#### **IWERNE VALLEY WALKING GROUP**

#### Ashmore Wood on Saturday 23 April 2022

Phyl and I had been blown over by the carpet of bluebells amongst beech trees in Ashmore Wood a couple of years ago. wanted to share this with the walking group but we needed to work out a route that would work with somewhere to have lunch. Whereas traditionally bluebells tend to appear in May, with global warming it seems to be a lot earlier now so we suggested leading a walk in April, taking pot luck that the bluebells would be at their best on the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday of April (a week later because of Easter the week before). Helen and I did a recce and promptly got lost but eventually came across the same area of bluebells but none of it was as lush as I'd remembered them. However, by 23rd April it seems they peaked (see below) and it was also much less muddy. We planned to include Compton Abbas Airfield into the walk but they were only allowing members to use their indoor café and wouldn't allow parking when not there. So we went for a simple 4.3 mile walk in the woods, then drove to the King John for lunch.

Twenty-one people (including 3 members of my family who were visiting from the US and Kent) were booked on the walk but this reduced to 17 due to various ailments. As we walked down from Ashmore pond towards the woods, while horse riders went up the hill to our right, 4 hares were seen bounding across the field. We also spotted a kite overhead being teased by a crow. The weather was dry but overcast and windy with no sun shining through the trees. But suitable gasps were heard as we came to the beech tree part of the wood with its huge expanse of blue carpet. Further down there bluebells gave way to wild garlic. 9 of us had a lovely lunch at the King John where some sampled Gritchie's beer from Guy Ritchie's brewery.

#### THE FARRANT SINGERS

On the 5<sup>th</sup> May we were treated to a wonderful concert in St Andrew's Church, with the Farrant Singers. Tickets were sold in aid of improved accessibility at the church, and there was a retiring collection in aid of Ukraine. The Farrant Singers are the longest-established chamber choir in Salisbury, founded in 1958, and they brought us a programme of choral music, with an underlying theme of Light

Their opening number was a twentieth century rendering of the ancient hymn "Hail Gladdening Light", by David Briggs, a very skilful rendering of a difficult piece. We then jumped back several centuries, with plainchant, followed by two very beautiful (and equally beautifully sung) Tudor motets by Robert White and William Byrd. To take us to the interlude, we heard a Nunc Dimittis by Palestrina.

To give the singers a well-earned break, Chris Mahon on the organ gave us a Bach Prelude in G, followed by a whimsical rendering of the well-known "English Country Garden".

The singers returned with a thoughtful rendering of the State Anthem of Ukraine. This was a moving reminder of one of the concert's aims, to raise funds for Ukraine.

Back to the twentieth century (just), with two motets, one by the American Eric Whitacre, the other by Sir William Harris (to words by John Dunne), followed by a Nunc Dimittis by Gustav Holst, after which we had two Bach chorales.

As a finale, the choir split, with half at the back, and half at the front of the nave, to give us a thrilling performance of Charles Wood's version of Hail Gladdening Light.

It was a great privilege to hear live music performed with such precision and skill, by an enthusiastic choir, led by their dynamic and sensitive conductor, Andrew Mackay.

Our thanks to Andrew and the Farrant Singers for a brilliant concert. Let us hope we can hear live music in St Andrews again before long.

#### **IWERNE VALLEY WALKING GROUP**

#### Saturday 21st May 2022 - Walk from Chetnole near Sherborne.

On a sunny Saturday in May 12 walkers and 2 dogs gathered in the car park of the Chethole Inn. We set off just after 10:30 with a promise of the first point of interest on this walk, a remote railway halt. Chethole station is a request stop on the Dorchester to Yeovil line.

Over the fields and into the woods following a bubbling stream. The ground was a carpet of white wild garlic flowers and hidden between them early purple orchids.



Leaving the wood we came across a trig point half way up a hill! It was a good spot to stop and enjoy the far reaching views and take some photos.

Through a farm yard and into the hamlet of Melbury Bubb we reached the next point of interest, St Marys. A 12<sup>th</sup> century church that has no electricity and is lit by oil lamps and warmed with a wood burning stove. The font is upside down. It was thought to be the original preaching stone on the site before the church was built.

We continued over the railway bridge and into fields and fields of golden buttercups.

Returning to the village of Chetnole we called in the church before enjoying an excellent lunch in the very hospitable and charming pub.

#### **Annual General Meeting**

**Welcome & Apologies** – MH welcomed members of the public attending. Apologies were received from Laura Kurton and Jane Somper.

**Election of Chairman 2022-23 –** MH has stepped down after 3 years in post but will continue as a councillor. Andrew Davis was elected as the new chairman of the Parish Council. AD proposed a vote of thanks to MH for his service as chairman.

Election of Vice-Chairman 2022-23 - Laura Kurton was elected unanimously as vice-chair.

Assignment of Councillors Responsibilities - Councillors agreed to take the lead over council matters as follows:

Planning – Mike Highways – Andrew Environmental Protection – Vacant

District Liaison - Vacant Communications - Laura Social Infrastructure - Christine

Footpaths - Andy Governance - Andrew

Public Open Forum – no questions or issues of concern were raised by the residents present.

Parish Council Annual Report 2021-22 – the report is available on the PC website and was well received as a record of the PC's achievements and activities through the past year (worthwhile bedtime reading for all residents). No questions or issues were raised.

Report from Dorset Ward Councillor – JS could not be present but provided a written report available on the PC website.

#### **Parish Council Meeting**

**Declarations of Interest: None** 

Minutes of the Meetings on 16<sup>th</sup> March 2022: These were approved unanimously.

#### **Matters Arising:**

**Dog Poo Bin** – AM reported that the dog poo bin is now in place at the top of Fontmell Hill. AM will contact Gore Farm amount widening the gap between the concrete bollards at the entrance to Chalk Pit carpark.

