On the shelf of the Friendship Garden Library

Is there any gardening bookshelf that doesn't have at least one guide by Dr D G Hessayon? The Friendship Garden library has several but not The House Plant Expert Book One. So, in advance of any leafy Christmas present that might be on its way from the garden centre to a home in Fontmell Magna Parish, the book from the shelf this month is The House Plant Expert Volume Two. Here is guidance on plants which have become readily



available since volume one was produced including the ubiquitous peace lily Spathiphyllum shown on the front cover.

Volume Two does what is says on the cover but as useful as the content is, a quick online delve into the life of D G Hessayon was interesting for what he later said about gardening books. British, he was born in 1923 to a Cypriot landowner. His work took him to the United States and the Gold Coast and then back to Manchester to obtain his doctorate. Later he became chairman of Pan Britannica Industries. He wrote over 60 "Expert Guides', (many are reprints) and received awards from amongst other institutions the Horticultural Society, in addition to three honorary doctorates and an OBE.

As long ago as 2009, The Guardian wrote of him that he is "the gardening equivalent of the repair manual, belts and braces as opposed to the frothy polar opposite of the glossy coffee table book". A private man, he ended his writing career by saving that books on technique generate less interest than books heavy with lavish photographs. Books now, he said, are about look at my garden, not about how to achieve the best from plants.

We are now proceeding with this - our original "Plan A" - which is likely to mean that we shall be looking for a little bit more funding from the community, and we will be in touch again when we have firmer details.

Our intention is to call a meeting of shareholders and residents to bring everybody fully up to date, as soon as possible.

#### **Councillor Resignations and Assignment of Responsibilities**

Regrettably Jeremy Long has resigned. Jeremy did some great work on tackling the issues and concerns that have arisen over the parish's roads and lanes, in particular safety along the A350.

Also this was the last PC meeting for Annie Newbury. Annie has brought to the forefront concern for the environment and wildlife, with her campaigns to preserve verges, organizing litter picks and promoting measure to combat climate change. We thank Annie for her contribution to our community over several years on the council.

Andrew Davis was elected as Vice-Chair of the Parish Council to replace Jeremy and will assume responsibility for highways matters.

Minutes of the Meetings on 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2021: These were approved unanimously.

#### **Matters Arising:**

**Speed Watch –** Peter Mole gave an update on Speed Indicator Devices. From several meetings and discussions with experts and other councillors, a new device has been identified that seems very promising for recording and deterring motorists who are speeding along the A350. Recent surveys have shown that over 1000 vehicles per week are exceeding the speed limit by more than 5mph. A trial of the device is being discussed with the Police and Dorset Highways officials; the PC is fully supportive and will help to meet the costs of the project. A concern was raised about compliance with data protection regulations which will be researched further.

**Chelwood House**, **North Street –** An enforcement investigation is ongoing regarding an apparent commercial business operating from this property.

Dorset County Ward Councillor's Report - Jane Somper's report is available on the PC website.

JS referred to several initiatives; full details are available in her report:

Domestic Abuse Strategy – Dorset Council is running a consultation on tackling domestic abuse over the next three years; residents are invited to respond to the proposals.

Gore Clump – Dorset Council is consulting on stopping off a section of Boundary Road.

SEND Strategy – Dorset Council has agreed £37.5m of funding over five years to improve the provision of support for children and young people with special needs and disabilities (SEND).

Grant to develop former council offices to provide new homes.

NHS Outpatient Assessment Centre – to be set up at South Walks House, Dorchester.

Dorset Library Consultation – residents are invited to respond on how they want to shape the use of libraries.

#### **Reports from Parish Councillors**

#### a. Planning

#### Pennyfarthing Homes Development, South Street, Fontmell Magna

A decision on planning permission to build 30 homes including 12 affordable homes is expected by Christmas: the development will incorporate a school drop-off area and public open spaces.

The PC approved two resolutions:

- 1. The Parish Council would in principle adopt the School Drop-Off area. This is conditional on the availability of a £40,000 maintenance contribution and that this money is ring-fenced for that sole purpose.
- 2. The Parish Council will not adopt the Public Open Spaces. Our view is that responsibility for these areas is better placed with the eventual residents of the development.

**Planning Applications** – MH confirmed there had been 5 new applications which were assessed by the Neighbourhood Plan Monitoring Group; their reports are available on the PC website.

The PC has no objections to 3 of the applications: Millbrook House, 18 St Andrews View, Willow Cottage.

The PC objected to 1 application: Manor Farm Barn, proposed play equipment.

Whilst the wooden construction of this large skateboard ramp is sympathetic to its surroundings, it clearly presents a clear noise nuisance to the immediate neighbours.

The PC will give conditional support to: Gable Cottage. This is an historic building, and to an extent the proposed work will help to maintain it. However, there are inconsistencies and the Conservation Officer may have reservations over the scale of the proposed works.

**b. Highways** – AS has contacted Dorset Highways to report blocked drains in North Street and near Springhead. These fall outside Highways' programme of drain cleaning for A and B roads so there may be a delayed response.

On A350 safety, AS has arranged a meeting with Dorset Highways to discuss options.

