#### Village Hall - Annual Update June 2020

The Village Hall has been closed since Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> March but we are hoping that as lockdown measures ease over the next few months we will be able to welcome our regular user groups back to the hall. Sian has sent out a questionnaire to all our regular hirers and will be sending out updated hiring information as we get closer to reopening the hall.

It was a pleasure to be able to re-open the Tennis Court in early May and we aim to open the Under 12's play area as soon as we can safely do so.

During this lockdown period many of you will know that our dear President, Leo Williams, passed away. He had been involved in the Village Hall at all levels and lastly in the role as President. He was a skilled operator and with his diplomacy and knowledge managed to merge the new and current members of the committee to be the active force we are today. He will be sorely missed by us all.

The 2019 Christmas Fayre raised almost £1,700 towards the Playground Appeal target of £20,000. £3,128.53 was spent in 2019 on maintenance and extra chippings so the Appeal Fund now stands at £4,393.25. The fundraising Cookbook is making steady progress and is due to launch in the Autumn. Applications for Grants towards new playground equipment continue.

We started 2020 with the launch of the Community Lunches which were exceptionally well attended and we would like to thank our volunteers for all their support with producing such delicious meals and St. Andrews and Clayesmore School for providing the musical entertainment and help with serving the lunches. We will relaunch these lunches as soon as it is safe to do so.

Improvements to the hall have continued. The leak in the roof has been fixed as have the plumbing issues. The interior of the hall will be redecorated with work due to start over the Summer.

The hearing loop was installed and has made a noticeable difference. We ran a dropin session in January to demonstrate how the hearing loop works and once the Hall reopens, we will provide training for the regular Village Hall users.

Superfast Fibre Broadband is due to be installed very soon. We successfully applied for a Government Voucher in April to cover the installation cost and are now waiting for the Wessex Internet Team to run the fibre optic cable through to the Village Hall. A good Wi-Fi connection is something that our user groups and hirers have been keen to have for some time now so we are very pleased that Wessex Internet will be providing us with fibre at 100mbps. Wi-Fi access will be included in the hire charges for 2020 and hire charges will remain the same as they were pre-lockdown.

We would like to thank everyone in the Village for their continued support and we hope to welcome you all back to the hall soon.

#### Parish Council Annual General Meeting – 8th June 2020 at 7.00pm

Due to the Coronavirus restrictions this year's Parish Council AGM took place using the Zoom videoconferencing service. **Present:** Cllrs Michael Humphreys (MH) Chair, Jeremy Long (JL), Annie Newbury (AN), and Clerk Marianne Wheatley (MW), DC Ward Cllr Jane Somper (JS), plus 7 residents and a journalist.

#### **Public Questions:**

A350 – a resident raised the issue of increased volume of HGVs using the A350 southbound contrary to the voluntary one-way scheme with the C13 route. The weight operated signs in Shaftesbury redirecting traffic to use the C13 had been suspended; JS undertook to contact Highways to have this re-instated.

Development at Land near Home Farm, South Street – a resident stated that developers had not yet contacted owners of the footpath from the site to West Street about installing a foul water sewer and laying a non-permeable surface. MH undertook to raise this with the developer.

Apologies - none.

Election of Officers – Cllr Humphreys was elected Chair and Cllr Long was elected Vice-Chair for 2020/21.

Appointment of Parish Officers – Marianne Wheatley will continue as Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer.

Co-options. Andy Main was unanimously co-opted to join the Parish Council.

**Councillor Responsibilities for 2019/20 –** A full list is available on the parish website. Andy Main will take over responsibility for trees and footpaths and contribute on Environmental Protection.

Minutes of the Meeting 9th March 2020 – these were approved unanimously.

#### **Matters Arising**

PC Website - The new website will go live soon, to comply with Website Accessibility Regulations.

**BT Telephone Box** – An electrical check has been completed and some minor work is needed. The Clerk will approach BT to get the work done before the PC takes ownership.

Road Flooding near Piper's Mill West Street – residents and councillors have been lobbying Dorset Highways to install new drains to prevent flooding of the road in winter.

Dorset County Ward Councillor's Report - Jane Somper's report is available on the PC website.

#### **Reports from Parish Councillors**

a. Planning – MH reported that 4 planning applications has been received for consultation.

The PC is supporting applications at 6 Marshlands, Penn Hill and Old Pump Cottage West St.

The PC is objecting to an application for 3 more dwellings at Gupples Farm Hartgrove, adding to 3 already approved; this is considered to be potential over-development in a rural setting.