**Spring Meadows Development –** It has been confirmed with Pennyfarthing Homes that there are no plans to install busstops outside the new development on South Street. Also a litter bin has been provided for building contractors to use, following an issue raised with the site manager.**Reports from Parish Councillors** 

#### a. Planning

#### Spring Meadows Development, South Street, Fontmell Magna

**Planning Applications** – MH confirmed that 5 new applications had been submitted and assessed by the Neighbourhood Plan Monitoring Group; their reports are available on the PC website:

Gupples Farm, Hartgrove – erection of agricultural storage building.

The PC has objected to this application as the size and scale of the proposed building is felt not to be in keeping with the Grade II listed farmhouse.

3 Shaftesbury View, Hartgrove – erect single storey extension – PC is supporting this application.

Barn at Penn Hill Dairy, Bedchester – change of use, conversion of agricultural building to a dwelling—PC is supporting this application provided that a small dwelling is retained and the large barn is relocated.

Grove Farm, Hannahs Hill, Hartgrove – amended plans to erect link extension with attic storey.

PC is supporting this application.

Tansys, Gupples Lane, Hartgrove – amended plans for single storey extension.

PC is supporting this application.

MH is attending a Dorset Council planning briefing on 27<sup>th</sup> May, which is expected to provide an update on the Local Plan with potential implications for Fontmell Magna. This may trigger the need to update Fontmell's Neighbourhood Plan which will require people to come forward to form a working group to undertake the update work.

**Spring Meadows Development –** Pennyfarthing Homes held a sales launch event in The Fontmell on 12<sup>th</sup> May. Occupation of the first property in the development is expected in October. MH will arrange a meeting with the School Head to discuss the use of the school drop-off area by parents.

**b. Highways –** AD reported that traffic surveys have been completed at three locations in the village, and all three sites meet the threshold of installing a Speed Indicator Device (SID). Consequently AD proposed that the PC should approve in principle the purchase of an SID subject to clarification over funding which was agreed. The cost estimate currently is £6,200, which is beyond the funds of the parish council so some fund-raising activity will be needed. If the SID is acquired the existing VAS (Vehicle Activated Speed) signs on the A350 at the north and south entrances to the village would be removed.

AD to request a review by Highways of traffic signs on the A350 through the village.

Road markings on the approach to the s-bends in South Street have been refreshed.

Four residents attended a recent meeting at Dorset Council on a new Speed Limit policy, and read out letters detailing issues of concern, as the policy would inhibit the adoption of a 20mph limit on some local roads. This input had some influence in councillors rejecting the policy and asking officials to redraft it.

The recent community survey conducted by LK produced some useful stats on road safety: from 63 household responses:

- 95% support a 20mph limit on village roads;
- 82% support a 20mph limit on the A350 through the village;
  - 34% use a car to make a short trip to the village hall or shop because they feel the A350 is too dangerous to walk on without a pavement;
  - 71% would support a painted pathway along West Street (from Timbers to the Village Hall).

These stats will be used to try to persuade Dorset Highways to deploy 20mph speed limits where appropriate.

A request has gone to Highways to install a bell bollard at the corner of the West Lea property.

- **c.** Environment Protection No report. A new councillor is needed to cover this area for the parish which includes actions the community can take to address climate change.
- **d. Social Infrastructure** Robert McCurrach reported that funds are in place to acquire the freehold of the village shop and contracts are ready to exchange. He expressed his thanks to the community for their support to this project.

Efforts will continue to determine if a network provider could increase the level of network service available in the village and wider parish.

- e. District Liaison No report. A new councillor is needed to cover this area.
- **f. Footpaths –** A request has gone to the school to clear the path which runs alongside the school which is overgrown. Discussions are being held with Pennyfarthing Homes on re-surfacing this footpath, a condition of their planning permission
- **g. Communications -** LK has completed a house-to-house community survey across a large chunk of the parish. This reaching out to the community was generally very well received and many people expressed their willingness to help the community with organising and running community events; a list has been provided to the Village Hall Committee. Useful information was also gathered on people's preferences for investment of the S106 contributions arising from the Spring Meadows development.
- h. Governance MH recently conducted an annual review for the Clerk to address any concerns. The PC approved an increase to the Clerk's salary to £11.73 per hour, providing an annual salary of £4,504.

#### **Finance**

The RFO reported for the financial year ended 31/03/22 total income was £9,751 and total expenditure was £7,692. The bank balance at 31/03/22 was £9,132.

An internal audit for the year end has been completed with no comments made.

The PC's insurance policy is due for renewal at end of May with a premium quoted of £746, fixed for three years. Alternative quotes will be investigated.

The PC has purchased 36 Queen's Platinum Jubilee mugs to give to all under-16 children in the parish as a memento.

It was agreed bills set out in the Schedule should be paid:

Clerk's salary and expenses, May22 - £431.98

St Andrews Churchyard maintenance - £400

DAPTC Annual Subscription - £267.43

Vale Garden Services - £50

Parish Online software licence - £45

The grant request from the Village Hall for £550 towards playground maintenance costs needs to be discussed further as the playground is closed, CS to action.

Andrew and Laura to be added as signatories for PC cheques.

The Clerk will arrange dates for PC meetings in 2023 to see if Monday evenings would be available for meetings.

#### Matters Arising from Recent Correspondence - none

#### **AOB**

Clare Reynolds expressed concern over the recent addition of security lights at St Andrews School. This was done without any consultation and is causing disturbance to adjoining properties and to bats. Also, seemingly, this contravenes the Neighbourhood Plan Dark Skies policy. AM has written to the Head to raise the issue but has yet to receive a response.
