Councillor is also about caring for the natural environment. The Climate Change Emergency is scary and we all need to do our bit but we also need to support the creatures we share this Parish with.

Help the hedgehogs, help the environment!

Spring has sprung, the grass is ris, I wonder where the birdies is! The birdies are busy nesting and being free as a bird all over the place. The hedgehogs, however, may need a little help. Hedgehogs in your garden are an enormous asset, eating slugs and snails and generally being rather attractive, although a little noisy when passionate! If they eat the slugs and snails, you won't need any of those nasty, harmful slug pellets. However, hedgehogs can't fly, you may have noticed this, so to help them visit as many gardens as possible during their nocturnal ramblings it's helpful if you ensure that there is at least one hedgehog-friendly entry/exit route between your garden and a field or the garden next door. This doesn't need to be a big, a gap of about 15cm square is good, a little piece cut out of the bottom of a fencing panel or a piece snipped out of a wire fence – quick and easy and the hedgehogs will love you

for it!

FONTMELL FRIENDSHIP GARDEN



It has been another busy and productive month for the Fontmell Friendship Garden and April will mark some real changes to the site. In the last month, seeds have been sown and re sown and we have a collection of cut flowers coming along really well- sweet peas, zinnia, cosmos, rudbekia, salvia, antirhinum, gypsophila, godetia, amni, marigolds plus alchemilla mollis, ros-

es, scabious, cornflowers, sunflowers, forget me nots, campanula and more. Thank you to all the 25 seed growers- some of the photographs are enclosed

I have included a photograph of the stunning work of members of the art club. They have painted plant recognition signs which Sandra has had

printed on special paper to withstand our weather conditions (tested by Sandra). They are a beautiful addition to the garden - thank you.

The craft club have been so creative and made us some special bunting to decorate the garden once we are open.

The benches and troughs are assembled, water butts in place and irrigation system to come. A new gate is on order for entry into the garden from the village hall and new garden signs are being collected at the end of the month.



You will see some polyanthus brightening up the village hall - all were very kindly donated to us by Waitrose and provide some blooms into Spring, We have been supported by thisisalfred with regular updates from Keri and a few interviews and at the end of March the Village Halls Podcast, which supports the ten thousand village halls across the country are featuring our project on one of their episodes. The RHS (The Garden) magazine are popping us in the April edition with the offer of a feature article next year. Dorset Community Action are also kindly featuring us again in their newsletter - previous articles have featured the Christmas fair of last year.

Nic Andrews from The Potting Shed in Shaftesbury very kindly donated three large boxes of gardening books and a box of magazines for our gardening borrowing library which we will be opening with the garden.

This is a preparation morning for the mass planting and the garden opening. We will be planting budleia very kindly donated by Judy Westgate, filling troughs, and setting up the staking for the plants for the future. I will make the mid morning cakes and provide take away style coffees. Please e mail me on sianhighnam@gmail.com if you feel you could come and help in any way. I have a good number of people- but never say no to help - even if it is just making take away teas and coffees for the gardeners.

TUESDAY MAY 18th - FLOWER DEMONSTRATION 1.30-4.30 pm.

Final year level four Kingston Maurward students, together with their tutor are coming to support the garden, completing five demonstrations on the theme of Spring/ early Summer. Tickets are £5.00 to include tea and cake with a raffle for the demonstrations. Numbers are strictly limited and we are operating under safe covid requirements.40 seats are taken and we have capacity for just 10 more. MAY 22nd 10-1 pm- mass plant out

This is the day we will be planting out the seeds grown, finishing off troughs and any other planting which arises, plus putting out the art club plant identification signs. Again - there will be cakes and take away style coffee.

We will have a planting plan and would welcome as many of the seed growers who would like to come and plant as possible please. I don't anticipate people having to be there for three hours - it is just a drop in, plant and go...although anyone is very welcome to stay as long as they want. This is also open to any villagers who would like to come along to support the growing- we would welcome any help with the fun part of the planting. The planting in the garden will be intensive cut flower gardening style - so lots of potential future blooms to plant out to give us plenty of flowers.