Pennyfarthing Homes have submitted a full planning application for erecting 30 dwellings on land near Home Farm, South Street. This allocation of new housing development for the village is provided for in the Neighbourhood Plan and therefore has the Parish Council's support in principle. The PC has appointed a planning consultant to assist in compiling its response to the planning application (see post-meeting note below).

MH thanked the NP Monitoring Group for scrutinising the planning applications; all documentation is available on the PC website.

- **b. Trees –** Dorset Council deals with all applications without consulting the parish council. All applications seen looked reasonable.
- **c. Highways** JL reported that an increased number of motorbikes are using the A350 through the village. A resident reported writing to the Police about this. JS advised the Dorset Highways were tackling some big projects while the roads are quieter, eg. at Iwerne Minster.
- JL reported speaking to the owners of the carpark at the top of Fontmell Hill. Concrete blocks 2m apart were now guarding the entrance to prevent fly-tipping; some residents have found entering the carpark challenging but the owners are not prepared to move them. Concerned residents may wish to write to the landowner independently.

- **d. Environmental Protection –** AN confirmed that the lime tree at Bedchester crossroads will be pruned further. AN said the "cut less, cut later" campaign to protect verges had produced positive results and remarked on seeing more wildflowers. AN has been clearing pavements in Orchard Close of moss growth; some residents will be asked to cut back some vegetation. New pads have been installed on the defibrillator in the School carpark.
- **e. Social Infrastructure –** AN reported the tennis court has re-opened but the Village Hall and play area remain closed. The Village Hall is working to install a full-fibre broadband connection. The Village Shop will be installing new signage at points around the village.
- f. District Liaison MH remarked on the high volume of Coronavirus communication from Dorset Council and other agencies; the most relevant ones were circulated to the Village contacts list (please contact the Clerk if you wish to join the Village contacts email list clerk@fontmellmagnapc.co.uk).
- **g.** Footpaths a resident has queried the re-direction of a public footpath that crosses the development site near Home Farm; MH has asked for clarification from the developer. JL advised that some walkers are leaving the gates open on the Lynchets.
- h. Governance The PC published its Annual Report, available on the Parish Council website. MH reported that the PC could not pursue a number of projects in 2019/20 due to the lack of councillors available, only 3 for most of the year. With Andy Main joining there will still be 3 vacancies; MH appealed once again for people to come forward to serve on the parish council.

#### Report from the RFO, approve End of Year Accounts and Audit Statement

End of Year accounts are summarized in the Annual Report. Total expenditure was £1275 over budget, mainly resulting from a grant of £2000 to the Village Hall for improvements to the play area. The internal auditor had audited the EoY accounts and found nothing material to report. The Audit Statements were read out and approved.

A modest pay rise of 2% was approved for the Clerk's salary with effect from 1st April.

Payments were authorized for the Clerk for Zoom and back pay (£42.80), SLCC Membership (£60.54), Vale Garden Service (£50), DE Scott Electricals (£80.72).

#### **Other Matters**

**Development on Land near Home Farm** – The PC has been contacted by a resident of The Mead to enquire about the possibility of homes adjacent to the proposed new housing development could be connected to the foul water drainage system provided for the new dwellings. MH undertook to raise this with the developer but it would be up to the residents to pursue this idea. It is not clear how the works could be funded but might involve some monies from the S106 agreement between the developer and Dorset Council; this would be outside the remit of the Parish Council.

War Memorial – MW reported the memorial hedge needed pruning; a quotation would be sought.

The meeting closed at 8.37pm. The next meeting is on **Monday 28<sup>th</sup> September 2020 at 7.00pm** 

#### **Post-Meeting Note:**

#### Planning Application 2/2020/0577/FUL - Land at Home Farm, South Street

The Parish Council has now submitted its comments on this planning application. The Parish Council strongly supports the scheme in principle, but reluctantly it must object to the application as it stands. In our view the proposals are not sufficiently compliant with a number of Neighbourhood Plan policies. In particular, it considers more thought needs to be given to the designs of the homes and their layout to ensure that the scheme reflects the distinctive character of the village and its status as a conservation area.

### Digital Hotline volunteers 'do their byte' to get couple to friends' 70th birthday party video celebrations.

A highly experienced team of digital volunteers from the Dorset Digital Hotline have been praised for the way they helped a 'shielding' couple connect with loved ones and the outside world during the COVID lockdown.

