To the north, as we walked on Nine Barrow Down, we had views over Poole Bay with Bournemouth in the hazy distance; to the south, we could see the hills above Swanage and the valley below filled with campers and cows and the occasional puff from the steam train.

Village weather for July 2019



Dry weather continued from June for another two weeks, then a little rain followed by a heat wave, thunder and spectacular lightening. Some proper rain and back to a dry sunny end to the month.

7 rain days. 1 day thunder. No gales, frost or hail.

According to the Met Office, for most of the first half of the month, high pressure brought mostly dry weather with plentiful sunshine. The second half was generally more unsettled with frequent westerly and south-westerly winds, but with an exceptionally hot spell from the 22nd to 26th which saw record-breaking temperatures in many parts of the country including, on 25th July, for the UK as a whole (38.7 °C).

National record high temperatures were also set in Germany (with 42.6°C, 2°C higher than the previous record), Belgium (41.8°C), Luxembourg (40.8°C) and the Netherlands (40.7°C). On 28th July, Helsinki set a station record of 33.2°C while, on 14th July, the world's most northerly settlement (Alert in northern Canada, 500 miles from the North Pole) recorded 21°C, compared with its average July high of 7°C. Greenland suffered dramatic ice melting – 12.5 billion tonnes of ice melted into the sea on 1st August, more than any other day on record and reaching parts of Greenland that typically stay frozen all year round.

Globally, July was the hottest of any month. Alarmingly, there is no natural explanation for this heat – there was no El Niño warming of the Pacific that could have injected extra heat into the atmosphere, and the sun is at very low activity in its roughly 11-year solar cycle.

Full Moon - Saturday 14th September

This Full Moon is the Harvest or Full Corn Moon and is the Full Moon that occurs closest to the September equinox each year. This year, the September Equinox is on Monday 23rd September. As well as signifying nearly equal amounts of day and night, the Equinox is also the first day of autumn.

On Monday 9th September, Neptune will be at its closest approach to Earth and its face will be fully illuminated by the Sun. Although it will be brighter than any other time of the year, because of its extreme distance from Earth, it will only appear as a tiny blue dot in all but the most powerful telescopes. **Compost Corner**

Any surplus produce was made into chutneys, relishes, jams and jellies or bottled for use over the winter months. Carrots were kept in sand, onions dried and tied to ropes, and sacks of potatoes were stored in their dark shed. Early autumn sowings were also made of winter salads, perpetual spinach and broad beans. It all involved a lot of work but the family was kept fed and healthy for the long war years they endured. William George Tuffin (1840-1925)

The Archive Society recently received an email from Phil Tovey in Australia. He wanted to know whether he might still have some ancestors in Fontmell. He is related to the Tuffin family, of which there were several branches in the 19th century and early 20th. His great, great grandfather, William George Tuffin, emigrated to Australia with his wife Lydia Winifred (née Read) and two daughters, Ethel and May Tuffin, aged 2 and 1. The family sailed from London in July 1878 and arrived in Rockhampton in Queensland, Australia. Unfortunately, the two daughters died on board, apparently from measles.

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Some time after, although it is not clear why, William changed the family name from Tuffin to Tovey. He and Lydia went on to have another two daughters, Ethel May Lydia and Alice Maud Victoria and a son, William Arthur Victor.

William's parents were Philip George Tuffin (1817-1878) and Hannah, née Dennis (1820-1855). In all, they had six daughters and three sons, although one daughter died aged six months and one aged four. Their last daughter, Mary Ellen, also died after a few months, shortly after her mother Hannah, both of them in the Shaftesbury workhouse. They were both buried in St Andrew's Churchyard. Philip later married Martha Toomer (1817-1903) but had no further children.

Philip was the son of Henrietta Lawrence Tuffin (1792-1871), the daughter of Hannah Lawrence (1761-1826) and James Tuffin (1762-1822). Some time after Philip's birth, Henrietta married Abel Hunt (1792-1841) and they had a son, John Alford Hunt (1831-1873).

In the 1841 census, Henrietta and John Hunt were listed as living at 'Sands'. Sands was the name given to two farm labourers' cottages at the northern end of the parish (now 1 and 2 North Street). They are close to the farm that they served, Manor Farm. Henrietta and John were still there in 1851 and 1861. In 1851, Philip and Hannah Tuffin with seven children (including William) were somewhere in Lurmer Street but, in 1861, they were living next door to Henrietta and John, next to Edwin Miles (who was the farmer at Manor Farm at the time) -William was a lodger elsewhere, but it is unclear where in the parish he was. By 1871, Philip and Martha had moved somewhere in Bedchester and William was in Wales where he married Lydia and had two daughters. Chris Bellers, Fontmell Magna Village Archive Society

Understanding your food dates

In general, food law requires pre-packed food to have a date mark. Depending on the food type this is either a 'use by' date or a 'best before' date.

The 'use by' date is about safety and is the most important date to remember. Food with a use by date goes off quickly even if it is stored correctly and looks and smells fine. You find it on food such as meat products or ready-prepared salads. Food can be eaten up until the use by date but should not be eaten after the date has passed. Most food, including meat and milk, can be frozen up until the use by date too. The food can then be defrosted and eaten at a later date. In these circumstances the use by date will no longer apply, but the food will still be a type of food that goes off quickly so should be eaten quickly once defrosted. For the use by to be a valid guide you must carefully follow storage instructions.

The 'best before' date is about quality and not safety. The food will be safe to eat after this date but the food may no longer be at its best. Its flavour and texture for example might not be as good. The best before date appears on a wide range of frozen, dried, tinned and other foods. The best before date will only be accurate if the food is stored according to the instructions on the label.

Shops can sell food once the 'best before' date has passed. However, selling food past its 'use by' date is a criminal offence and can lead to prosecution. Dorset Council Trading Standards would like to know if you find someone selling food past its use by date.
