Planning Application for 25 Homes along Mill Street

A new planning application P/OUT/2023/00667 has been submitted to Dorset Council by Hartdene Homes, for 25 new dwellings along Mill Street on two fields north of Mill Street behind Collyer's Rise.



A similar application for the same site came forward in 2018, which was opposed by the Parish Council and subsequently rejected by Dorset Council.

The Parish Council is minded to object to this new application for similar reasons. The site is not an allocated site for development in the Fontmell Magna Neighbourhood Plan. It is not at all clear that the village needs 25 more homes, as the parish has more than met its housing allocation in the Dorset Local Plan with 45 new homes completed or approved since April 2017, against a plan target of around 40. A further site in the Neighbourhood Plan at Blandfords Farm Barn is allocated for 10 homes.

More residents along Mill Street would mean additional traffic using this single-track lane, and there aresafety risks to more pedestrians crossing the A350 to access village facilities. Also, the development would impact the setting of the AONB which we all value.

St Andrew's Parapets 'Need You'

Not obvious to the casual observer, but our impressive church requires urgent repair work and we need the help of the community.

During a recent inspection, the Church Architect noted significant deterioration to some of the parapets of St Andrew's and recommended: "that the parapets on the north and west sides of the North Aisle be dismantled and re-constructed using stainless steel pins, naturally hydraulic lime mortar.....also new lead flashings along the base of the parapet wall" and replacement of defective stones.



Once discovered, these defects have to be fixed not only to save anyone getting killed by a falling parapet but also because our insurance demands that the fabric of the church be kept in good order. To this end the Church Council (PCC) will shortly be launching an appeal to keep our wonderful building ship-shape and Bristol fashion. Remember that St Andrew's church is there for the significant occasions in life, for concerts as well as for regular Sunday services.

To start off the appeal, February's "Downsizing Sale" (courtesy of Barry and Rosie) at the Village Hall raised a cool £700. We shall need to build on that. The PCC is still considering cost estimates of the work and intends to apply for grants and seek other sources of funding including fundraising events. But we hope for the support of the whole of the village community and those beyond who cherish and appreciate this building. Compost Corner

One of the joys of the late winter/early spring garden is the hellebore. These delightful hardy plants are often known as Christmas or Lenten roses but they aren't related to roses at all being members of the buttercup family. The flowers come in many colours from purest white, yellow and green to pinks and purple. Some are speckled and some have double blooms others are cup-shaped and gloriously frilly. They are so easy to grow and maintain although they dislike waterlogged soil, so give them a well drained, humus rich site. Once you have hellebores in your garden you can be sure that you'll have plenty more as they cross-breed so easily. They can also be enjoyed as a cut flower, snip off a few blooms and float them in a shallow bowl of water and lo and behold, you have an exquisite little floral display.