The big 'thank you' from Wareham residents Arthur and Daniel Brown marks this year's #LetsTalkLoneliness Week (15-19 June 2020). The couple are keen for more people to know about the hotline which can offer support to anyone who wants to get connected with friends and family by video and provides help with any other IT or digital problem.

Arthur and Daniel, who are both 'shielding', moved to new sheltered accommodation with hours to spare before lockdown but their broadband connection didn't move with them. In a new town, with lockdown taking hold, the couple found themselves isolated, alone and no connection to the outside world save their GP surgery.

Arthur said: "We were on our own for 10 weeks in all. We have always been loathed to go digital but our motivations changed during lockdown. It became crystal clear that all essential services and human contact relied on us getting broadband and video conferencing.

"We tried some internet service providers but the cost was too high and neither of us are able to work. Our GP surgery suggested we call the Dorset Digital Hotline who immediately suggested we apply for the BT Basic Broadband package. This was installed extremely efficiently and with full safeguarding adhered to. Dorset Digital Hotline advisers have been on the end of a phone throughout to make sure the broadband and video technology works for us."

Daniel continued: "The BT Basic Broadband package is available for people on lower incomes. It was installed midweek and last Sunday we were invited to a 70th digital birthday party on Zoom. There were multiple screens so we could catch up with lots of people, many we hadn't seen for years, and all party together. It was wonderful. Anyone who needs IT or digital support should get in touch with the hotline now, we thoroughly recommend it."

A selection of some of the support the Dorset Digital Hotline can provide – no problem too small!

- · helping families with digital applications for home schooling
- · providing help to get online for home shopping
- support for all digital NHS services and e-Consult
- setting up video calls such as Skype and Facetime to keep in contact with friends and family
- · support to use all digital appliances and solve problems

Cllr. Gary Suttle, Dorset Council cabinet lead for skills, said: "Without broadband or digital skills it must be incredibly difficult to shield. During the COVID lockdown, people without broadband have effectively been shut off. I am delighted we have been able to work as a team to find a good all-round solution for this couple."

### Village weather for May 2020

Only 4 rain days, with very small amounts, so very dry, but plenty of almost cloudless sunshine. An air frost on 12th May caught a lot of tender plants and even hedges.

#### **Compost Corner**

Hardy geraniums are such useful plants: they flower (colour range from white, pink to dark purple) for months on end, aren't nibbled by slugs or snails, and are disease resistant. They are also suitable for containers and last year I duly planted Geranium 'Mavis Simpson', an RHS Award of Garden Merit variety, in a container. It did magnificently well and quickly filled the pot. But this spring it looked very sorry for itself, seemingly sulking in the middle of the pot and not showing any new growth. I then did a bit of ferreting about in the compost and all was revealed - the geranium had only a few spindly roots and lurking nearby were little 'c' shaped white vine weevil grubs. Vine weevils are particularly problematic in pots the adults eating the leaves but it's the grubs that cause the lethal damage feasting on the plant's roots.

So what can be done? I managed to rescue Mavis, washing the roots down, repotting in fresh compost and after a period of nurturing and convalescence, she now resides happily in the freedom of a garden border. Alison Main

### RECIPE CORNER— SPICY COURGETTE CHUTNEY

At this time of year, anyone who grows courgettes is faced with the problem of having them with every meal or leaving them to grow into marrows! I love chutney and this one is delicious with a vibrant colour and can be as spicy as you like depending on your palate. Ingredients Makes: 6 to 8 jars

30g salt

4 large cloves garlic, finely diced 2kg courgettes, diced

- 4 apples, cored and diced
- 4 large onions, diced
- 1 red pepper, diced
- 1 yellow pepper, diced
- 350g soft brown sugar 800ml vinegar
- 1 fresh chilli, finely diced
- 50g to 75g fresh root ginger, finely diced
- 2 dessertspoons mustard seeds
- 2 dessertspoons nigella seeds
- 2 dessertspoons turmeric
- 1 teaspoon ground coriander teaspoon mixed spice
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

#### Method

Prep:30min > Cook:2hr > Ready in:2hr30min

- 1. Put the salt and garlic in a pestle and mortar, and grind to create a smooth paste.
- 2. Add the garlic mixture along with all other ingredients to a large heavy bottomed pan. Mix together and bring to a simmer. Simmer for 1 1/2 to 2 hours, until the liquid has evaporated and the chutney is thick.

Put the chutney into clean and warmed (in the oven) jars. Put a wax seal on the chutney and screw on the lid. Leave the chutney to cool. Store unopened jars in a cool, dark place.

For the best results leave the chutney in jars for one month before opening.
