Iwerne Valley Walking Group Hambledon Hill walk September 2022

Our walk on Saturday 17th September was a local circular one commencing at the Talbot in Iwerne Minster.

It was a beautiful morning and, having ordered our lunches, 12 of us set off. A further 4 members unable to complete the walk were to join us later for lunch.

From the car park we were able to take a short walk along the A 350 to reach the track. Skirting the cricket pitch, we made our way up the steps and through the gate to commence our climb up Iwerne Hill. At the top of the grass track we were afforded stunning views of the village and Saint Mary's Church.

We continued our upward climb and, as it levelled out, we took a left-hand gate through a small stretch of woods to the main gravelled track. Interestingly 3 of our party had not been aware of this route before.



We followed the track past the small air strip until we reached the gate which allowed us to make the descent down the steep grassy field. Fortunately, there were no cattle on the slope.

We crossed the A 350 and entered Shroton where Claire led us through a path crossing a

small bridge through a beautiful newly built arbour adjacent to the children's playground. We took a short cut past the village hall to find ourselves at the base of Hambledon Hill.

At this point 3 of our party led by Claire went back along the base of the Hill and then along the river back to Iwerne. The rest of us took the long beautiful walk up the chalky hill. Apart from a small group of children running down the hill with a teacher, we had the whole of the hill to ourselves.

As we reached the top the peace and tranquillity was breathtaking and we could see for miles. Who could have believed that only a few short weeks before, hundreds of us had stood on the same spot and watched all the surrounding beacons being lit for the Queens 70th. Jubilee?

Our descent was considerably quicker but very pleasant, enjoying the vista as we passed through fields and through Oyles mill. We arrived back at the

Talbot to enjoy a very pleasant lunch outside in the sunshine. Dennis, Helen, Pauline and the 2 Janes who joined us at this point for lunch were delighted for the opportunity to catch up with everyone.

Fontmell Magna Parish Council - Meeting held on 4th October 2022 in the Village Hall.

Present: Cllrs Andrew Davis (Chair AD), Michael Humphreys (MH), Christine Scott (CS), Laura Kurton (LK), plus Sam Smith (Clerk) Dorset Cllr Jane Somper (part) and 29 members of the public.

The Chairman started the meeting by congratulating Sian Highnam and the volunteers from the Village Hall Committee who have recently received a 'High Sheriff Award' for the Friendship Garden. The Friendship Garden has also been nominated for an award at the Dorset Volunteer Celebration evening, "Team of the Year award". The PC Cllrs and residents attending congratulated the committee on their success.

Public Questions

A resident raised the issue of the hard core on the Spring Meadows school drop-off area, where trees will be planted imminently, and voiced concerns regarding the soil suitability.

A resident mentioned the bright outside lights at the village school, shining on to West Street.

Apologies for Absence: Andy Main (AM)

Declarations of Interest: None.

Minutes of the Meetings held on the 20th July and 5th September 2022: These were unanimously approved and signed by the Chair.

Matters Arising:

- a. Mobile broadband coverage Currently there is a poor level of network coverage in the village centre. MH has made contact with EE a number of times about improving the service but this has not proved productive. A team from Dorset Council has started an initiative to register assets in villages with poor service onto to a database. Assets such as a church, village hall, existing broadband fibre cable, etc. that are already in place would reduce the costs for a network provider; the PC is participating in this research. Progress can hopefully be made with at least 4G, but it would mean a signal mast being erected somewhere in the Village; it's already been established the church tower would not be suitable for this.
- b. Spring Meadows Bus Stop The need for a bus stop has been voiced by prospective Spring Meadows residents and current village residents. At present there is no bus stop close to Spring Meadows. Siting a bus stop at the new Spring Meadows turning area has been suggested. The PC has written to DC Highways for advice, before approaching the bus company.

Report from The Clerk:

- **a. Meeting dates for 2023** The Clerk has provisionally booked PC meetings on the 3rd Tuesday of January, March, May, July, September and November 2023 and is awaiting confirmation. The Clerk will confirm dates after liaising with Jane Somper.
- b. CILCA The Clerk will undertake the 'Certificate in Local Council Administration' commencing November 2022; the cost for Fontmell is £645.00. Once qualified the Parish Council will obtain the 'General Power of Competence' via the Clerk.
- **c. PC Garden Waste Bin -** The PC has agreed to provide a Dorset Council green waste bin for the volunteers who cut the village green in Church Street, to dispose of the waste cuttings.

Finance:

a. Half Year Finance Update - The following documents were issued by the Clerk to PC Cllrs:

A 6-month Bank Reconciliation - This document was signed by the Chairman for the end of year PC audit record.

