Obituary:- Leo and Priscilla Williams

Leo and Priscilla Williams who had been very much part of Fontmell life since they moved here in 1985, sadly died in April, a few days short of their 55th wedding anniversary.

Both were born and brought up in Shaftesbury and attend local schools. On leaving school Leo joined the family firm of Williams Bros. as an apprentice plumber, eventually becoming a full member of the Institute of Building. He was called up for National Service in 1960, and served with the Dorset and Devon Regiment touring Cyprus and Libya, a period of his life that he looked back on with great fondness.

Priscilla, having left school, started work as a nanny to the 4 children of a local solicitor, and later at Boots the chemist.

They married in 1965, and their two children, Mark and Peter, were born soon afterwards. Priscilla devoted herself to raising their two sons, but as the children grew older, she joined the family firm as a secretary.

Leo worked during the day and immersed himself in charitable activities in the evening. This charitable work meant that the Shaftesbury Scouts got a new headquarters, the elderly and frail a new day centre, the Silver Band a new Band Hall, the Shaftesbury Carnival prospered and Gold Hill was restored.

He served on both the Borough Council, and later the NDDC for many years, and for 12 years was a JP, becoming Chairman of the Bench.

As a trustee and active member of the William Williams Charity he did much to help the people of Shaftesbury, Blandford and Sturminster Newton who were in hardship.

In 1985 he and Priscilla bought Perry & Son and together they built up the excellent reputation it has today. Many in the village will have reason to be grateful to Leo for rescuing them when a plumbing disaster loomed. Leo was soon immersed in village life, firstly as Chairman and later as President of the new Village Hall, for which he did much of the design and fundraising. He also served as a Parish Councillor where his sound common sense was much valued.

For many years he and Priscilla were involved with the Village Fete and ran the very successful tombola stall.

After recovering from her initial treatment for cancer in 2006, Priscilla volunteered three days a week at the Joseph Weld Charity shop in Blandford, which she continued to do until ill health forced her to retire earlier this year.

They were excellent party givers and Parsonage Street parties to celebrate various national events were much enjoyed by many in Fontmell. They will both be sorely missed by their many friends.

Compost Corner

Our gardens are as individual as we are, little parcels of land where we choose what goes in, what goes out. We tend them: getting rid of weeds and pests, pruning and snipping, we are in total control, or are we?

Last year I was very sorry to see that in our garden a magnificent, Viburnum

plicatum 'Mariesii' was looking a bit under the weather: it's flowers were spookily small and the leaves undersized and sickly. Needless to say, it soon died. I think that the problem was its proximity to other larger shrubs which were sucking up all the available water; Viburnums don't like to dry out. It was great loss to the garden because it really is an eye-catching plant. But later in the year I spotted that a new shrub had sprung up some distance away and this year it came into full and healthy flower. It was a new Viburnim plicatum 'Mariesii'. This little bit of horticultural magic was achieved by one of the original shrub's stems 'layering' and creating a new plant in a much more suitable place - with absolutely no help from me at all.

The genius of plants and nature to prevail is indeed a real tonic.

SPRINGHEAD'S DIRECTOR, EDWARD PARKER, EXPLAINS HOW THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC HAS AFFECTED SPRINGHEAD, AND HOW WE ARE PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE.

Springhead has been closed now for the best part of 8 weeks. This coincided with our busiest time when there are usually school groups staying during the week and weddings and other functions every weekend. All events have been cancelled until the end of August which is very disappointing for those who were looking forward to spending time here, but also means that we have been put in a difficult financial situation.

We have had to furlough most of our staff, reduce expenditure dramatically and apply for help via government grants. We are also unable to welcome our regular volunteers but have continued to work on the Productive Gardens project, restoring and improving our kitchen gardens, planning for the restoration of our orchards, and looking into options for community growing areas. We hope to be able to distribute some of our produce locally while we don't have our usual visitors here.

2020 is going to be a very hard year but we are still planning for the future, and by looking after our buildings and gardens we will be ready to re-open almost instantaneously when permitted, later in the year or early 2021. In the meantime, with the help from Government schemes and some of our regular funders we hope to be able survive lockdown. Helping the NHS

Once the shock of lockdown and my work disappearing due to Covid subsided, I realised It was important to me to try and "help or do something". I heard about the need for home sewers to make Scrubs, Gowns, Scrub hats and other items as the usual suppliers cannot rapidly fulfil demand. The risk of catching the virus means that those on the frontline need to protect their clothes or wear scrubs (pyjama style tunics and trousers).

Dusting off my sewing machine it took a week and lots of unpicking to conquer the relatively simple sewing pattern. Since then the demand has continued. One group I am sewing for in London have received over 100 orders from hospitals, care homes, charities and GP practices. They have supplied over 7000 items at last count. The order I am currently sewing for was requested by a local hospital - 200 pairs of scrubs are required across 11 wards. People of all ages and experience are sewing and doing what they can, some are shielding or self isolating and find the "connection" helpful. I've set up my sewing machine in the garden and try to complete two sets a week, I'm not fast as I do other things but the quality is improving!