- **c. Environment Protection –** AN has investigated the possibility of installing an electric vehicle charging point in the village. This and other initiatives will be paused until a new councillor is recruited.
- **d. Social Infrastructure –** Robert McCurrach reported that the CLT application for grant funding from the Government's Community Ownership Fund was unsuccessful. Other options are being discussed around purchasing the village shop freehold. A members' public meeting will be held soon.
- e. District Liaison Nothing to report. A new councillor is needed to cover this area.
- **f. Footpaths –** A dog poo bin will be installed next week at the entrance to the Gallops on Fontmell Hill. The cost of emptying will be met by the PC.

Gore Farm has agreed to widen the bollard gap protecting the entrance to Chalk Pit carpark.

**g. Communications & Governance –** LK reported on her work to improve communications to resident about parish council matters and community events, using NextDoor, email contacts and the PC website. A presence on Facebook is being looked at, to link with other Facebook users in the parish.

MH reported that the achievement of a full council of 7 councillors was short-lived and efforts will now be made to fill the two new councillor vacancies.

#### Report from the RFO and Bills Presented

Current balance is £10,856.82. Current spending is well within the budget available.

It was agreed bills set out in the Schedule should be paid:

Clerk's salary and expenses - £386.90 Village Hall hire - £18

War Memorial maintenance - £25 Payroll services - £50.50

The RFO has prepared a Precept Plan for 2022/23. Various amendments were agreed to meet expected new cost items 2022/23. The RFO will issue a revised draft for discussion at the next PC meeting.

#### **Matters Arising from Recent Correspondence**

Church Street Grass Area - two residents have kindly offered to help with maintenance.

Gore Clump Stopping Up - the PC agreed to the proposals made by Dorset Council.

AOB - no items

Date of Next Meeting: The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> January 2022 in the Village Hall at 7.00pm.

#### **MINCE PIES**

- 1 Large jar mincemeat, 375g plain flour, 260g unsalted butter (softened), 125g caster sugar, 1 large egg.
- Step 1: Place the flour and butter into a bowl and rub together to a crumb consistency.
- Step 2. Add the caster sugar and 1 beaten egg and mix together.
- Step 3. Tip out onto a lightly floured surface and fold until the pastry comes together, be careful not to overmix. Wrap the pastry in clingfilm and chill for 10 minutes..



Step 5.Roll out the pastry to 3cm thick then cut 16 bases with a cutter (about 10cm) and place in muffin trays. Put 1 1/2 tbsp mincemeat in each and brush the edge of each pie with a little beaten egg. Reroll out the pastry to cut 16 7cm lids and place on top, then glaze with beaten egg.

Step 6. Bake for 15-20 minutes until golden brown.

#### **Fontmell Magna and District Society**

Friday 5<sup>th</sup> of November 2021 – Dick Stainer – "Afghanistan before the Taliban

After a long (Covid-driven) absence the Fontmell Society met on 5 November to hear Dick Stainer give a riveting talk and slide show about his days as a tour guide in Afghanistan. He found himself employed by a Geneva-based company to take mainly Swiss and Belgian tourists all over Afghanistan. He first showed slides of where Afghanistan was – landlocked by Iran to the West, Pakistan to the East and South, and the Soviets in the North. This was all long before the Soviet invasion (1979) and in the golden days when travelling overland through Turkey to Afghanistan was a rite of passage for some, although Dick's generally well-heeled clientele flew in and out of Kabul for their 3 week trip with Dick.

Dick reminded us that when he set off by Land Rover from Geneva and got as far as the Eastern border of Turkey, he was barely half-way to Afghanistan. He also described the patchwork quilt of ethnic tribes that make up the country - Pashtun, Tajik, Uzbek, Turkmen, (amongst many) with the Hazara (reputed to be the descendants of the Mongol invaders of the 13<sup>th</sup> Century) at the lowest level of the social order.

There followed slides of a younger Dick as he took groups of tourists to almost all parts of Afghanistan. There were pictures of Afghan faces, camp sites, his Land Rover on its side (Dick hadn't noticed that the road had been washed away – "We took everything out of it and tipped it upright again"), the mountains of the Centre, Bamyan, the plains of the South, bread-making Afghan-style together with many anecdotes. "We were once stopped by a policeman because some of my charges were travelling on the roof of the Land Rover to get a better view. There was a fine of a few dollars and Dick told the roofers that they should come down. "No, no" said the policeman, "You've paid the fine so they can stay up there." Such was Afghan logic.

The talk was well attended but for those who didn't make it, they missed a gem.

On Friday the 3<sup>rd</sup> of December we will have a talk by Julian Richards about his recent search for Mesolithic artefacts around Springhead.

#### **Compost Corner**

Latin is once again to be taught again in many schools and doubtless before long we'll have a plethora of little ones called Marcellus, Hortensia and Titus. And what a useful language it is especially in the horticultural world. All plants have a Latin name from the mightiest tree to a common weed - not one escapes, but what's the point. - what's wrong with plain English?

Plants can sometimes have dozens of common names - cow parsley is also known as: Queen Anne's Lace, keck, adder's meat, wild chervil, devil's weed, bad man's oatmeal, orchard weed, wild caraway, wild parsley and in France, celery. But it only has one Latin name, Anthriscus sylvestris and wherever you are in the world, that is its name.

You can also unravel a plant's attributes from its Latin name. Take for example Lavandula angustifolia 'Nana Alba', from this name we know that it has narrow leaves (angustifolia) is compact (nana) and white (Alba).

So don't be surprised if your little one requests 'Harrius Potter et Camera Secretorum' from Father Christmas and good luck reading it as a bedtime story.
