### **Community Speed Watch**

Have you seen 3 or 4 yellow clad beings lurking beside the A350 recently?

Community Speed Watch has resumed activities having been unable to carry out speed checks during the pandemic.

On Bank Holiday Monday (31<sup>st</sup>) the CSW team and one police staff member observed speeds on the A350 in South Street between 0900 and 1000. 268 vehicles passed and 12 were sufficiently in excess of the speed limit to be sent fixed penalty notices.

Motorcycles are often a problem in the village, particularly at weekends, both in terms of speed, which is dangerous to pedestrians, and also anti social noise. On the morning of the observations the police recording van had earlier been in Compton Abbas and observed a motorcyclist coming south who stopped, used the phone and then turned back towards Shaftesbury. Motorcycle groups are understood to send out "scouts" in advance of larger groups intending to use a route at high speed later in the day. During the Speed Watch session only three motorcycles were seen. They were in convoy, travelling at excessive speed, the leading registration number was recorded and a fixed penalty notice was subsequently sent to the registered keeper.

There is little doubt that Speed Watch makes our winding and narrow roads less dangerous. The police would like residents to advise them of any near miss incidents. I have recently taken over as Co-ordinator from Robert McCurrach and would be pleased to hear from anyone wishing to join the convivial band of volunteers who seek to make Fontmell a safer place.

### **Annual General Meeting**

**Election of a Chairman 2021-22:** Cllr Humphreys was nominated and there being no other nominations was duly elected. MH notified the council that 2021/22 will be his last year on the council as he will be stepping down in May 2022.

Election of a Vice-Chairman 2021-22: Cllr Long was nominated and there being no other nominations was duly elected.

### **Appointment of Councillor Responsibilities for 2021-22:**

**Planning** - planning applications, Neighbourhood Plan, Planning Working Group, planning regulations. Cllr Humphreys

Trees - applications for tree works, encouraging tree planting. Cllr Long

**Highways** - road maintenance, signage and potholes, traffic management, Speed Watch, strategic planning, A350CG. Cllr Long

**Environmental Protection** - flood protection, grit/salt bins, verges, litter and fly tipping, grass cutting, grounds and hedgerow maintenance, dog fouling, encouraging tree planting, Best Kept Village. Cllr. Newbury

**Social Infrastructure** - maintenance of parish council assets, Home Watch, defibrillators, broadband and mobile coverage, recreation, allotments, Village Hall liaison. Cllr Scott (currently assisted by Cllr Newbury)

**District Liaison** - Police, health & medical services (e.g., Patient Partnership Group, Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group, Shaftesbury Hospital), DAPTC, Dorset Unitary Council, neighbouring Parish Councils, Compton Abbas airfield. Cllr Humphreys

Parish Communications - vacant

Footpaths and Rights of Way - Cllr Main

**Governance** - procedures, new councillor recruitment and induction, councillor training, Annual Parish Report, risk management, contingency planning. Cllr Humphreys

The Parish Council is still actively seeking to recruit 2 more Cllrs.

**Finance:** The PC accounts have been approved by the internal auditor and will be made available on the parish website for residents to review. The financial year started with an opening balance of £7,702.05 and closed with a balance of £7,073.64. Income in 2020/21 was £9,209.63 and expenditure was £9,838.04. The small overspend was due to recruitment of a new clerk and purchasing a staff laptop. The period of inspection of the accounts started on  $14^{th}$  June and runs for 30 days.

Fontmell Magna PC Risk Assessment: A risk assessment for 2021/22 was approved.

### **Parish Council Meeting**

**Declarations of Interest: None** 

Minutes of the Meeting on 8<sup>th</sup> March 2021: These were approved unanimously.

### **Matters Arising:**

**Variable Speed Indicator –** A resident's suggestion to install a variable speed indicator along the A350 through the village was raised again. The advice from Highways is that the benefit is marginal, but the PC undertook to keep the matter under review.

**Hedge on Lurmer Street –** The overgrown hedge was eventually trimmed by a private contractor and replacement trees planted. The PC met the cost of £795.

