#### OBITUARY—John T Jennings DFC, 22/2/1924—28/11/2019

My Father John Jennings came to the village back in 1975 and bought his first house here having decided this is where he and his family would finally settle down after a life of constantly moving every couple of years. He took a great interest in village life and served as a member of the Parish council for many years, only retiring from the post at the ripe old age of 90. He always took a great interest in the village and the protection of the village boundaries from overdevelopment or interference from the County Council.

He was also a former fighter pilot of world war 2, flying both Hurricanes and Spitfires, he joined the RAF at the beginning of 1942 just shy of his 18th Birthday. He was sent to Canada for training along with approximately thirty two other young amen, of whom sadly only nineteen lived to complete the training. He was then posted to serve in Italy, North Africa and Palestine before being demobbed in 1947. After a brief period in Civvi Street he was asked to rejoin the Air Force and remained in it until his retirement in 1979 having attained the rank of Group Captain. After which he spent ten years as Managing Director of NICEIC. During his long service career he flew over thirty different aircraft. To name but a few; Vampire, Meteor, Mustang, Hunter and Lightning. Later during the Aden conflict he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for exceptional flying skills that were instrumental in the rescue and escape of six SAS soldiers. General Sir Peter De La Billière makes mention of these events and his actions in his autobiography. My father on occasion was asked to take high profile passengers on board - both artist David Shepherd and Journalist Clair Hollingworth are two that I recall him mentioning. Another highlight of his flying career was that he led the fly past celebrations for the independence of Kenya and Tanzania in 1963 and very recently he was asked to both proof read and write the Foreword for the Book "Hunters over Arabia" by Ray Deacon"

We will hold his funeral in the village church at 1pm on January 17th

6th December: The wonderful World of Glass: Dr Francis Burroughes

The earliest natural glass appeared in the world about 700 million years ago through volcanic activity. This obsidian was very popular with the Victorians who used it to make jewellery. Modern glass was first made by humans around 3000 BC in what became known as Syria and Mesopotamia and its use spread throughout the Middle East and into Egypt, commonly found in Egyptian burial sites. Even at these times (c1500BC), trade brought these glass beads into Europe, and they have been found on many sites, including Avebury.

Dr Burroughes brought a magnificent collection of glass objects which he most trustingly handed around, some of which were extremely valuable and rare, introducing a sense of suspense to the meeting as we passed to each other exquisite vases, goblets and heavy decanters. The earliest of these objects was indeed a set of glass beads dated about 1500 BC from an Egyptian burial site. In about 100 BC the Romans discovered the art of blowing glass at very high temperatures (previously moulds were used) and this technique has remained the same ever since.

The centre of glass manufacture moved from the Roman Empire back to the Middle East, from there to Venice and then to Sussex in around 1260 and thence to south London, the north east, Bristol and Stourbridge. Different substances were added, lead produced clear glass, cobalt blue, uranium (!) apple green. Glass manufacture was a major UK industry until it all but disappeared in the 1960's due to fuel cost rises and a selective employment tax. We saw - and were allowed to handle - some beautiful and precious pieces, and came away with a much better understanding of what lies behind the objects that we take for granted in our daily lives.

#### **Compost Corner**

Happy New Year to everyone! But will it be a good year for the garden will it be very cold, very wet, or very hot? There's not much we can do about the weather but here are a few gardening tips they may help in the year ahead:

-Don't -

Plant invasive species like comfrey, lemon balm or horseradish

Use slug pellets - they end up poisoning our songbirds

Chop the leaves off daffodils until 6 weeks after they have stopped flowering

Decant chemicals into old bottles

Walk on frosty lawns - it kills the grass

Use old railway sleepers - they are saturated with noxious chemicals and **ooze tar** 

#### -Do -

Make compost - use it to mulch your borders

Feed your lawn - grass is a hungry plant

Leave a bit of your garden wild to encourage wildlife

Stake newly planted trees

Clean your bird feeders to prevent infection

Plant Clematis deep to prevent Clematis wilt

Use a power breaker with all electric garden tools - it could save your life

#### **Garden Club meeting November 21st**

We certainly started the new season of talks off with a bang.. Our speaker, Mike Burks, talked about "gardening for climate change"

A very topical subject which he presented with facts, advice and lots of humour. He pointed out the damage constant heavy rain does to the soil which can be alleviated by mulching. The benefits of having something growing even at this time of year by sowing green manure—this all helps the soil from becoming too compacted in the winter months. The importance of conserving rainwater in a long hot summer and told us the story of a lady who did just that, but in 4 pint milk containers piled up behind her garage. Whether or not you believe in climate change, we can all do a lot with our own gardens, large or small, to keep our soil healthy and productive not only for us but also for the benefit of the wildlife that lives in it and feeds on it. A good compost bin is essential—grass cuttings, newspaper, cardboard and kitchen waste used today is out garden's food for next year! There were certainly lots of questions at the end..
