was as though they'd never been.

Perhaps they don't have many snails in Norway. Alison Main

Targeted for burglary?

Recently, two houses in Bedchester had a white stone left outside the property. This could be some sort of marker system that burglars use to highlight properties that they think are unoccupied. The occupiers removed the stones and advised Dorset Police, in case there is a pattern in the area. Anyone coming across anything similar should do the same. Chalk marks on the road outside your property should also be viewed with suspicion.

Pipers Mill

Recently, a visitor to the village shop asked what the building was by the stream (Fontmell Brook) at the northern end of Brookland Wood. There is a substantial section of stone wall laying across the stream, and evidence of the remains of more building on the other side of the stream. The answer is that the stonework was at one time a sluice or weir for the mill leat to Pipers Mill. The course of the leat can still be seen, though much has been filled in.



The view in this picture from Pipers Mill towards the east, through the archway where the waterwheel once turned, shows where the mill pond was; the course of the leat follows to the right of the fencing stretching all the way to the north of Brookland Wood and runs parallel to Fontmell Brook.

It is not known exactly how long there has been a mill at Pipers Mill. The current building dates from only about 1795 (it was advertised as 'new-built' in the Salisbury Journal of 9th November 1795).

It was probably used as a grist mill for processing animal feed stuffs. Earlier in the 18th century the miller was James Lawrence but, on his death in 1788, his wife Barbara took over the running of the mill and the replacement of the old mill house with a new one.

James and Barbara's son, John Lawrence (1786-1865), became the miller but provided another link between Fontmell and Newfoundland (discussed in Issue 284, October 2017). In 1810, he crossed the Atlantic to Newfoundland where he met his wife Jane, the daughter of a merchant then active in trade with England. They were married in 1815 in Bonavista and then decided to return to Fontmell, where they had four children. Jane did not survive the birth of their fifth child and was buried here in 1822, aged 26.

John and Jane's eldest son, also called John (born 1817) also travelled to Bonavista where he married Ellen Strathie in 1843. They had ten children in Newfoundland, and later in Nova Scotia. John's younger brother, Joseph Feltham Lawrence (1820-1895), took over the mill. He married Mary Ann Baker in 1845. In his will, dated 1895, he left a sum of money in trust "for the children of my deceased brother John, now living in Newfoundland."



Mary died 1893 and when Joseph died childless in 1895, the mill passed to his wife's family in the form of James William Baker. James must have been friends with William Jesse of Woodbridge Mill – on William's death in 1905, James acted as an executor of his will and had some responsibility for his children's upbringing (their mother having died earlier).

The Glyn sale particulars of 1926, Lot 96, described the mill premises as being "stone built with tiled roof", with three floors containing, on the ground floor, a store house and meal house (with two bins). The fixed machinery included an Overshot Water Wheel, pit wheel, flywheel and spare wheel for gear. On the second floor were 12 Grunters (or bins).

The whole property was withdrawn from sale and was then included as Lot 1 in the 1927 Glyn sale. James Baker appears to have bought the property; in 1928, he arranged for an Armfield water turbine to be fitted in November that year when the water wheel ceased to work.

The 1931 Kelly's Directory records the owner as being Colonel Waldron Harold Fletcher Kelly D.S.O. In September 1940, he was put in command of Fontmell Magna Platoon of the Shaftesbury Company of the Home Guard. On 1st December 1943, he reached the age limit (65) and had to relinquish his command and leave the Home Guard.

By 1962, the mill was derelict. The 1963 Mill Survey notes that the mill had a stone pentrough and iron shutter. Unusually, the spur wheel was 4-armed (most were 6-armed). The wheel had such large cants that it appeared almost solid. The mill also had a seven-armed crown wheel (most mills had six-armed wheels).

The 1972 RCHME inventory for North Dorset lists the building as: "a corn mill of two storeys with attics, has ashlar walls and a tiled roof", illustrated by a photograph showing the structure in good order externally, much as it is today.... The ashlar is of good quality, with a plain plinth and a moulded eaves cornice. The mill-race has segmental-headed openings on the N. and S.; other openings have flat arches. Inside, the water-wheel has gone, but much of the original machinery remains. The mill-pond, now dry, has ashlar retaining walls".

The mill building remains much the same today. Chris Bellers, Archive Society