JUNE 26th GRAND OPENING 1-4 pm

This is going to be a lovely event with live music from Clayesmore, country dancing from Steps in Time and potentially more live music at the end of the afternoon. John Crompton is running a BBQ and bar. We have a grand raffle- there are some fabulous prizes pledged already and we will be selling tickets very soon. Sue is running a friendship bracelet stand, we will have flower posies - " jars of joy", plus a cake stall and the chance to be together.

There is already a huge amount of help pledged - but there are just one or two small gaps. I am requesting help please for the following:

For work purposes where people cannot access reliable broadband from home

For digital access to public services to enable villagers to access the internet using the broadband available at the hall

To provide essential voluntary activities

For the purposes of education or training

For the purpose of support groups

The Hall will be in use as a Polling Station on Thursday 6th May for the Police and Crime Commissioner Elections.

Recreation Area

Fontmell Magna Parish Council - Meeting on 8th March 2021 at 7.00pm

Due to the Coronavirus restrictions the Parish Council meeting took place using the Zoom videoconferencing service. Draft minutes of the meeting are available on the PC Website http://www.fontmellmagnapc.co.uk/FontmellMagna-PC/ Meetings and Minutes 9778.aspx

Present: Cllrs Michael Humphreys (MH) Chair, Annie Newbury (AN), Andy Main (AM) and Clerk Sam Smith (SS), DC Ward Cllr Jane Somper (JS), plus 5 residents and Keri Jones (press This is Alfred)

Public Questions - none

Apologies - none

Co-options – Christine Scott, West Street, was co-opted to the parish council; the Chair welcomed Christine and thanked her for coming forward. Christine will focus on social infrastructure issues, covering assets, home watch, defibrillators, vlage shop liaison, broadband and mobile network coverage, recreation, allotments, village hall liaison. The Chair confirmed there remain 2 vacancies on the Parish Council.

New Clerk – The Chair welcomed Sam Smith, now in post as Clerk/Responsible Financial Officer following a handover of files from Marianne Wheatley.

Minutes of the Meeting 14th December 2020 – these were approved unanimously.

Matters Arising

Community Land Trust- The CLT held its AGM on 4th March; AM attended for the parish council as a shareholder.

Hedge on Lurmer Street – Following complaints raised by residents, the parish council arranged for a protruding hedge along Lurmer St, to be cut back as it was a danger to traffic. It was found that an enclosed stand of 19 hawthorn trees contained 9 that were dead and could potentially fall into the road representing a significant risk to pedestrians and traffic. The landowner has yet to be identified and Dorset Highways was approached but declined to meet the cost of tree felling. Because it is judged as an ongoing safety risk the PC has decided to meet the significant cost and commissioned the works to fell the dead trees.

Speed Restrictions – The PC has discussed with Dorset Highways introducing tighter speed restrictions at the Bedchester crossroads and along the B3091. Highways has a published set of criteria in place (available on the Dorset Council website) to decide if this would be appropriate but these criteria are not met in either situation.

Variable Speed Indicator – A resident's suggestion to install a variable speed indicator along the A350 through the village has been researched. Highways has advised that the benefit would be marginal in reducing average traffic speeds and at over £3000 the cost is prohibitive.

Dorset County Ward Councillor's Report - Jane Somper's report is available on the PC website.

JS reported on two successful ward meetings, to introduce Rico Dimarino as our Highways Community Officer and to discuss footpaths. JS also advised that Dorset Council has secured £19m of funding to update its housing stock for energy efficiency by installing better insulation and heating systems.

Reports from Parish Councillors

a. Planning – MH confirmed there had been nine new applications which were assessed by the Neighbourhood Plan Monitoring Group; their reports are available on the PC website. The PC had no objection to six applications: Barn Cottage, 2 North St., Orchard Corner, Dairy Cottage, 8 Collyers Rise. The PC objected to three applications: Springhead Farm. 54 West Street: Springhead. Mill St., Home Mead Cottage.

