The Directors are delighted to say that FMCLT has now been able to raise a total of £385,000 for the proposed purchase of the Village Shop freehold. Of this, £205,000 comes from shareholders' pledges (as previously advised). The balance is being provided, in 5-year interest-free loans, by members of the community who wish to remain anonymous. The Directors are proceeding with the preparation of the necessary legal documentation and due diligence, and are very grateful for this extra support.

This total amount is at the lower end of the amounts foreseen in the Prospectus. This is because we do not now need a commercial mortgage, which would have incurred costs. However, a slower build-up of surpluses may mean that the ability to provide funds for community projects will be delayed.

The next stage will be to press on with purchasing the freehold, as agreed in principle with the freeholder. We have appointed a solicitor and the normal searches and pre-contract work are now under way.

Friday 3rd of December 2021 – Julian Richards – "Finding Flints in Fontmell"

If you had been living in the Middle Stone Age about seven thousand years ago you would not have wanted to meet an angry auroch on a dark night. These were a fearsome type of cattle (now extinct) with huge horns that roamed the land along with wolves and bears.

It is well known that humans at that time were hunter gatherers, always on the move in search of food. In fact, however, there are places by rivers and springs where people stayed put and the food came to them in the form of fish in the water and animals coming to drink. There is a Mesolithic site next to the A303 where footprints of aurochs have been found in swampy ground by a spring. The aurochs came to drink, got stuck in the mud, aand were killed and carved up with tools of flint.

Julian is an archaeologist specialising in the Stone Age periods and was interested when Judy and Peter Westgate showed him the flints that had been found in their garden. He started work on the Springhead Project, following a previous visit with local schoolchildren, in August 2021. So far the project team has successfully dug 31 test pits and many beautiful flints have been found. Animals clearly came to drink at the spring and what Julian would really like would be to find a base camp, a site of more settled habitation, with animal bones. He will therefore keep digging and everyone is warmly welcome to come and look and participate. In particular, if anyone finds worked flints in their garden, he would be grateful if you could contact him via the Springhead office.

Our next talk is in the New Year on Friday the 4th of February. We will have a talk by Sir John Stuttard, a former Lord Mayor of London, about his experiences on the Peking to Paris Motor Challenge 1997.

THANK YOU TO WONDERFUL, GENEROUS PEOPLE

When the news reports showed the desperate situation at Kabul airport during the evacuation from Afghanistan, many of us were deeply moved. These were people in urgent fear, escaping with nothing more than their lives. A Salisbury pub began a collection of clothing, but it was all going to Care4Calais where the warehouses were already full, with no means of distribution.

Eventually, we found a small group in Wiltshire with direct access to the Afghan families, who were glad to receive anything we could gather. We had to wait for phone calls, where to meet - each different rendezvous an hour's drive away - as security for the Afghan translators' families was paramount.

We were amazed to fill a whole carload - our family and our kind Iwerne neighbours gave warm coats, men's and women's jumpers, men's shoes, and shirts, and socks. We'd heard that having lost everything, it meant so much to be given even a toothbrush which was their own - so we bought 100 toothbrushes from Amazon, and our dentist gave three boxes of toothpaste samples.

Then *more* people gave *more* warm clothing.

The idea of Harvest Festival seemed perfect: thinking of the Bible passage about Ruth, where we read of generosity towards incomers - and we asked each of the five local churches to consider inviting donations of warm clothing for all ages, from babies upwards. St Andrew's, Fontmell agreed to be the collection point for gifts.

Your wonderful gifts arrived in bags and cases, Barry's 'Afghan box' was filled to overflowing, and still more people gave their gifts - from a young mum who brought 3 bags of baby clothes to someone giving her late father's treasured coat. We have taken FOUR bulging car-loads to various different rendezvous with our contacts. The Afghan families - beginning to feel more settled as their children start going to school - have asked us to pass on their overwhelming thanks and gratitude to all these amazingly generous people.

On the Shelf of the Friendship Garden Library

Big Leaves for Exotic Effect by Stephen Griffith,

published by the Guild of Master Craftsmen Publications

In miserable January here is a book to take the imagination to verdant places far away from those we usually associate with British wintertime. It is, Stephen Griffiths makes clear "not a book for the botanist ... It is written for gardeners, landscape architects or nurseymen who, like me, have been seduced by the almost alien effect that can be achieved by integrating tropical looking plants and large leaved exotics into a cooler climate."

There are many photographs, most of them taken on the Ilchester Estates in Somerset which shows just what can be achieved in a temperate climate with the knowledge and guidance this author enthusiastically shares.

From November 1990 (just after the great storm) to the present, Griffiths has been the Curator at Abbotsbury Sub Tropical Gardens, responsible for implementing the restoration of the historic woodland garden. In the mid C19th the traditional garden was encouraged to colonise the 100-year-old woodland so that shade, shelter and moisture the trees provided offered ideal conditions for newly collected plants from, especially, the Himalayas, China and Japan which thrived.

When Griffith began work at Abbotsbury he devised a ten-year plan for improving the horticultural content, garden infrastructure, marketing and tourism. Today it is known for its notable display of Rhododendron, Hydrangea and charming Victorian Garden and for us, is a delightful alternative to waiting till spring to start growing our own.



Compost Corner

There was a time when a map was an essential tool for navigation but with the onset of Satnav that has all changed. Of course there are all sorts of maps: geological, meteorological, wine. But right now, there's another map in the making, and it's a huge multi-continental undertaking: a map of fungi - the underground mycorrhizal systems that are so vital to our complex ecosystem. We may just think about fungi in simplistic terms; edible fungi like mushrooms or destructive ones (for our ornamental garden plants) like honey fungus but without mycorrhizal fungi, to quote 'Dad's Army's', Pte James Frazer, "we're doomed". They are essential not only for soil structure and fertility but also the global carbon cycle. Furthermore, like so much of the natural world, there's huge concern about the

loss of these fungi. There are only a ful of fungi hotspots in the world (none U.K.) and by mapping them it is hoped will be protected for the health of our et. On a smaller scale it's recommendincorporate mycorrhizal fungi when ing bare rooted roses for example fungi comes in granular form and you ly sprinkle it onto the roots. It really help your new planting to get off to a start.
