We have not yet had any response, and the latest indications are that we are unlikely to hear before the middle of November whether our application has been successful or not.


In the meantime, Chris Dymond and his team are getting everything ready to ensure that we can move forward, as appropriate, as soon as we know the outcome of our application.

## Councillors Chronicles No.7 – Register of Interest

With two new councillors on board, Laura and Andrew, it's great to have a full complement of councillors once again after several years of being understrength. However, as it happens, we will be seeking a new councillor in the New Year as Annie will be stepping down. We're sorry to see Annie go, she's done a great job, but it does create an opportunity for a new person to join the parish council, and play a part in creating a friendly and helpful community, bringing people together and supporting each other when needed.

One of the first duties of a new councillor is to complete a Register of Interests form. Dorset Council decided some time ago to replace the paper forms with a digital on-line service with the benefits of "giving greater flexibility to elected mem-

bers and ease of use and far less hassle for Clerks". The new system was launched on 1st October and councillors have until 31st October to submit their registers.

The Register of Interests is a safeguard to ensure councillors are transparent in declaring their pecuniary interests, which could potentially give rise to a conflict when a particular issue comes before the Parish Council, eq. a planning application or awarding a contract. The key categories are employment, contracts and land (including your home) but covers a range of other categories. It also applies to a spouse/civil partner with whom you live.

Every councillor must make a declaration and it must be kept up to date and accessible for all the time a councillor is in office. The Councillors Register of Interests will be available to the public to view on the Dorset Council website https:// www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/.


We started (and ended) at the Old Ox Inn - which provided most of us with smashing freshly cooked pizzas and welcome drinks - for the dogs as well as the humans.

## On the Shelf of the Friendship Garden library

Gardening Through the Year by Ian Spence for the Royal Horticultural Society is a good manual for novices who are planning the gardening year ahead.



Each monthly chapter has clear advice on what to do, how to do it, recommended seasonal plants and reassurance like these words on timing, which although important, "Nature has a way of balancing things out, and even if you think you are very late sowing those hardy annuals or planting out the summer bedding plants, they can still surprise you by growing and flowering beautifully, just at the right time".

In the chapters on November and December, readers are encouraged to do some early garden spring-cleaning and to think about what they would their garden to offer over the next twelve months. And when everything looks like it's going to struggle to overcome winter there are cheery words on plants that will bloom now until spring arrives, despite unfriendly weather. Most encouraging is advice on digging beds which is that if a bed has been prepared properly at the start of its life, letting worms and beetles and other insects keep it turned over and therefore healthy, there is no need to dig it again.

One practise that has been challenged since this 2001 edition was printed, is the guidance on clearing autumnal debris such as leaves and dead material which brings us back to insects. Dan Pearson writing in The Times in the middle of October suggests "Tread lightly on the land. Everybody can do something to improve the environment with thoughtful integrated planning and not being too neat. Leave your garden standing until late winter, because all foliage that drops into the ground will be taken by earthworms. You complete a cycle. You don't interrupt it by tidying too quickly. That improves soil fertility and the soil balance. Which means that your plants grow better".

Maybe some gardeners would prefer to stay with Mr Spence's suggestions, not wanting to see browned leaves swirling in the wind waiting for the worms to do their job or remembering to take extra care on leaf slippery paths, it is a gardening dilemma. Either way, this colourful, helpful book sets out a clear path to an accomplished garden.

#### **FONTMELL FRIENDSHIP GARDEN**

Although Autumn is upon us, the garden has been very busy.

In the last six weeks, all the tubs around the village hall have been emptied and re planted with plants for spring - tulips, pansies, wallflowers and sweet williams. We have planted flowers in our red and white theme to celebrate next year's platinum celebrations and more flowers will be added where appropriate.

When you walk around the garden, you will see beds have already been planted for over wintering.

The long St Andrew's school bed is planted with foxgloves, tulips, allium, wallflowers and pansies.

Additional beds are all being planted to represent our fantastic clubs in the village.

The garden club have a fabulous crown themed regal bed at the entrance to the garden, which is already full of plants and is looking wonderful.

The Fontmell Under Fives have been planting golden tulips this week in their green troughs.

The bowls club bed is full of suitably "ball "themed flowers - million bells, allium, sweet williams and a white pom pom dahlia will be a central focal point.

I have also received fantastic plans from moviola, the craft club and the art club and planting will be starting soon- it is going to be stunning!

Finally - we had the MOST fabulous day on October 7th, when we welcomed the whole of St Andrew's School to the village hall to plant yellow daffodils to raise awareness of Hello Yellow day - a national day to raise awareness of mental health as part of Young Minds.

All the children planted daffodils, wore yellow clothes, had yellow food and drink kindly donated by Waitrose and complete yellow craft activities prepared by Sue Jones.

There were ten wonderful volunteers who helped out and it was such an uplifting experience for everyone.

The Clayesmore year 12 volunteer students completed the week with mass crocus planting on October 8th.

In the last six weeks, we have welcomed Fontmell Under Fives, St Andrew's School and Clayesmore to the garden, in addition to all our fantastic volunteers in the village - truly a cross generational project.

Lots more planting will be happening in the next few weeks and seeds will be distributed for planting and over wintering. Thank you as always to everyone who helps in so many ways - There were so many comments made about the garden in the fab Fair on Saturday.

## Fontmell Magna goes yellow for Mental Health and Wellbeing


The village of Fontmell Magna turned yellow on Thursday 7th October as part of Mental Health Week. The #HelloYellow campaign by the charity Young Minds, saw pupils from the local primary school and members of the community come together – whilst wearing yellow – to take part in an inter-generational project at the heart of the community.

Over one hundred daffodil bulbs were planted outside the village hall by the children, with support from villagers. A team of local residents also put on some fun craft activities for the children—helping them to create bright yellow cardboard sunflowers and daffodils. The younger children helped to decorate the village's 'Friendship Garden' with a collection of knitted bumblebees made by volunteers, and admired the work that has been taking place at the garden, with themed flower beds being planted by different community groups.

The event was organised Debbie Brown (Headteacher of St Andrew's CE Primary School) and local resident Sian Highnam, who has been instrumental in setting up the Friendship Garden. Sian ran the London Marathon this month, and in support of this, pupils from the school took part in a scaled down version of her run, and talked about the importance of exercise for good mental health. At the end of the day the children had an assembly about the importance of mental health and wellbeing, and Sian joined the children to talk about the marathon and show them her medal! The day also raised a fantastic £125 for the Young Minds charity.

Headteacher Debbie Brown said 'It was a magical day from the start, with so many children turning up in sunshine yellow. We have run, planted, created, sung, danced and laughed our way to great wellbeing today. This community are very special and came out in full force to help us focus on this important issue for young people. The school and Fontmell villagers will be planning lots more events together; without a doubt we all felt lifted by today'.

Sian said "What a joy it was to welcome the whole school community of St Andrew's Primary School to our community village hall and to the Fontmell Friendship Garden.





I happened across a very pretty pelargonium whilst on holiday and managed to track it down online but the plant came with a warning, it was 'poisonous to dogs'. And was this pelargonium poisonous for children too and indeed anyone else? That didn't seem relevant. Of course one does have to be cautious, there are some plants that are so toxic I would definitely avoid them - monkshood

(Aconitum) is one and if ingested in large doses will cause almost instantaneous death', not a winning description.

Anyway, I'm now the proud owner of the pretty pelargonium which turned out to be a variety called 'Millfield', its delicate, small pink flowers are very reminiscent of Rosa Bonica, and to date Ludo our Labrador has shown no interest in it whatsoever, culinary or otherwise.
