
Growing runner beans or sweet/garden peas?

FONTMELL FRIENDSHIP GARDEN

Welcome everyone – established and new villagers to a short update on our Fontmell Friendship Garden as we enter our growing season. For those new to the village, the garden was established from nothing and opened in June 2021 on land behind the Surgery. The garden operates as part of the Village Hall and is managed by a sub committee of the village hall committee which is coordinated by myself, Sian Highnam.

The garden is completely self funded and was created with generous support from local businesses, villager plant donations and fundraising events. The goal of the garden is to provide a space to come together to grow seeds, plant flowers, cut and enjoy flowers, tend the garden and work with other stakeholders in the community. We also have links with the well being team through the Blackmore Vale Practice, which allows clients to be signposted to our project. We also link with St Andrew's Primary School, Clayesmore School across all ages, Fontmell Magna Under Fives, Springhead, Yewstock School on occasions and we have also supplied plants in the past to the village shop and intend to supply flowers to Arnie and Sarah in the pub.

The garden has been recognised by several awards in the last two years – Level 5 and outstanding achieved from the RHS "In your neighbourhood" assessment, a Dorset volunteering award and a High Sheriff of Dorset award. This has been a wonderful reflection of all the hard work by so many volunteers.

In the last six months, due to the closure of the surgery, we were asked to vacate the land. Although disappointing, we have taken stock and moved all the original beds and majority of the perennial plants and replanted everything in areas surrounding the village hall. This represented a huge effort with over 120 people involved over a six week period and hundreds of man hours.

We are therefore entering our first season of the garden in its current location.

There are planters and tubs sited on the Village Hall Patio, two new beds on the road side end of the village hall and six beds opposite the new playground with benches for rest and relaxation. Over 500 daffodils and over 300 crocus were planted last autumn by St Andrew's School, Clayesmore Prep, Clayesmore Senior school and Fontmell Under Fives and they are now surrounding the village hall.

The garden is for everyone in the village and we welcome anyone to visit, sit and enjoy the garden, cut the flowers when in bloom to enjoy at home and also join the fantastic team of friendly volunteers in a whole variety of activities. I send out a weekly garden update to over a hundred villagers and please do e mail me if you would like to be added to that list to receive information regarding the garden.

I have a planned schedule of events for the garden and anyone is welcome to get involved in as much or as little as they would like. It is a lovely project for making friends and enjoying blooms. It is not hugely labour intensive and the beds are easily accessible for management.

This is the schedule for the next six weeks. If you would like to join in with any of these activities, please do e mail me on sianhighnam@gmail.com

Refreshments are provided at every activity and if the weather is against us, I schedule an alternative dry weather activity – typically potting on seedlings, sewing seeds or associated jobs.

The Friendship Garden Library in March 2024

Over the last months the Friendship Garden library has been gifted another 20 books by very kind gardeners and others who may not be gardeners but who want uncluttered bookshelves. Thank you all.

Some of the books cover aspects of gardening already represented in the library, others offer further paths to explore.

The oldest donation is 'Compost Gardening' by W E Shewell-Cooper and rather touchingly, was published in 1974, making it 50 years old, so maybe older than some library readers.



'The Border Planner' by Richard Bird, 'Hostas' by Diana Grenfell, 'Ponds and Water Features' an RHS publication, and 'Food Politics', the frontispiece of which suggests it might have strayed from the University of California, are thirty years younger.

Three 'Expert' books by the prolific Dr DG Hessayon – have joined the six the library already holds. Perhaps surprisingly, they are all titles the library did not have – 'The Garden Expert', 'The Fruit Expert' and 'The Vegetable and Herb Expert'.

Dr Hessayon would have been 36 years old when 'Compost Gardening' was published. Last month in Letters to the Editor (of The Times) the journalist and author, Joseph Connolly wrote of meeting him.

"Sir, seeing Dr DG Hessayons 96th birthday recorded in the Times reminds me of when I encountered him in the 1990s at a Hatchards "authors of the year" party. I asked him how he could account for the fact that his many "Garden Expert" books were constantly in the best-selling charts and continued to sell thousands of copies every year. "Cheap binding," he replied."

It's good to know that cheap binding does not preclude longevity.

Iwerne Valley Walking Group—January 2024 walk

We met at The White Horse pub in the centre of Hinton St Mary. Our walk took us through the village, stopping at St Peter's church and onto the Manor House. The Hinton St Mary estate has been in the hands of the Pitt-Rivers family for over six hundred years. Our walk continued to the Home Farm and back into the village.

We then walked down to the B3092, crossing over and continuing along Marriage Lane to Cutt Mill which stands by the River Stour. Although now derelict, it is an interesting place to see. More about its history can be found online. Our walk then continued along the river. Although we had recently experienced severe flooding, fortunately the water had receded but we could see clearly how high the river had reached by the amount of debris attached to the fencing. We stopped to talk to a fisherman who had just landed a very good sized pike with large teeth!


