Parish Council Meeting – 11th November 2019 at 7.00pm

Present: Cllrs Michael Humphreys (MH) (Chair), Jeremy Long (JL), Annie Newbury (AN), and Clerk Marianne Wheatley (MW), DC Ward Cllr Jane Somper and 10 residents. **Apologies** – None **Declarations of Interest** – None

Public Questions:

Concern was raised about the blocked drains along most Village roads, particularly Mill St, Lurmer St, West St and Church St; the PC will request Highways to clear the drains.

Residents expressed a strong desire to acquire the BT Telephone Box in Church St.

A question was raised about faded road repair markings in West St that had not seen actual repairs; Highways will be asked to make repairs.

Road signs on the A350 had become obscured by vegetation; Highways will be asked to clear

Election of Chair – Michael Humphreys was elected Chair, and Jeremy Long elected Vice-Chair.

Co-options

With the current complement of just 3 councillors it was decided to reduce the frequency of PC meetings to four per year until more councillors are available. Thus in 2020 meetings will be held in March, May, September, December, and special meetings called as necessary to deal with any urgent matters.

Minutes and Matters Arising – minutes of 2nd September meeting were approved. **VE Day 75th Anniversary** – Barry Roberts outlined the plans for events on 8th May 2020. This is a combined effort by the Village Hall Committee, the Parochial Church Council and the Springhead Trust. Events will include a church service, games for children, lunch in Church St., a street parade. More details to follow. The PC will arrange for road closures, insurance and a temporary event license.

Parish Council Website – The PC is required by law to maintain an effective website. It was agreed in principle to spend c.£1,000 in upgrading the PC website, so that it is compliant with accessibility legislation and is supported fully in the future. The first stage to be initiated will be the of a design a new site.

Trees & Verges at Bedchester Crossroads – Work will go ahead to prune the Lime Tree. Discrete posts will be installed to reduce further erosion of the verge.

Farm Access in Mill Street – No further work has been undertaken on this development. However the large ditch is full of water and inadequately fenced from the adjoining footpath. DC will be contacted to address the flood risk and safety concerns with the landowner.

Dorset County Ward Councillor's Report

A presentation will be held on 5th December for local parishes on the priorities for the next four years and seeking views.

Highways are trialling a new micro-surface treatment for residential roads to fill cracks and holes.

DC has agreed that young people who have spent time in foster or residential care will be exempt from paying Council Tax. DC is working with the Dorset Community Foundation to help people in fuel poverty.

DC has declared a climate change emergency. A seminar will be held on 19th November to give advice on measures to reduce carbon emissions and what support will be available from DC.

DC is consulting on the working relationship it should have with Town and Parish Councils.

Reports from Parish Councillors

a. Planning – MH reported that the PC raised no objection to planning applications for the Chapel on Church St, Bedchester House and Little Hartgrove Farm. The PC will object to the application for Fernlea Cottage, Mill St, as the proposed hayloft dormer style window above the toilet is too large and is incongruous in this domestic setting; the PC believe this is contrary to Policy FM9 in the Neighbourhood Plan which deals with Building Design.

The PC agreed to purchase the BT Telephone Box in Church St as a heritage asset; potential uses include a library, information hub, gallery.

- **b.** Trees The PC had no objection to tree works at 27 Lurmer St, Charlies Cottage, 27 Orchard Close, 66 West St, 4 Orchard Close.
- c. Highways JL will attend a meeting of the A350 Community Group on 22nd January; there is a potential request for £250 for pollution monitoring equipment.
 d. Environmental Protection AN reported a successful parish litter pick on 3rd November with two dozen people turning out; the next litter pick is scheduled for February.

e. Social Infrastructure – AN reported on plans for the Village Hall Christmas Fayre on 30th November; hopefully this event will be well supported. Dick Stainer provided an update on the FM Community Land Trust and possible support for the Village Shop: a liaison group is being formed to take forward the idea of a community hub combining the Village Hall and Surgery, JL will represent the PC on this group.

The idea of installing an electric vehicle charging point at the Village Hall is being explored.

f. District Liaison – MH reported on a recent DC workshop discussing the relationship between DC and town/parish councils; DC's proposals will be published in February.

g. Footpaths – JL will monitor footpaths around the parish.

h. Governance – MW described recent updates to the PC's policies and governing documents. Revised versions were approved and will be placed on the website www.fontmellmagnapc.co.uk

Report from the RFO

MW reported the current balance is £10,982.

A draft budget for 2020/21 was discussed, with projected expenditure of £9,471 in the financial year. It was agreed to spread the cost of the web site upgrade over two years to limit the increase in the precept and consequently the precept was set at £9,000 for 2020/21, compared to £8,500 for 2019/20.

Other Matters

War Memorial Gate – its condition will be examined and repairs instigated if necessary.

Climate Change Emergency – the PC decided to declare a climate emergency, joining many other towns and parishes in Dorset.

The meeting closed at 8.35pm. The next scheduled meeting of the Parish Council will be Monday 9th March 2020 at 7.00pm in the School Hall.

1st November - Commander Vernon Phillips- "Royal Navy Hovercraft in the Falklands 52 Years Ago"

Mention the Falklands Islands to anyone of a certain generation and they will immediately think of the 1982 war; but as Commander Vernon Phillips showed in his fascinating talk, evidence of the conflict was there long before.

In 1966 a group of Argentinian protesters hijacked an aeroplane, landed it on Stanley racecourse and briefly held a number of the Islanders captive. The Royal Navy decided to send out a hovercraft team to enable the Royal Marines stationed on the Islands to move swiftly to defend any settlement under attack.

The Commander and his team spent a year there, then handed over to a new team, after which incursions began.

This was a beautifully illustrated talk, using slides that the speaker had forgotten about until unearthing them in an attic. They showed the outstanding scenery with lots of sunshine and amiable King Penguins.

Compost Corner

I was listening to a radio programme recently all about artificial grass and its possible effect on the environment when another issue popped up in the discussion: how it is becoming quite common for people to request gardening companies to remove all berries from

their shrubs and trees - why? - to discourage birds from their gardens and the consequent soiling of their York stone patios. Perhaps the next trend will be to have artificial shrubs with lovely plastic berries.

The bird population in the UK has declined by 44 million since 1966. Some species now increasing in numbers, like are sparrows (which had been in decline for several years) but others, like the turtle dove, are rarely seen. We can help birds by putting out feeders but they instinctively prefer natural food like berries and seeds. In our garden, one of the most popular berries that blackbirds particularly like is the common laurel, Pyracantha is another favourite - I remember once making a Christmas wreath for my door from pyracantha berries but then, some bird with not a hint of festive cheer, gobbled the lot.

So if you're struggling to think of Christmas presents, why not choose a berrying shrub or tree (a real one!) - and what's more, it's the ideal time to plant one.
