We are blessed with some lovely local walks with stunning views on Fontmell Downs and on both Hod and Hambledon hills. But venture a little further afield to Okeford Fitzpaine and you will find a lovely place to walk at Okeford Hill.

There is a public car park at the top of the hill and if you cross the road there is a large area of fields and woods with assorted walks. Most of the walks are reasonably flat, although if you like a hill then you can walk down to Okeford Fitzpaine or Shillingstone (both signposted). There are footpaths crisscrossing the area and the views over Dorset are spectacular.

Also, if you are a keen forager, there are loads of blackberries, wild cherry plums and even wild raspberries to found in abundance in the autumn.

Friday 7th February 2020 **CLIMATE EMERGENCY - How can we respond as individuals? –** Dr Martin Price of F.O.E. Martin Price has lived in Poole for most of his life and was a teacher at college and university level. He has a background in Geography, Sociology, Economics and Education and Management. A long-time member of Friends of the Earth (46 years) he has been a national Director on several occasions and was national Chairman in 1993-94. Martin will talk to us about the effects of climate change on our world and what we can do to minimise our carbon footprint.

<u>Iwerne Valley Walking Group - January 18th Walk</u>

In glorious sunshine after all the rain we've had, 11 of us and two dogs set off from Home Farm Shop outside Tarrant Gunville and headed off along good tracks and paths east towards the Salisbury - Blandford road. We then cut up north, causing a shooting party to "hold their fire" until we had passed" and down towards the corner of Eastbury House estate. Then north again to Chettle, going through the parkland at the back of Chettle House and with good views of that very pretty building. Then walked behind the village (views of the back of the Castleman Hotel), before turning south again and back to Tarrant Gunville. Sadly not enough time to look at the church or shop in Chettle but we can recommend the homemade pies at the shop. The views on the walk were far reaching and covered 360 degrees in all. The climbs are very gradual but after 3 hours walking we were very ready for the delicious meals served at Home Farm. Here's to the next walk!

Compost Corner

What is the world's biggest living thing? The giant redwood? No. The Blue Whale? No. Armillaria ostoyae, the 'Humongous Fungus'? Yes!

One specimen of this fungus was found to cover 8.8 kilometres in the Malheur National Forest, Oregon; it lurks

underground and feeds off conifer and hardwood forests and eventually kills them. But not all fungi are bad news for plants and it has been found that they can be positively beneficial and help with their establishment, and that includes roses. Winter is the perfect time to plant a bare-rooted rose, (unless the ground is frozen) and adding mycorrhizal fungi (available in garden centres) to the exposed roots really does aid their development and growth and it is only necessary to apply the fungi once for the lifetime of the rose. On the subject of weather, it's not a good idea to plant either a or pot grown rose in bare-rooted waterlogged soil and bearing in mind the rather damp weather we've endured this winter, perhaps any new planting should be delayed a bit until everything is a little less soggy.
