Friday 4th of February 2022 – Sir John Stuttard – "Peking to Paris in a Pink Rolls Royce"

Why pink? The car was a 1934 Rolls Royce and John had it painted in response to the request of a journalist friend who asked for it to be painted in Financial Times pink. The occasion was the 1997 Peking to Paris car rally and every car had to be over 30 years old. Over 90 cars started and they almost all finished. The rally was held to commemorate ninety years since a French newspaper sponsored a similar event in 1907.

John is a classic car enthusiast and we were all captivated by his thrilling account of this most gruelling challenge. He showed us slides and videos of breathtaking scenery and described moments of heart stopping danger. They drove over the highest road in the world and in Nepal alone they had to cross 13 rivers with no bridges. In Greece they consulted the Delphic oracle and were told unequivocally that they would succeed in finishing. The priestess was right and when finally in Paris they were able to enjoy a well deserved glass of champagne.

Our next talk is on Friday the 4th of March when will have a talk from Lucy Barfoot of 'Coconut & Cotton' in Swan's Yard in Shaftesbury. She will explain how seeing the impact of plastic waste in the world led her to selling products to help everyone live in a more sustainable manner.

Compost Corner

If you've been watching The Green Planet you'll have seen how communities in various parts of the world are dispersing seeds, rather unconventionally, using catapults, dropping them from helicopters, even throwing them from the back of a camel. In nature seeds use a variety of methods to disperse their seeds: there are exploding seed capsules, seeds which use little barbs to attach to animals' fur, or seeds with 'wings' which will flutter away from the parent plant, transported by the wind.

A seed is an extraordinary structure, it can be truly minuscule as in an orchid, Aerides Odonata (just one gram contains over 3 million seeds)) or a hefty 2.5 kg (the Coco de Mer). But whatever the size, seeds are a very cost effective and relatively easy way to stock your garden with ornamentals and vegetables.

March is a busy seed planting month; I sow courgette and French bean seeds in March, undercover of course - it's far too cold in the vegetable plot - and they'll be ready to transplant by about May.

Seeds can grow to a fully established plant incredibly quickly; the architectural castor oil plant (Ricinus communis) will grow to an impressive 5 ft in just one season - but beware, all parts of it are toxic, particularly the glossy bean-like seeds.