### **Reports from Parish Councillors**

**a.** Planning – MH confirmed there had been 5 new applications which were assessed by the Neighbourhood Plan Monitoring Group; their reports are available on the PC website. The PC had no objection to 4 applications: Glevum House, Land at Penn Hill, 38 South Street and Bedchester House. The PC objected to 1 application: barn erection on Land at Gupples Farm. The application at 54 West Street went to Dorset Council Planning Committee and was approved.

The proposed development of 30 homes on Land at Home Farm, South Street, continues to await a decision on the planning application. The developer has agreed with Dorset Council the basic components of the S106 Agreement and has also set aside money to replace the play equipment in the Village Hall children's' playground. The PC has been approached to adopt the school drop-off zone which includes 19 parking spaces and the open-spaces within the development; this is being discussed with the developer.

- **b.** Highways JL reported that West Street is due to be resurfaced along with Church St; also Woodbridge Lane and Hannah's Lane. Gupples Lane is being reviewed by Highways as it's in a poor state. The side-road junctions at Gore Clump on the C13 are being revised to improve safety. An accident occurred outside the Fontmell Pub; road markings will be reviewed at a result.
- **c. Environment Protection –** AN reported that "Clean it Up (dog waste)" signs have been placed along Penn Hill, but signs at the Gossip Tree have been removed with the cable ties cut; they'll be re-instated. The annual litter pick is on hold until the Autumn. Prince Charles' campaign for tree planting for the Jubilee in 2022 will be supported if a suitable site can be found.
- **d. Social Infrastructure –** CS has assumed the Village Hall liaison role for the PC. A new initiative called "Chase & Chalke Landscape" has been set up by the Cranborne Chase AONB office. CS expressed a vote of thanks to the Village Shop for all their support over the pandemic and a request made to keep supporting the shop and tearoom.
- **e. Footpaths –** AM reported that a local permissive footpath that runs from Fontmell's West Street to Sutton Waldron has been closed by the landowner and the land is for sale. This footpath has been used regularly by walkers for more than 30 years. A plea to the owner to re-open the path has been rejected. Representations will continue to try to get the footpath re-opened, with help from the Dorset Council Rangers team.
- h. Governance –With Christine Scott joining the PC, a revised list of councillors' responsibilities is available on the website

### The Friendship Garden Library

As well as social prescribing and offering flowers for all, the Friendship Garden next to the village hall has been fortunate in acquiring over 40 books with which to form a small gardening library, free for anyone to use. Many people from Fontmell Magna Parish and beyond have generously donated or lent books and The Potting Shed in Swan's Yard, Shaftesbury has very kindly contributed others. Thank you all.

The variety of the books is testament to how diverse gardening can be. Subjects range from how to make a wildflower meadow to the great trees of Dorset, memoirs to handbooks for garden design. There are amongst others, books on pests and diseases, ground cover, using polytunnels, rejuvenating a tired garden and gardening in an allotment. Also, manuals and encyclopaedia, books by well-known gardeners and others by specialists and an extensive range of gardening magazines collected over years it seems. The library really does cover most needs. A list of all the books is on the PC website and also in a blue folder with the books.'

Library books are numbered with three digits (the numbers don't have a system) which is just inside the cover. They are grouped into four categories at the moment:

General gardening related texts

How to and specialist skills

Design

Encyclopaedia

They are on the shelves of a lovely wooden cabinet, also kindly donated, in the committee room of the village hall. Anyone can use the Friendship Garden Library. All that is needed is for borrowers to write the number of the book they are taking in the small floral notebook in the cabinet, along with their name and the date borrowing began. It would be helpful to check the book back in within a fortnight by writing the date the book was returned.

The village hall will be open during the summer on Wednesday afternoons for the Pop-Up Café between 2 and 4pm and this would be a very good time to browse or borrow. Other times can be arranged by emailing:



A good old favourite is tradescantia, named after John Tradescant a 17c plant collector and it originally came from America. It's such an accommodating plant, virtually indestructible and so easy to propagate. On holiday in Montenegro by the Adriatic Sea

I spotted a huge tradescantia purpurea, a beautiful variety which has elegant elliptic leaves and little pink flowers, covering a steep bank within a garden; but the plant isn't frost hardy and in this country is best kept indoors.

And another 1970s comeback is the colour brown, now being described as tobacco, chocolate and russet; so ditch your grey and get painting.
