Wessex Water will be replacing a water main that is prone to bursting in Fontmell Magna with new, more modern, pipes to ensure improved water quality and a more reliable supply.

This work is due to start on Monday 27 February and be completed by Friday 31 March and I wanted to advise the parish council about the nature of the scheme and how we are informing the local community about its impact.

This work will be carried out using techniques where small excavations are made to minimise inconvenience.

Church Street will be closed to through traffic between the junction with North Street and the steps up to the pedestrian access to St Andrews Church throughout March. Access will be maintained for residents and our team will be working with local people with regard to any specific access requirements during that time.

A compound will be sited on land to the north west of the church, off Church Close, and we will place signs advising users of a nearby footpath that the area will be being used for site access during the course of the scheme. For security reasons, we will install an alarm system at our construction compound. If the alarm goes off when the site is unoccupied, or if you have any further questions about our work, please call 0345 600 4 600 or visit wessexwater.co.uk/contact-us

Two-way traffic lights will be in place on a section of North Street for a short period during March to allow us to make a new connection to the existing water main. Advanced warning signs will be placed nearer the time to advise on the exact dates for this phase of the scheme.

Water supplies can continue to be used as normal. Should supplies be interrupted for more than one hour we will give residents' at least 48 hours' notice beforehand of when this will be.

Councillor's Chronicles No.12 - Being a Parish Councillor

The Parish Council has a large presence in the Gossip Tree thanks to some very active and effective councillors. Being a councillor is voluntary but a role which can have a significant impact on the wellbeing, vibrancy and sustainability of a parish. In Fontmell Magna we are fortunate to have five friendly councillors who come from different walks of life, working together in the interests of the community and its environment. The Clerk, who is not a council member, is professionally trained and the only person involved who receives a (small) salary.



We asked councillors the question how do you view your role and what keeps you motivated?

One answer was about making a difference for the people who live in Fontmell Magna parish. "I found I could tap into the wealth of kindness and expertise in all sorts of areas". A practical example of this is the Community Emergency Response Plan which originated in recognising its importance, aided by the knowledge and commitment of members of the Village Hall Committee together with the involvement of two sterling volunteers who identified what was needed and created a plan to deliver it. Another councillor cited the need for efficient and up to date network and broadband services which prompted them to become active at council level. Most people will be aware of the significant effort that has gone into trying to make the A350 more pedestrian-friendly and pursued by the council members with gusto.

The inherent qualities of this area and the need for community preservation were reasons several councillors gave for their interest in and commitment to the parish. For those who were new to Fontmell Magna parish their involvement began with a friendly welcome and the welcome pack they received shortly after moving in, already making them feel valued by the community.

In an altogether different aspect of parish council work one councillor described how they had recently "settled in this beautiful area full of friendly people" and that becoming a member of the council enabled them to become more connected and to help care for the place we live in. For them taking part in the government funded scheme, Chalk and Chase, which aims to conserve and enhance the local Area of Outstanding Beauty that is the Cranborne Chase, was both an opportunity to learn and to meet people.

There are aspects of parish council work that require what another councillor describes as being passionate about people

and relationships. "I love community and I believe community is one of the most important foundations of relationships. People will always be different from one another no matter if they live next door to each other or across the world so I believe it is important to foster the support and friendship that can be had in all sorts of different ways from people living close by. As a Parish Councillor it gives me the opportunity to get to know my community, make friends and be part of something really positive and enjoyable, striving to make a difference. Being on the Parish Council means I get to listen to others, what they want and feel and help them achieve what is good for all. It makes me very happy and it is a pleasure to be part of a network of people with so many skills and that offers so many opportunities".

Councillors know their contribution is often valued. As the chair said "The positive comments and feedback we receive shows that we are making a difference and help to make the time and effort of being a councillor very worthwhile."

Fontmell Magna Parish Council – Meeting held on 17th January 2023 in the Village Hall

Present: Cllrs Andrew Davis (Chair AD) Michael Humphreys (MH) Christine Scott (CS) Andy Main (AM) & Laura Kurton (LK) plus Sam Smith (Clerk), Dorset Cllr Jane Somper and 19 members of the public.

Welcome: The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting on a very cold evening.

