Corona Virus Emergency Help

As a positive move, in place of the distressing Corona Virus news in the media, it is proposed that Fontmell Magna should set up a support group to help those who need to self-isolate. Although we are aware that an informal system already exists via neighbours and friends, there may well be occasions when they are not in a position to help. The idea is that anyone who self-isolates should telephone one of the co-ordinators below, who would then arrange for such help and support to be provided as is needed. This might be getting shopping (for which the shop has placed an article in the Gossip Tree - Page 2), prescriptions, arranging an internet food drop or such other care and assistance as is needed, but of course excluding medical advice!

At present there is no strategy in place should carers become infected and while we would like to provide such help, it does require training and checking which are beyond our present capabilities.

Also, if you are self-isolating, please do not go to the shop – it is taking stringent measures to prevent contamination.

From the local Village shop & post Office

We would like to thank the Friends of the Village Shop for their extremely generous donations. As a result, we have increased our stock extensively from shelf goods through to new lines in meats and dairy and we have purchased another fridge to cope with the increase. We are also in the process of acquiring another freezer to extend our frozen goods range.

The response we have received has been very positive, but as always we look to you to tell us what you want us to stock on a regular basis. If it's not here then we can always order it!

The shop is being used more than ever with quotes from customers such as 'Your fruit and veg is excellent. I'm only going to use yours from now on', 'wow, that's so cheap (an 800g box of Dairy Milk for £3.99) and 'Your Bacardi is a good price for a corner shop.'

With regard to COVID-19 we continue to deliver with the amazing help of all you wonderful volunteers. Thank you. We have also installed screens on the shop counters and sanitiser gel for your use.

We sanitise down the counters, door handles (fridges etc) regularly and chip & pin pads after every transaction together with an extensive 1 hour sanitisation after closing.

We thank you so very much for your continued support and especially with respect to observing the social distancing guidance in the shop at all times.

What will happen about newspapers?

Newspapers can be delivered with your order. If you don't have an order, they will be left outside the shop either on or in the large grey box WITH YOUR NAME ON IT for collection. A small box will be provided for vouchers if you use them. If you pay cash for your papers, you will have to send it with a friend or neighbour to collect inside the shop.

Prescriptions?

Lloyds (Abbey View Surgery) have agreed that volunteers can collect prescriptions on your behalf, but we will need your name and address to do this.

Our opening hours and Bank Holidays?

We have decided that in the current climate we will remain open (normal hours will apply). However, things may change or alter depending on future events.

VE Day 75 – How to Celebrate on the 8th of May in Lockdown

As you are probably all aware, our original plans for a VE Day 75 Street Fair Celebration were cancelled for this year due to the Coronavirus Lockdown and we plan to run a similar event in May 2021 instead.

However There is still the opportunity for you and your household to celebrate the **75th Anniversary of VE Day on Friday 8th May**. To comply with the Government rules, the Last Post will be played by Colin at **2.55pm** from his garden.

Anyone else who has a bugle, trumpet, cornet (or dare we say a kazoo) and who might like to consider playing the Last Post from their own garden is welcome to join in, all we ask is that you do not play in an area that could attract a group of people.

We are suggesting that in order to mark this important anniversary that we all join together in the Nation's Toast at **3.00pm** from the safety of our own homes or front gardens (and especially where you can wave to your neighbours).

To join in the **Nation's Toast to the Heroes of WW2** – you just need to stand and raise a glass of refreshment (of your choice) and say the Toast as follows: **“To those who gave so much, we thank you.”**

This is a unique opportunity to pay tribute to the many millions at home and abroad that gave so much to ensure we all enjoy and share the freedom we have today and it is the first time that such a tribute has ever taken place, so please encourage your neighbours and friends to join in from their own homes.

Compost Corner

It seems a world away since I wrote my last article in early March about Erigeron. No more can we pop out to a garden centre and be spoilt with thousands of plants from which to choose. But we are surrounded in this wonderful season of Spring by the gradual appearance of the most beautiful flowers:- primroses, bluebells and cow parsley to name but a few. The native Bluebell makes a stunning carpet of flowers on our woodland floors and was first mentioned in a herbal book by William Turner in the 16C. But beware, despite their sweet fragrance and delicate drooping flowers, all parts are poisonous -so don't be tempted to scatter some on your salad or use them to decorate a cake. They do have useful properties however: it was said that the small white bulbs were used to make glue and also used to stiffen the elaborate ruffs worn in Elizabethan times.

THINGS TO DO WITH YOUR KIDS DURING LOCKDOWN

Thanks to Kim Masters for these excellent suggestions.

1. Den building, inside and out!
2. Make paper planes, measure how far they travel and keep a record (use centimetres, inches etc) see who's goes the furthest/highest etc. Making targets for them to reach is fun too.
3. Add highlighter ink to bubble mixture for glow in the dark bubbles!
4. Make toilet roll tubes monsters/ owls/ minions etc. Use glue to decorate the tubes with paper, card, feathers, googly eyes whatever you wish!
5. Decorate a twig (or twigs) with wool, embroidery thread, bells, beads, and sequins. Hang this in the garden to see if the fairies or birds come to jingle the bells.
6. Make and sail an origami paper boat, or build a raft using sticks and twine to sail in a puddle, a pond, stream or bath!
7. Plant a seed and watch it grow. Perhaps measure it and see how much it grows in a week. If you're growing veg get involved in cooking it too.
8. Have a bug hunt in your garden. Get out the magnifying glass and perhaps a little tub for your findings, ID your finds and write down or draw your discoveries.
9. Recreating famous paintings and photographing the results is rather popular right now. Choose a painting then recreate it with toys, food, items around your house, or raid the dressing up box and put yourself in the picture!
10. Hold a family disco, get the children to choose all their favourite songs to play, get some snacks and drinks in, and have a good old boogie one evening!

11. Write a story or a poem. If you don't know where to start draw random words out of a hat that you have to base your writing around. (I did this with my children just this week when I asked them to write me a story and they were low on ideas, each drew out a place, the weather, an animal, a person, and an item that has to be in the story, with these few ideas they were off!)

12. Now that trees are green and flowers are flowering children can use leaves and petals to create wonderful pictures or colourful mandalas either by glueing them onto paper or card (give these a layer of PVA glue to help them last a little longer) or let them create art straight onto the ground (a la Andy Goldsworthy!).