Budget v Spend – Spending is currently above our forecast budget, but the document does not show the whole picture as we have received money from other sources this year to cover the extra spending.

Precept Planning - The 2023/24 precept request will need to be discussed at the November PC meeting; Councillors are asked to look at the draft precept plan before the next meeting. The Clerk will check with DC Electoral Services, the implications of new Spring Meadow residents on our precept and also the number of properties counted for council tax in 2021/22 compared with 2022/23.

b. Balances - The current balance in the PC bank account is £6,249.26 and the PC savings account £7,796.59. The second half of the precept from DC has been credited to the PC bank account, ie. £5,384.50.

c. Resolve to Pay Bills presented -

Report from Dorset Councillor:

Jane's written report will be available on the PC Website. She highlighted the following points:

- Dorset is to be one of just nine areas in England to receive funding from a new government scheme to improve electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure. Dorset Council has secured £2.7million to increase the number of EV charge points.
- The PC was asked to be aware of vulnerable residents in the community. JS gave out some leaflets highlighting avenues from which to seek help. More information is on the helpandkidness.co.uk website.
- DC are currently running Adult Service public engagement sessions. The next forum is in Sturminster Newton on the 19th October, all are welcome.

Reports from the Parish Councillors:

Planning

a. Planning Applications MH confirmed that 6 new applications had been submitted and assessed by the Neighbourhood Plan Monitoring Group; their reports are available on the PC website.

The PC is supporting 4 applications:

Yew Tree Farm, Hartgrove

Fernlea Cottage, Mill Street, Fontmell Magna.

The Barns, Lower Hartgrove Farm, Green Lane, Hartgrove.

28 Orchard Close, Fontmell Magna

The PC is objecting to 2 applications:

Middle Farm, Lurmer Street, Fontmell Magna. Erect 2 No. dwellings, convert and extend existing single storey stables to form 1 No. dwelling, and erect garage/car port. Modify vehicular access

St Andrew's Farm Barn, Woodbridge Lane, Bedchester. Change of use and conversion of agricultural building to 3 no. dwelling houses (Use Class C3).

There has been a large resident response to this application.

Two further applications are currently being assessed by the NPMG:

Land East of Charlie's Cottage, Mill Street.

The Old Rectory Mill Street Fontmell Magna

- b. Neighbourhood Plan The Fontmell Magna Neighbourhood Plan has been in operation since November 2018 and now needs to be updated to reflect new issues and concerns arising in the parish. Dorset Council has put back the date for adopting its new Local Plan to 2026: this is to process the large volume of feedback received by DC on the initial draft. This delay, in the meantime, unfortunately leaves Fontmell Magna open to speculative development as planning applications cannot easily be refused. It is important that we update our Neighbourhood Plan as a form of defence, stipulating development only in places where it's desirable. The current neighbourhood plan is on the PC website; areas such as Environment & Climate Change, Transport & Highways need to be added. It will take approx. 12 months to update with a team of approx. 8 people needed. Volunteers will be needed to help with this important project; please contact the Clerk if you wish to be involved.
- c. Spring Meadows Development Adoption of the school drop area. This area is being created for parents to use at school drop off/pick up times to alleviate the traffic on West Street. The PC has been talking to the Salisbury Diocese about possibility of them taking on ownership of this area. The Diocese owns the land that the school occupies. The area could then be used exclusively by the school and parents. If not adopted, then potentially the area could be used by anyone. A £40,000 lump sum will be available for maintenance.
- d. Site 22 Blandfords Farm This is an allocated site within the FM Neighbourhood Plan. The site is set aside for approx. 5 to 10 new homes including a barn which can be converted. Intelligent Land are interested in developing the site and they will soon submit some ideas to PC for resident to comment on. The developer is suggesting the site could easily accommodate more than 10 houses. Access to the site will be via either of two options through Spring Meadows or from West Street. There is a land strip in Spring Meadows which would have to be acquired to extend the road in Spring Meadows into Site 22. Access via West Street would be adjacent to the Village Hall. Most residents attending the meeting were against the idea of an access via West Street; the PC would certainly prefer access to go through Spring Meadows. The owner of the land strip in Spring Meadows, who attended the meeting, stated that he would be more than happy to negotiate over the land strip but has not been formally approached by Intelligent Land to date regarding access to Site 22.

Highways:

a. Dorset Speed Limit Policy - A draft policy has been rejected by Dorset Councillors after strong representations by Font-mell councillors and residents, and other parties, attending a recent council meeting. The policy did not take sufficient account of the growing demand and national trend towards adopting a 20mph speed limit in built-up areas. A recent survey showed strong support amongst Fontmell residents for a 20mph limit on roads and lanes through the village, including along the A350. The 2nd paper was published last week but the results are disappointing; it will be very difficult to obtain a lower speed limit due to the criteria set. The new revised Highway Code seems to have been ignored. The Chairman has written a letter from the PC with our views, and he will attend another meeting with DC.