Public Questions: The Chairman of Melbury Abbas PC David Webber attended the meeting. MAPC are seeking to introduce a 40mph speed limit by Guys Marsh Prison and through Kit Hill. David requested FMPC support as part of the road runs through our parish. It was agreed in principle, and it was suggested that a site visit would be helpful with Cllr Somper & the MA Chairman in attendance.

A resident of West Lea in The Knapp spoke of how the road was currently covered in black ice and they stated the need for a git bin. Andrew will discuss with Dorset Highways.

Apologies for Absence: All present.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Minutes of the Meetings held on the 6th December 2022: The minutes were unanimously approved and signed by the Chair.

Matters Arising from the December 2022 Minutes: Nothing to note

Report from The Clerk:

- a. Issues actioned since the last meeting All items on the agenda.
- b. Finance update the current balance in the PC bank account is £3,036.43 and the PC savings account £4,802.71
- c. Resolve to pay bills presented

The invoices paid since the last meeting are as follows:

Landworks - £50.00 War Memorial tidy

Clerks' wages Jan 2023 plus expenses - £541.21

Morelock Signs SID Devise - £3,048.00

J Gilbert, hedge cutting - £215.00

d. Precept for FY 2023/24 - A precept planning document had been circulated to all PC Cllrs prior to meeting. Council Tax payments from the new residents at Spring Meadows will not be counted towards Fontmell Magna's precept until Financial Year 2024/25. The Precept will need to be raised from the 2022/23 amount due to inflation and increased costs. A Precept of£11,848.19 for 2023/24 was proposed. An increase on the current year of £1,079.19. This will equate to a band D property paying an increase of £2.36 per property per year. All Cllrs agreed for the Clerk to go ahead and request this amount from Dorset Council (DC).

Report from Dorset Councillor:

Jane Somper's written report will be available on the PC website shortly. Jane highlighted the following points:

Council tax flexibility - the government is giving local authorities in England additional flexibility in setting council tax by increasing the referendum limit for increases in council tax by up to 3% per year from April 2023. In addition, local authorities with social care responsibilities will be able to increase the adult social care precept by up to 2% per year. The plans for adult social carereform – with a lifetime cap on social care costs – are now delayed for two years. A further £1bn nationally was pledged as grant funding for social care next year, with £1.7bn the following year.

Highways - Cllr Somper encouraged all residents to use the Highways online reporting system via the Dorset Council website for all highway issues eg: pot holes, fallen trees, fly tipping, abandoned vehicles, etc.

Reports from the Parish Councillors

Planning:

a. Planning Applications

Since the last meeting in December, the PC has received 6 applications:

P/PABA/2022/07871 Bedchester and Hurdles Farm, Common Lane, Fontmell Magna. Erect agricultural storage building, form hard-standing and access track. This was not a planning application but to determine if prior approval is required.

Neighbouring residents have agreed with the applicant to move the barn 5m to the north. With this condition the PC is supporting this application.

Planning: a. Planning Applications (cont)

P/FUL/2022/07195 Land known as Margaret's Yard, South Street, Fontmell Magna, SP7 0PD Erect single dwelling (demolish existing storage building)

Based on the submission documents the PC is objecting to this application as it conflicts with two policies in the Neighbourhood Plan:

- FM7 Conservation Area a 2/3 storey house with a high roof line is not in keeping with the general character of houses within the conservation area and the surrounding properties which are 1.5 storey.
- FM16 Housing Types this policy states that new open market housing should predominately be of 1, 2 and some 3-bed properties. The proposed 5-bed dwelling does not contribute to the need for smaller units within the Conservation Area. The PC met with the applicant who understood our concerns and undertook to review the design with the architect.

P/HOU/2023/00080 Mulberry, West Street, Fontmell Magna, SP7 0PF Erection of greenhouse, summer room, shed and flue for wood burner. The PC supports this application.

P/TRC/2022/08068 Lynchets, Mill Street, Fontmell Magna, SP7 0NU Various tree works. The PC supports this application.

P/FUL/2022/07693 Home Mead Cottage, Lurmer Street, Fontmell Magna, SP7 0NS Erect no.1 new dwelling. This application is currently being assessed by the NP Monitoring Group (NPMG).

