# Moth-spotting at Springhead—Aug 16, 2021

Ducks and swans have always been appreciated on Springhead's lake, but we've recently been finding out about some of

the smaller and more hidden creatures to be found in our 15 acres of gardens and grounds.

The Small Elephant Hawk-moth (pictured) is just one of more than 250 moth species recorded this summer by moth expert Tim Norriss. Found in one of Springhead's orchards, this species lives in chalk grassland and other areas where it can find foodplants such as Honeysuckle and campions.

Other moths (pictured top to bottom below) collected in moth traps and photographed by Bill Raymond include the Lappet moth, which looks like a cluster of dried leaves; the Privet Hawk-moth – the largest hawk-moth in the UK; and the Poplar Hawk-moth, which doesn't feed as an adult but eats poplar and willow leaves as a caterpillar.

The results of the moth survey, the wider invertebrate survey and other surveys including the bird survey carried out in the

early summer, are helping to build up a picture of the biodiversity supported by Springhead's rich and varied habitats and how best to conserve it. 'Knowing which insects, birds, small mammals and other wildlife are found at Springhead helps us to manage the gardens and grounds in the best way to ensure there is appropriate food and shelter for the different species' says Edward Parker, the charity's Director.



# Growing to give—Sep 1, 2021

Food charities have been facing a significant rise in demand for food since the start of the pandemic, and the Springhead

Trust is now working with a new national scheme to help supply fresh vegetables for the local community.

Since the summer of 2020 Springhead has been contributing produce from the productive gardens to Open House, the weekly support service for local families in need in the Shaftesbury area.

In May 2021, Open House developed Open Fridge – a community fridge and freezer in a shipping container, which is open three days a week. Produce from Springhead which is not used by Open House now goes to the Open Fridge, explains Catherine Simmonds, Co-ordinator of Springhead's Productive Gardens project: 'This allows a much larger range of fresh and frozen donations to be accepted. 'We've therefore been able to contribute boxes of fresh produce and feel confident that they can be used. This month we've delivered fresh courgettes, beans, tomatoes and cucumbers.'

Under the banner of Grow to Give – a national scheme which links growers, allotment holders and school gardens to their local foodbank via on-site collection boxes – Springhead is now a partner with Shaftesbury's Mampitts and St James allotments and Shaftesbury Home Grown community farm. The scheme reduces food waste as well as providing home-grown vegetables for the community.

# Hands on History— Sep 9 2021

## Mesolithic flint blades and iron age pottery are among the exciting finds dug up by volunteers as part of an archae-

#### ological project being carried out at Springhead this summer and autumn.

The project has focussed on a series of test pits dug in 'Milcreats', the field just beyond Springhead's car park, alongside the footpath from the village. It is being led by Julian Richards, archaeologist and broadcaster, who has for a long time been interested in the Mesolithic people who lived in and around Springhead in the middle stone age – between 12,000 and 7,000 years ago. 'We're hoping to tell the story of the field, starting in Mesolithic times when hunter gatherers would probably have come to the area in search of wild animals that drank from the natural springs. This was before people started changing the land by farming it, and wolves, bears and beavers would have roamed around, so it was a very different world.'

The volunteers, some of whom are from local archaeological societies, but also include interested local residents, have also found things from other periods of history and pre-history. 'There are bronze age barrows on the hill from the time when the fields were first cultivated' says Julian, 'so we weren't surprised to find bits of bronze age pottery in the field which may have been thrown out with animal manure. We're also keeping things from more recent history – even an old rusty monkey wrench which helps to build a picture of the field's past!' The team is also digging test pits in other parts of the Springhead site, and recently found a rammed chalk wall in one of the kitchen garden's raised beds which could be part of a much earlier mill building, built before brick was available.

Now that evidence of layers of prehistory and history have been found, Julian hopes to dig many more test pits and, depending on the results, carry out more extensive excavations. 'I would love to find evidence of the temporary dwellings that Mesolithic people lived in.'Meanwhile, he'd like to involve more local residents and school children: 'The more people that get involved the better – people really enjoy it, and for children, digging in the dirt and finding stuff is a good way of learning about the past'. The first find from the first metre-square test pit was one of the distinctive and beautifully worked long flint blades that Mesolithic people used. 'The 14-year-old volunteer who picked it up was the first person to have held it for at least 7,000 years. That's hands-on history'.

#### **Co-option of Councillors and Role Assignments**

We're delighted to co-opt two new members of the Parish Council.

Laura Kurton, living in Bedchester, will lead on parish communications covering the website, email groups, social media, notice boards, Annual Parish Report. Laura is also willing to help organize community events and will liaise with the Village Hall Committee.

Andrew Davis, living in Parsonage Street, will work on planning matters, covering planning applications, neighbourhood plan updates, NP Monitoring Group, planning regulations.

Minutes of the Meetings on 27th May 2021: These were approved unanimously.

#### Matters Arising:

**Frequency of Meetings –** Now that the council is at full strength, the frequency of meetings will revert to bi-monthly. Meetings will be held in January, March, May (plus AGM & Annual Parish Meeting), July, September and November.

**Neighbourhood Plan** – a second draft of Dorset Council's Local Plan is expected in early 2022 with implications for housing growth in Fontmell Magna village. Also the Government may bring forward proposals soon to change the national planning system. Thus it seems prudent to wait for these developments to materialize and then update the Neighbourhood Plan later in 2022.

Dorset County Ward Councillor's Report - Jane Somper's report is available on the PC website.

JS made reference to a consultation on the Dorset Rights of Way Improvement Plan.