MH reported an update on the proposed large development near Home Farm, South St. The developer Pennyfarthing Homes is continuing discussion with Dorset planners on ecology mitigation and the infrastructure levy. A decision on the planning application is expected in the next 2-3 months.

- **b. Highways** JL reported that residents had asked if raised curb stones could be placed along parts of Lurmer St. to protect property, however Highways have stated there is insufficient road width to accommodate wider curbs. The road surfaces along West St and Gupples Lane are being reviewed by Highways as they are in a poor state. JS was thanked for arranging a very useful meeting with Highways to discuss various outstanding issues.
- **c. Environment Protection –** AN reported that Wessex Water are continuing further works at Bedchester crossroads which is disrupting some residents; posts at the crossroads to protect the verges are now back in place. Following complaints from residents, improved "Clean it up" signs have been installed along Penn Hill.

AN attended two People's Assembly zoom sessions on environment and climate change issues. An invitation will go to Sustainable Dorset to address Fontmell residents on ideas to tackle climate change.

d. Social Infrastructure – AN reported that improved signage on the school defibrillator is in place. AN advised that the Village Hall has been redecorated and is ready to open for use as soon as possible. The PC has sponsored a planter for the Fontmell Friendship Garden.

MH reported that 10 responses had been received from residents interested in the Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme which ends in March. Details of any new finding schemes are awaited from Dorset Digital.

- **e. District Liaison –** MH reported that the PC responded to the draft Dorset Local Plan consultation, with comments and suggestions made in several areas including housing and climate change. The draft Plan places Fontmell in tier 3 for housing development and proposes an allocation of 62 new homes over the planning period 2021-38.
- f. Parish Communications A new blog has been started, called "Councillor's Chronicles".

The idea is to communicate the workings of the parish council, the issues it tackles and problems it encounters, in representing the community of Fontmell Magna. The blog is intended to supplement the meeting minutes with more light-hearted and topical content http://www.fontmellmagnapc.co.uk/Councillors Chronicles 38120.aspx

- **g. Footpaths –** AM reported that a stile has been renewed on a footpath leading up to Fontmell Down. Dog Poo signs have been placed along the path to the Lynchets. Thanks are due again to Gary Payne who has removed more of the weed covering Middle Mill ponds.
- h. Governance MH and SS have received training on maintaining the parish council website. With Christine Scott joining the PC, a revised list of councillors' responsibilities is available on the website.

Report from the RFO and Bills Presented

The Clerk confirmed the income and expenses to date. The available balance as at 28th February was £9,790.13. It was agreed bills set out in the Schedule should be paid:

Clerk's laptop - £454 Clerk's laptop software - £53.48

Parish Online license - £40.50 Lurmer Street hedge cutting - £50

The meeting closed at 8.30pm.

The next meeting, the parish council's Annual General Meeting, will be held on **Monday 14th June at 7.00pm** via Zoom videoconferencing. Arrangements for the Annual Parish Meeting are uncertain, dependent upon the lifting of Covid restrictions.

Compost Corner

Early spring is one of the busiest times for gardeners but I've been reflecting on some of the jobs that I won't be doing because they are no longer necessary or indeed desirable as we try and lead more environmentally friendly lives. I certainly won't be scattering slug pellets and leave frogs, hedgehogs and thrushes to control slugs and snails and if you can't bear a few holes in your hosta's leaves replace them with ferns which aren't affected by our mollusc friends. Nor, thank goodness, will I be doing any double digging, a task that was once considered so vital but has now been discovered to damage soil's complex structure. Instead I will quite simply add a thick layer of mulch which will reduce evaporation, control annual weeds and gradually be incorporated by worms into the soil. And I won't be spraying to control insect pests because insecticides don't discriminate between bees, ladybirds, hover flies, aphids and caterpillars - they kill them all. If left alone a happy balance between pest and prey will be achieved. Which leaves plenty of time to enjoy all the glories of a Dorset Spring.