P/FUL/2022/07053 Home Mead Cottage, Lurmer Street, Fontmell Magna, SP7 0NS
Retention of change of use from agricultural to a flexible commercial use to operate a small holiday camping park & siting of 4 x shepherd huts. An application for this development was made in November 2020, opposed by the PC and refused by Dorset Council. The Parish Council will object to this new application as it conflicts with 4 policies in the Neighbourhood Plan, and in particular policy FM10 concerning safe pedestrian access to village facilities.

Two founder members of the NPMG have stood down – Barry Roberts as Chairman and Robert McCurrach as Secretary. Mike has agreed to take on the Secretary role on a temporary basis until new recruits have been found.

Barry and Rosie Roberts will soon be moving away from Fontmell and they will be sorely missed. The PC is particularly grateful to Barry who served as a key member of the project team that produced the Neighbourhood Plan over 2015-18. Alongside this work Barry researched and wrote the Conservation Area Appraisal, because whilst Fontmell has held the status of a Conservation Area since May 1977 there was no document to substantiate why: so Barry wrote one. Its a very good read, available on the parish website, and brilliantly explains what makes Fontmell Magna a special place. Since 2018 when the Neighbourhood Plan became part of the Dorset Local Plan, Barry has worked tirelessly as a member of the NP Monitoring Group to ensure planning applications adhere to its policies and in that way to keep Fontmell a special place to live.

b. NP Review Group Start-up activities for the project will be getting under way shortly, including an inaugural meeting of the Review Group, arranged for 24th January 2023; appointment of a Chair and Secretary for the project; application for an initial grant; handover of relevant documents; arranging a communications event and scoping meeting for residents.

The Review Group is still looking for new members, please contact the Clerk if you feel you can help. The process will take 12/18 months; most of the expense will be covered by Government grants.

- **c. Section 106 grant money** A total of £360,000 is to be paid directly to Dorset Council from the developer of Spring Meadows. A third of this money will go to educational needs. The first home was occupied in Spring Meadows on 20th December 2022 which triggered payment of 50% of the S106 Levy monies to Dorset Council. The remaining 50% is payable before the 12th house is occupied. DC has confirmed it will not release any funds until 100% of the payments have been received from Pennyfarthing Homes.
- d. Site 22 Blandford Farm -no update and no contact from developers.

Communications: Laura gave a short presentation with the slide projector.

- a. Parish Website for All A move towards a village Facebook page is proposed that could be used by all partners. A new website is being considered to be shared by the Parish Council and other community groups with the costs shared. Laura is talking to website providers to ascertain costs for developing the new site, and how it will be updated and supported. Providing costs are in line with the 2023/24 budget, the plans will be shared with the relevant parties involved and if everyone is in support then put into action.
- b. Community Transport Laura is looking into ideas and schemes.

Laura will connect other PCs and groups that have implemented a similar transport service. Through the development of the emergency response plan we have collated a list of people who could offer transport assistance in the event of an emergency. Our efforts continue to identify who may be in need of a more 'regular/everyday' service and how we may be able to implement such a service within Fontmell. There is much more work and research that needs to be done here before we can launch anything without any flaws.

c. Community Support Hub - The Community Support Hub has been organised and launched by members of Village Hall Committee and the Church Committee. It aims to provide support, advice and a warm place to eat, drink and chat with friends and neighbours. It is available for absolutely everyone, no matter their situation, and although the Parish Council are unable to offer financial support to this amazing project it is something very much supported by the councillors as residents. Dates are: 18th and 25th January; 8th and 22nd February; 1st, 8th, 15th, 22nd and 29th March; 5th April 2023; open 12-5pm. The Chairman acknowledged and thanked Lisa Le Druillenec for all her hard work within the community.

Highways:

- a. Speed Indicator Device (SID) A SID unit has been ordered and is waiting for Highways to complete the installation of the posts at the three sites.
- **b. 20mph Speed Limit** The PC has submitted an application to DC in for a 20mph speed limit through the village and along the A350. The application is being reviewed by Dorset Highways and has advised that we are unlikely to hear anything before the end of March 2023.