Highways: b. Speed Indicator Device (SID) - The PC will proceed with purchasing and installing a SID at 3 positions in the village along the A350. All PC Cllrs agreed the purchase of a SID at a cost of £4,030.00 with a 10% contingency on cost.

Environmental Protection: No report. A new Councillor is needed to cover this area for the parish which includes actions the community can take to address climate change.

Social Infrastructure:

- a. FMCLT & Village Shop Update Dick Stainer reported that scaffolding has been erected at the shop and work has started to make the building watertight. The electrics work inside the property is completed. Heaters in the house are to be installed. A new lease is being drawn up. Several prospective purchasers have been in contact with a view to running the business.
- **b. Fontmell Inn** Unfortunately, the pub has now closed. The PC has no update on plans for its future use. The process of registering a pub as a "Community Asset" was discussed. Residents would like to see the property continue as a village pub.
- **c. Section 106 Grant Money** A total of **£360,000** is to be paid directly to Dorset Council from the developer of Spring Meadows. A third of this money will go to educational needs in Dorset. Rosie Ann Yates from the Village Hall Committee gave a run down on their spending plan:
- Improved acoustics in hall and a new sound system.
- The kitchen is to be upgraded to more of a preparation kitchen with a new oven and fridges etc.
- If money is surplus after these 2 projects are completed, then the toilets at the hall entrance will be refurbished.
- Play area equipment is being replaced: £29,000 is being used towards the play area plus **£10,000** from VH funds. There will also be **£10,000** set aside for equipment maintenance.
- An open space sports area is planned. The tennis court will be resurfaced, the nets replaced and netball lines marked out. The VH Committee would also like to purchase some additional land for the playground to create a football area. £7,000 has been set aside for pre-school provision.
- d. Defibrillator The school would like to take over responsibility of the defibrillator. A question over ownership was raised; the Clerk will investigate. The PC agreed that the school could take the defibrillator on. The feasibility of second defib for the village was discussed, possibly housed in the telephone box at the shop. Volunteers are needed for a litter pick in early November 2022: approx. 13 people to cover Fontmell, Bedchester and Hartgrove.

Community Reach:

- **a.** Emergency response plan A booklet has been produced with help from the VH committee. This plan would guide the community to help themselves in the event of a large emergency event eg. a sustained power cut. The printing of the booklet will cost £252.00. The VH committee has agreed to pay 50% and the PC the other 50%.
- **b.** Community transport service Village public transport is limited. Ways to provide community transport are being researched. Car share, help a neighbour, volunteers on a rota etc.

Footpaths: - Pennyfarthing Homes have agreed to purchase a general litter bin for the upgraded footpath. There is an option to use Section 106 to replace the styles with gates, making the footpath accessible to all, and the possibility of using some section 106 grant money to replace existing stiles with gates.

Communications:

- **a. FMPC Logo** The local school children were invited to design a logo for the Parish Council. There was not a great response, so we are looking to design our own.
- b. Parish Directory & Welcome Pack This has been updated and will be ready by November 2022 to be circulated. Any residents wishing to list their business please contact the PC Clerk.
- c. PC Noticeboards All three of the PC noticeboards need some repairs. All PC Clirs agreed to go ahead with the £558.00 spend.

Governance: There continues to be two vacancies on the PC for Cllrs.

Correspondence: All correspondence was circulated to Councillors in advance of the meeting.

Matters arising from Councillors: None

Date of Next Meeting: The next Parish Council meeting will be held on 23rd November 2022 at the Village Hall, commencing at 7pm.

Compost Corner

How many trees did the late Queen Elizabeth plant in her lifetime? It was over 1,500 trees in every corner of the world. Those that were planted as mere saplings are now lofty trees including a blue cedar, planted in 1954 in New Zealand which has grown into a towering specimen - what a wonderful, enduring legacy.

Tree planting is a visionary task - think of Humphrey Repton, Capability Brown or Henry Hoare and the landscapes they created in the 18C, with trees as the backbone of their designs. Hundreds of years later we benefit from the realisation of their design's dreams - Stourhead for example, the masterpiece designed by Henry Hoare 'the Magnificent', a stunning garden with the most glorious collection of trees including Giant Sequoia, American tulip tree,

Katsura, Davidia, Acers, spruces and pines; and in autumn the changing colour of the trees should not be missed.