We left the river to join Wood Lane which led us back up to the B3092. At the top of the lane is the site of the Hinton St Mary mosaic which was originally discovered in 1963. The site has been excavated several times and most recently for the past three years. The mosaic is with the British Museum at the time of writing. Plenty of information is available online. We crossed back over the main road and continued up Stearts Lane to arrive back at the pub where we started. Some of us then enjoyed an excellent lunch at The White Horse.

Obituary: Canon Dick Heath Remi Jones (1932-2023) Written by Stephen Dunning



Canon Dick Jones died, at the age of 91, on Wednesday 22nd November 2023 at The Cedars Nursing Home in Shaftesbury, Dorset. His funeral, held on Saturday 20th January 2024 in St. Andrew's Parish Church, Fontmell Magna, was attended by approximately 270 people, many of whom joined the family for the Wake in the village hall after the service.

Born in 1932 to a British father and a French mother, Dick knew from an early age that the Anglican Priesthood was his calling. Following in his father's footsteps, he studied at Jesus College, Cambridge, and then Lincoln Theological College.

Dick married Jennifer Church in October 1957. He and Jennie moved to Ipswich, where he served his first Curacy. He was ordained a Priest in 1959 and would then serve his second Curacy in Putney. In 1965 they moved to Shropshire, where Dick would eventually become the first Team Rector of the newly-formed Parish of Central Telford and would also serve as a Prebendary of Lichfield Cathedral and Rural Dean of Telford. It was during his 15 years in the Telford parishes that, in partnership with his friends and colleagues, he developed a new style of Team Ministry, later with a strong ecumenical focus. Together, they worked closely with the Roman Catholic, Baptist and Methodist Churches in Telford, pioneering various forms of ecumenical worship and pastoral community care that had a significant impact in developing the Christian Faith and a sense of

community in the New Town environment.

In 1980, having returned from a sabbatical in America, the family moved to Bournemouth, Dorset where Dick became Team Rector of the Bournemouth Town Centre Parish, and would later serve as Rural Dean of Bournemouth. During his 16 years of ministry in the Bournemouth parishes, he oversaw the restoration and reordering works at St. Peter's Church. He served as Chaplain to the Dunkirk Veterans' Association, the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra and Bournemouth Sinfonietta, and was co-founder of the Bournemouth Bach Choir when it was re-formed in 1987.

In 1990, Dick was made an Honorary Canon of Winchester Cathedral and in 1996 he retired from his professional ministry. He and Jennie moved to Fontmell Magna where they became active in St. Andrew's Church and the life of the village and the Benefice. Dick contributed to many community and Church projects, including the successful restoration of the bells of St. Andrew's Church, and could often be found working alongside others to help maintain the churchyard. He also helped raise money for the Dorset Historic Churches Trust each year by taking part in their annual Ride and Stride appeal and served as a school governor for St. Andrew's Primary School. He continued to serve as a voluntary clergyman in the Iwerne Valley Benefice until the advance of Alzheimer's disease ended his active ministry in the summer of 2017.

Dick was a kind and compassionate man, with a slightly mischievous sense of humour. He enjoyed sports, debating, fine wine and a good game of chess. During the 1960s, he was a passionate and radical political activist. Later in life, he became a thought-provoking and well-regarded preacher.

His death brings to an end a continuous, multi-generational ministry that began over 175 years ago when his great-grandfather was first ordained. He would have been the first to admit that his ministry was informed by the legacy of those who went before him and shared by those who worked with him. It is that humble yet impactful legacy that will continue to live on in those he leaves behind and the lives he touched. Dick is survived by his wife, Jennie, their daughter, Suzie, and four grandchildren.

A Memorial Concert given by the Bournemouth Bach Choir will be held in St. Andrew's Church, Fontmell Magna, on Saturday 20th April 2024.

Compost Corner

I was leafing through an old 1966 book, 'Amateur Gardening - Planter's Guide', and what a different world it was back then. The chapter on lawn care was really horrific to us in the 21st century - would anyone really want to poison worms with chlordane or spray it with lead arsenate to remove leather-jackets? The chemical DDT crops up throughout the book for eradicating just about anything with lots of legs: aphids, capsid bug, frog hoppers, caterpillars, thrips and earwigs. Of course all the beneficial garden insects - ladybirds, hover flies and bees would have been eliminated too. Eventually DDT was banned in 1986.

One job, which it was suggested should be done on an annual basis, was the dreaded double-digging, absolutely backbreaking work and now considered so damaging to the soil's structure. Now, thank goodness any digging is really considered unnecessary, just add lots of well rotted compost to the soil and let the worms incorporate it into the soil. Even advice on watering was so different all those years ago; having a perfect, weed free, green striped lawn was considered essential and it was recommended to give it a good soaking in times of drought. No longer the case: a parched brown lawn will recover eventually and of course 'no mow May' is becoming increasingly popular. All in all, I wouldn't bother to seek out, 'Planters Guide' at an antiquarian book shop, but a current one that is really inspiring and useful is 'Organic Gardening, the natural no-dig way' by Charles Dowding.
