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Compost Corner

If you happened to walk up from the duck pond to the lynchets recently, you will have seen a warning sign of wasps. There was a nest at the base of the tree where dozens of wasps were buzzing in and out of the little hole; and we certainly gave it a wide berth.

Wasps are a huge group of insects - the most common are the social wasps which live in large colonies but there are solitary wasps that live alone. I came across a most unusual wasp it France,

the Mud Dauber Wasp which looked like a cross between a giant mosquito and a monster wasp. It had an extraordinary habit of making little cocoons down the side of chairs, on cushions and even in a handbag; with its love of soft furnishings, this was definitely the Laurence Llewellyn-Bowen of the wasp world. It may have wanted to share our living space but it was a benevolent creature and had no desire to hurt us.

We are naturally very wary of wasps with their painful sting but should they be so universally condemned? Their diet is varied and at this time of year they feast on windfall fruit but they are also carnivorous and prey on many insects including spiders and caterpillars and could be considered the gardener's friend.

However, there is one member of the wasp family we certainly don't want to encounter, the giant Asian hornet a formidable 6 cm also known as the murder hornet....enough said.

Seasonal Recipe – Celeriac, Hazelnut & Truffle Soup From Graham Eames

small bunch thyme

1 onion, chopped

11 veg stock

Despite being one of the ugliest vegetables, celeriac has a delicious flavour and goes beautifully in mashed potato or as the base of the French equivalent of coleslaw, remoulade. This recipe is for a delicious soup, with the truffle oil adding a little bit of luxury.

1 celeriac (about 1kg), peeled and chopped

50g blanched hazelnuts, toasted and roughly

A hundred years ago

Ingredients

1 tbsp <u>olive oil</u>

2 bay leaves

1 fat garlic clove, chopped

1 potato (about 200g), chopped

100ml cream

chopped

1 tbsp truffle oil, plus an extra drizzle to serve

Method STEP 1

In a large saucepan, heat the oil over a low heat. Tie the thyme sprigs and bay leaves together with a piece of string and add them to the pan with the onion and a pinch of salt. Cook for about 10 mins until softened but not coloured. **STEP 2**

Stir in the garlic and cook for 1 min more, then tip in the celeriac and potato. Give everything a good stir and season with a big pinch of salt and white pepper. Pour in the stock, bring to the boil, then simmer for around 30 mins until the vegetables are completely soft.

STEP 3

Discard the herbs, then stir through the cream, remove from the heat and blitz until completely smooth. Stir through 1/2 tbsp truffle oil at a time and taste for seasoning – the strength of the oil will vary, so it's better to start with less oil and add a little at a time.

STEP 4

To serve, reheat the soup until piping hot, then ladle into bowls and top with the hazelnuts, some black pepper and an extra drizzle of truffle oil.