DC requested further evidence of near-misses and accidents and thanks to the Community Speed Watch team members, we were able to do this; 9 separate incidents have been recorded over a two-three year period. If you do have a near-miss or minor accident on any parish road, please let Peter Mole or Andrew know so we can log it on the Highway's web site.

c. Community Speed Watch - Peter Mole reported that a recent CSW session on the A350 showed an increase in speeding. The road layout has been widened between Sutton Waldron and Fontmell to facilitate access to the new Spring Meadows development. This has resulted in noticeably higher speeds and a worrying reduction in visibility for both drivers and pedestrians. The CSW team have reported a 30% increase in vehicles travelling at 35-mph or more, within the 30mph zone in South Street. We have made this new safety concern known to Dorset Highways.

Environmental Protection:

- a. Defibrillator The feasibility of a second defibrillator for the village was discussed, maybe sited in the telephone box at the shop? The cost would be approx £1,500 for 4 years; funding would need to be found. The idea was discussed with the residents present. It was thought that a refresh of First Aid/CPR training might be more beneficial at the present time. Christine will research First Aid training.
- b. Plan for Litter Pick A successful village litter pick took place in November 2022. A Spring pick is being planned, Christine will arrange a date in March 2023.

Social Infrastructure:

- a. FMCLT & Village Shop Update The repairs and improvements to the building are nearing completion.
- **b. Fontmell Pub** The pub is currently closed and the pub business is in liquidation. It was agreed by all PC Cllrs to submit an application to DC to register the pub as an Asset of Community Value. There's a need to establish the level of support and interest of residents within the Parish to continue to have a pub to serve the community, which could be measured through a survey and/or community 'future of the pub' meeting. Laura to look into an online survey for residents to complete.
- c. Doctors Surgery The Blackmore Vale Partnership cannot recruit the staff needed to re-open the surgery. They have suggested that it could be used for other services as the surgery cannot be sold due to covenants on the building. The PC has been invited to make suggestions as to how the surgery could be used for the benefit of the community. The Village Hall Committee, the PC Cllrs and Cllr Somper are due to meet the surgery Practice Manager in February to discuss the matter further.
- d. Village Hall Deed Swap Solicitors have been appointed. The documents need to be collated first to minimise our legal costs. Andrew will meet with Dick Stainer to arrange this.

Community Reach:

a. Emergency response Plan - A booklet has been produced with help from the Village Hall Committee and has been circulated to all residents. An electronic copy can be obtained from the PC website.

A meeting is in the process of being organised with Elle Wilson who will be coordinating an emergency response test plan. This will take us to the final stage of completing the plan. DC have commended our emergency plan and acknowledged the amount of work put into it.

It was agreed that emergency coverage would be put in place again for the ambulance strike at the end of January 2023.

b. Mobile Coverage - Further contact has been made with EE about how the mobile network coverage in Fontmell Village centre could be improved but with no progress to date.

Footpaths:

With regards to the planning application for a new build property on Margaret's Yard, next to Home Farm and adjacent to footpath N63/6 from West Street to the A350, a potential condition could be applied widening of the existing footpath: a 'fenced in' footpath must be at least 2.5 meters wide. As this footpath separates the Margaret's Yard site and the Penny Farthing development, it might be that both should contribute a small strip to enable the path to be widened; Mike to approach Pennyfarthing Homes.

As yet there's no progress with replacement dog waste bins at Middle Mill, and behind the school on footpath N63/7. Nothing new to report on the Council's plea to re-establish access to the track between footpath N63/11 and West Street at Marshmoor Lodge – the track's owner is apparently still in dispute with some of the users.

The style has still not been replaced at the junction of footpath N63/9 and Mill Street. Residents stated that this style is needed as it prevents dogs off the lead running on to the road.

Governance:

There are currently two vacancies on the Parish Council for Councillors.

There are several opportunities for new people to come forward to help with Parish Council activities:

- someone to lead on Environmental Protection matters for the parish council;
- someone to lead on Community Reach matters for the parish council;
- someone to lead on Planning matters for the parish council, as Mike is stepping down in May;
- Emergency Response activities those who can offer their skills in the event of an emergency/crisis;
- joining the project team for the Neighbourhood Plan review;
- joining the Neighbourhood Plan monitoring group, looking at planning applications.
