Goodbye Chris, Hello Problem!

As you may be aware, the Chair of our Parish Council, Chris Bellers, has stepped down and moved away from the parish. We're sure you would wish to join us in thanking Chris for all he has contributed to our neighbourhood over many years – not just the Parish Council, but the Fontmell Archive Society, St Andrew's Church bell ringers, and as editor of The Gossip Tree.

With Chris' departure the Parish Council now has just three councillors. This is the minimum number of councillors for a quorum of the Parish Council, for meetings and decision-making. Therefore if one of the councillors is unavailable for any reason it won't be possible to hold a PC meeting or to make any progress with council activities. With this in mind the PC is proposing to reduce the frequency of council meetings to quarterly intervals.

Please will you consider joining the Parish Council at this important time in the development of our community so that it can continue to function effectively. Our team is energetic, hard-working, forward thinking and committed to improving community facilities and amenities, but we do need your help. Fontmell Magna's Neighbourhood Plan came into its own a year ago, with its formal adoption into the planning process by Dorset Council. It brings a local dimension to planning, and was also an opportunity for Fontmell Magna to highlight the importance of local community amenities.

This was the impetus for a small group to set up a vehicle which could manage these amenities, and to this end Fontmell Magna Community Land Trust (CLT) was established, with its formal registration with the FCA in May this year. A CLT is a form of community-led organisation, run by ordinary people, which is able to develop and manage homes and other assets important to the community, such as shops, pubs, workplaces, or food growing enterprises.

Whilst many CLT's are just involved in affordable housing, it was evident at the inaugural meeting of FMCLT on the 20th May that there was concern in the village over the future of our village shop, and this was reported in detail in June's Gossip Tree. The CLT therefore set up a working group (the Village Shop Group, or VSG) to examine options for a shop to serve the community of Fontmell Magna and the surrounding area. The VSG has done a lot of useful work, including the survey, as was reported in the last edition of the Gossip Tree.

The CLT is obliged to hold a **Special General Meeting** within six months of its registration, and this meeting will be at 7.30pm on Wednesday the 30th October, in the Village Hall.

After the conclusion of the formal meeting, members of the VSG will present their findings on the options for a village shop, after which light refreshments will be provided.

All residents of Fontmell Magna and neighbouring villages are warmly invited to come to this meeting. Although only people who have become members (by subscribing to £25 of shares in the CLT) will be able to vote on resolutions put to the meeting.

The CLT has already attracted over eighty subscribers, and the Directors hope that many more will join to ensure that the community is well represented.

The Directors of the CLT are Dick Stainer, Robin East, Jim Highnam, Robert McCurrach and Roger Thomas.

Climate Change Emergency

We are all becoming increasingly aware of Climate Change; the school strikes by young people and the protests by Extinction Rebellion have made headline news.

Town and Parish Councils across Dorset are joining Dorset Council in declaring a Climate Change Emergency. Fontmell Magna Parish Council will discuss whether to make this declaration at its next meeting on **Monday 11th November**.

There would be little point in making a declaration unless it is followed up with positive actions to reduce the carbon footprint of the Parish. Initiatives could include tree planting, switching to green energy supply, improving home insulation, reducing use of plastics, reducing litter, rewilding, car sharing, etc.

Farewell to those sadly missed:

Lieutenant General Sir Hugh Patrick Cunningham KBE. (4th Nov 1921 - 2 Sept2019).

A Thanksgiving service was held at St Andrew's View on 2nd October with family and many friends.

Hugh was born in Campletown on the Kyntre Penisula, but grew up in Madras, India, before returning to boarding school in England as a young lad. In 1939 he joined the Army and by 1945 had fought in the jungles of New Guinea & Burma - at the young age of 24! He married his wife, Jill—meeting her on a 'blind date' in 1955 and they went on to have 4 children; John, Richard, Susan & Caroline. After many assignments abroad, he was promoted to Major General in 1971, and three years later to Lieutenant General and knighted for his service. After the loss of Jill in 1992, he married Zoe and lived in Fontmell Magna for 24 years. Hugh was a great supporter of FM and a regular attendee at the Church. He was a major contributor to St Andrew's and supported the renovation of the Philip Salkeld Cross memorial (a tribute to a fellow Royal Engineer and the first recipient of the VC awarded posthumously). When Hugh retired, he turned his not inconsiderable energy to industry and to numerous local causes including Port Regis School and the Clouds House and Rehabilitation Centre in Shaftesbury and many others. Fontmell Magna is grateful for his (generous and continuing) support over many years.

Compost Corner

Succulents have become a fashionable, 'must have' plant; everyone is selling them - in garden centres, supermarkets, furniture shops - they're everywhere. And generally they're pretty easy to grow requiring minimal care. But where should they spent the winter months? Not necessarily

languishing in some terracotta pot in the garden next to the BBQ.

But there are succulents and succulents, some like the sempervivums (house leeks) and sedums are fully hardy but others, like aeoniums certainly can't spend winter outside; they originate from Madeira and the Canaries where they grow happily on even north facing slopes but where of course it's much warmer and drier than North Dorset. So bring them in to a frost free spot, maybe a porch or conservatory and keep them on the dry side, they hate having wet feet and will soon rot if left waterlogged.

One hardy succulent, Sempervivum arachnoideum, would make a great addition to your Halloween decorations. It's also known as the Cobweb houseleek and has rosettes of red tipped leaves covered in a web of white hairs, mimicking a spider's web. However, in summer it morphs into something a little less spooky with beautiful, usually pink, starry flowers.

Guide Dog Puppy Tilly

Tilly reached the end of her initial training in the middle of October. She came to us when she was 7 weeks and now, aged 15 months, she has left and has gone to the Guide Dog training centre at Leamington Spa.

There she will live with a new family and attend the training school each week day. Over the next few weeks she will be introduced to the harness, learn the art of guiding: negotiating obstacles, road safety, guiding on to buses and trains, finding stairs and lifts, learning routes and routines and having a willingness to work.



I understand that only around two thirds of the dogs successfully complete the training.

If successful the final stage will be to match Tilly with a suitable new owner (strong and fast walking!).

I have had regular training guidance from Guide Dogs and a huge amount of interest and support from the village; thank you.

I won't see Tilly again and I dearly hope that she is successful and look forward to the progress updates I will receive over the next few months.