#### **Reports from Parish Councillors**

**a. Planning** – MH confirmed there had been 9 new applications which were assessed by the Neighbourhood Plan Monitoring Group; their reports are available on the PC website.

The PC posted no objections to 8 of the applications.

The PC objected to 1 application: Grove Farm, Hannah's Hill, to erect a 2 storey extension and demolish a lean-to building. The proposed extension does not relate to the scale or setting of the Grade II listed building and its severe lines are out of character in terms of form, materials and layout. Therefore, it would not comply with Policy FM9 of the Neighbourhood Plan.

The proposed development of 30 homes on Land at Home Farm, South Street, continues to await a decision on the planning application. JS reported that the Planning Officer's report is being prepared and the S106 agreement finalized. A decision on the planning application is expected in October.

Residents have expressed concerns over an apparent commercial business operating from Chelwood House in North Street. An enforcement investigation is being conducted by Dorset Council Planning Team.

The Village Hall is proposing to install a small shipping container to store equipment etc.

**b.** Highways – JL reported on more traffic related incidents on the A350, two vehicular crashes at the Mill Street crossroads and a wall knocked down opposite Parsonage Street. Peter Mole for the Speedwatch team estimated that over 1,000 vehicles per week were exceeding the speed limit by more than 5mph. A lively discussion ensued on the best way to tackle the problems including a one-way system, traffic lights, raised kerbstones, variable speed indicator device. The Parish Council agreed to fund a traffic survey (approx. £300) to establish the benefits of installing Speed Indicator Devices and where best to locate them along the A350. Some fund-raising activities would be needed to take forward the purchase of devices, possible sharing them with other parishes.

**c.** Environment Protection – AN reported that the School defibrillator continues to be checked regularly. A dog waste bin has been requested from Dorset Council to be placed at the entrance to the Gallops on Fontmell Hill. A request has been made to the Gore Farm Estate to increase the gap width between the concrete bollards at Chalk Pit carpark on Fontmell Hill.

**d. Social Infrastructure –** CS reported that Fontmell Magna's participation in the "Chase & Chalke Landscape" initiative, run by Cranborne Chase AONB, will centre on mapped out walks around the village area. CS also reported on recent Village Hall activities, with many clubs and societies re-starting their programmes and planned projects in the Friendship Garden.

Robert McCurrach reported that the FM Community Land Trust has raised over £200,000 towards buying the freehold of the Village Shop. A grant application has been submitted to the Government's Community Ownership Fund to secure the additional capital needed.

e. District Liaison – DAPTC is providing training on the new Code of Conduct, recommended to all councillors.

f. Footpaths - No report available.

**g.** Governance – With Laura and Andrew joining the council, a revised list of councillors' responsibilities is available on the website; new councillor training will be provided. An online Register of Interests for councillors comes into force in October, replacing the paper forms.

#### Report from the RFO and Bills Presented

Current balance is £7,865.

It was agreed bills set out in the Schedule should be paid:

Clerk's salary and expenses - £394.82 Churchyard grant - £400

Code of Conduct training - £30

The RFO will prepare a Precept Plan for 2022/23. Councillors are to advise of any anticipated costs in 2022/23.

#### AOB

Annie (AN) advised that regrettably she will be standing down at the year-end due to other commitments.

Residents reported that several traffic signs are overgrown by hedges along the parish's road and lanes. It is the landowner's responsibility to keep these signs clearly visible to all road users.

The meeting closed at 8.30pm.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> November 2021 in the Village Hall at 7.00pm. A guest speaker from the police will be invited to the meeting to speak on Fraud Protection; an earlier start time will be advised if needed.

#### **On The Shelf**

The Gossip Tree has included from time to time, requests (from Annie Newbury especially) for gardeners to resist cutting lawns and grassy patches so that our local plants provide more food for pollinators. Well done to the Village Hall Committee for a bank of yarrow, vetch and clover!

The Friendship Garden bookcase is home to several books on wildflower gardening and Making a Wildflower Meadow by Pam Lewis is one of them. It was printed in 2003 and is a history of the author's successful efforts to improve plant diversity on her once 'horse-sick' pasture. Some readers may have visited her meadows at Sticky Wicket near Buckland Newton before they closed in 2008. It was a truly magical place of peace and knowledge.

Although the book is nearly twenty years old now, it is a useful manual on how to turn exhausted or underutilised land (lawns) into something much more productive. And it is a relevant book to gardeners because 97% of vital pollinator rich grassland has been lost in the past 60 years, 13 bees species have become extinct since 1900, 35 are threatened, 75% of main food crops worldwide are pollinated by bees. With no bees or other pollinators, it would cost £1.8bn every year to pollinate food crops by hand (data from FoE). Lewis writes that if 10% of the vast acreage of gardens in this country were left to flower they would provide 10,000 acres for butterflies, bees and other wildlife.



Her book examines several different ecologies but one of the most useful to many of us might be the section on the Garden Meadow Lawn, a wildlife friendly lawn that is smart and easy to maintain or the Mini Meadow, a tiny patch of rescued turf seeding successfully on hard core and gravel.

One highly practical suggestion: Lewis writes "In a very limited space I would choose [to grow] common knapweed above all other meadow plants. It is suitably competitive in grass, visited by masses of nectar seeking insects and it flowers prettily for almost three months." Seeds are available from Landlife Wildflowers, perhaps Fontmell Magna could become a pretty knapweed village?

# Iwerne Valley Walking Group—Damerham walk September 2021

Seven of us met in the Compasses Inn car park after a slightly delayed start. I managed to get a puncture on the way (fixed in ten minutes!).
